Dear Father Quintal,

Phil Steigerwald was here in the novitiate for a year and left of his own initiative on the first of September last year. If he had not suggested leaving, he would surely have been asked to leave before too long. The basic problem was a serious lack of emotional maturity.

During the five months since he left here Phil has been in fairly constant contact with one or other of us. Except for the most confidential material, Fathers Carroll, Jones and I have communicated with one another freely about Phil and have been in complete agreement about him. At this time I do not think there would be much point in getting separate evaluations of his situation. I intend to show this letter to Father Jones to confirm that fact. Father Carroll is not here anymore. He is now at St. Joseph's Church in Seattle.

Phil has many attractive qualities and is surely a generous person who is willing to devote himself to the service of others. At a later date it is even conceivable, though not probable, that he might be a good prospect for the priesthood.

The lack of emotional maturity mentioned above is really quite serious. In the five months since he left here he has been all over the country and even to England and Canada. Only in the past couple of weeks has he shown any real signs of settling down and getting a job to support himself. His parents are poor and his wanderings have been an extreme cause of anxiety to them. He went to San Diego with the intention of being near a sister of his and getting work. He stayed there just a couple of days. He signed on as a lay volunteer to a mission in Ontario, Canada and stayed there about a week and left without saying anything to the priest in charge. Arrangements were made for him to go to Gonzaga in Spokane but he didn't show up. He went to England with a view to working there and living with another sister of his until he could get settled down. He spent about ten days in England.

In an effort to get him to find his way outside the novitiate I have insisted that he not come here until he has gotten adjusted. He has been in Sheridan twice, contacted the novices who were studying at Monmouth, been with novices assigned to the retreat house in Portland, at Jesuit High School, and at Blanchet House. In his wanderings he regularly turns up at Jesuit houses all over the United States, Canada, and England.

I feel kindly disposed toward Phil but I am convinced that he simply has to prove to himself that he can operate as a man in the world before he can seriously undertake anything like a seminary. His insecurities find

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too much support in a novitiate and I am sure the same would be true in a seminary. He has never been able to hold a job for any length of time and he gives evidence of unreasonable fear of competing as an ordinary college student. His test scores show good ability although his academic record is not very good. In fact he should not have been admitted into the novitiate. There was a slip up in the registrar's office at Gonzaga where our candidates are processed.

I simply do not see how he could make a good candidate until after he has worked at a job for a fair length of time and at least completed some time as a college student paying his own way. My recommendation to him was that he try to enroll in a state school where costs would not be too high and work part-time to support himself. If he knew that there was a serious prospect of entering a seminary after a couple of years, this might be a helpful motive to him. I really think that he has the ability to do this if he will only settle down and do it.


Phil is still young enough that he could develop the maturity he needs to live an effective life. So far he has not done enough to further that growth. His present situation of living and working in Portland has been encouraging, but the time involved is still very brief.

Before admitting him into a seminary it will be essential that he be given careful psychological testing. If he has proven to himself and to you that he can handle a job and keep at it, if he demonstrates that he is able to concentrate and carry a regular college course, then he could turn into a good prospect.

If he could get hold of himself Phil could be a very impressive person. He makes friends easily and has a great deal of natural charm. He is very honest and open about himself and never gave me any occasion to doubt his sincerity. I have been quite firm with him at times and you can see that he still thinks well of me. That says a lot about his basic character. He is truly a loveable person and I hated to see him leave here to go out into a world that he is so poorly equipped to cope with. Not that he is lacking in personal resourcefulness -- his extensive travels without any financial backing is proof of that.

I suspect that this composite of facts and impressions is a bit enigmatic. He is a rather complicated person. The judgment of the three of us here is that he was not a suitable candidate for the Society of Jesus and we have given him no encouragement that he could be readmitted at a later date.

Recommendations: I would recommend that Philip's application be considered favorably, and I would feel the House of Studies is a good place for him at least initially. He indicated that there is a possibility that he might be drafted if he were not in school soon and that he cannot afford to enroll this Spring term without financial aid. This complicates the picture since my first judgement was to recommend a favorable response if he still wished to be considered following adequate performance at Portland State this Spring and Summer. I would thus suggest that this whole matter be discussed frankly with him and that he be accepted as a candidate.

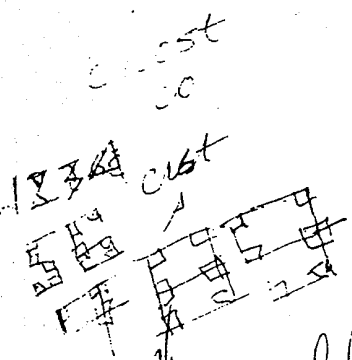
You mentioned that if this happened before school began you would write to inform them officially of the fact that I will be a seminarian studying for the priesthood in this Archdiocese.

Pat Frawley, junior, is involved in the Northwest Pilot Project under the direction of Father Paulson. Every week, Pat visits three elderly people in the Northwest part of town. He helps them in various capacities including getting them to doctors, arranging appointments with social workers and just visiting with them. This fits in very well with Pats' major of Sociology.

Larry Jorgenson, senior, is working in the Operation Plus program. This is a federal program administered through Portland State University. He tutors a student in English Composition several times a week. Larry is also planning for Theology next year as he will be graduating from college this spring.

Peter Meyer, sophomore, has been working at Friendly House. This is an after-school program for grade schoolers. It offers youngsters a chance to get together for organized games and outings. This program is operated in conjunction with Portland State University. He also works at Couch School in a similar program.

Bob Riler, freshman, has been working in the Portland State University television studio. He works as a camera man for televised classes and serves in several other capacities. During the basketball season, he was an assistant coach for the B team at Cathedral Grade School.

Pete Wiese, senior, is helping with the Holy Trinity Parish folk mass. He helps in getting appropriate music together for the celebration. Sundays, he lends his talented mastery of the guitar to the service.

Rick Paperini, freshman, is also working in the same Holy Trinity project. His ability is much admired in the parish. Rick has also been busy in organizing a tutorial program at St. Francis grade school. Through this program, students are given individual attention by volunteers from several nearby schools including Benson and Central High Schools.

Tom Yurchak, junior, holds down a part time job to help pay for his studies. He is a major in history. Tom has spent many hours coordinating the JACS program for Catholic Charities and has served on the film committee at Portland State.

Rick Sirianni, freshman, is majoring in political science. He works weekly with the Emmanuel Lutheran Church's after-school program. A part-time job rounds out a busy schedule for Rick.

Phil Steigerwald, sophomore, works with Rick Paperini in establishing this program at St. Francis. Together, they have spent endless hours in perfecting their programs. Phil also works part-time to help pay expenses.

Also at the House of Studies, there are two priests, Father Bertram Griffin and Father James Parker. Father Griffin works at the Chancery Office as a Canon Lawyer. Father Parker does counseling work at Portland State University through the Koinonia House (the campus Newman Center).

Philip entered the seminary from Portland State University where he received a Bachelor of Science degree this past year. He is satisfied with the academic program here but feels he needs more stimulation than the seminary environment is currently providing. He finds the rural setting less stimulating than the urban environment he was accustomed to at Portland State. He also finds the students more passive and less challenging intellectually. In view of these factors, he does not feel his performance was what it could have been during fall term, although he did B level work.

During Interterm Philip carried out a pastoral project at a parish in Eureka, California. He found the project very stimulating and was very happy with it. He feels that more involvement of the studentbody in social and political situations such as this is needed in the program. It would help students to make the academic program more relevant to ministry today.

Thus far he has found the academic program to be solid. He felt the need for more depth in the moral course, less student presentations in the scripture course, and changes in the methodology and teacher-student relationship in the psychology course.

I am happy with Philip's performance in the program and recommend him to the Board.





Philip has now finished his second term in our graduate program. His academic performance has been good. He has achieved a 3.22 cumulative GPA. Philip was late in requesting an academic interview, and due to my involvements I could not schedule such an interview. What is said in this report, then, is my own observation of Philip.

Philip is a person of considerable potential, academically and otherwise. I do not feel that he is achieving as much of his potential as he could be. I know that he finds weaknesses in the academic program. This is an accurate reflection of the situation. Philip, could, I feel, help to strengthen our program. He starts out with good intentions of doing so but has insufficient carry-through. This is an area I feel Philip needs to work on.

I recommend Philip to the Board and encourage them to work with him in actualizing more of his potential.

This report will be in the manner of summing up this academic year for Philip Steigerwald, reporting on progress and lack of progress, and on the projected future.

Philip Steigerwald has come to appreciate prayer, both private and public, to a greater extent than before he arrived at Mount Angel Seminary. This has been demonstrated by the increased amount of time that he spends in prayer, and by the amount of time spent discussing topics related to his prayer life. There is obviously room for growth in this area, but I am pleased with the progress that I have seen taking place.

Philip tends to be low keyed in his approach to life, taking the ups and downs of life at a slower pace than I myself do. He also tends to remain much less emotionally expressive than I, and this has led both of us in our talks to come to appreciate more the various life styles of other people. There may be some tendency in Philip, and also projected by others, to see him as functioning in an abnormally slow manner: "low energy levels." Although there may be some validity to this, I tend to see Philip rather as just having a pace of life that is more serene than the majority of people in our culture at the present time. Philip's weight and physical body-expression tend to reinforce others' views of him as slow. I tend not to view Philip in this manner, as mentioned above, and tend not to see heavy persons as slower.

Intellectually, Philip is quite fast and facile. He likes to deal with ideas and thought. It has been pointed out to Philip that he has very good intentions, but not much carry through at times. I connect this with his liking of ideas and thought because his interests in such things tends to make him see various aspects of reality and get caught up in the aspects at times, rather than getting on with the common, ordinary drudge of paperwork and reading and appointments, etc. This area of lacking carry through is perhaps the most important area for Philip to work on this coming year. There has been some improvement this year in this area, but there is a felt need on Philip's part to make more progress in this area.

Philip feels that the year has been very profitable for him. He is pleased with the development in human relationships with others, feels more at ease with the administration than at first. He finds that he does get bored (non-interested) in some areas at times, and would hope to have more challenges here.

I am happy with Philip's progress and would recommend him to the evaluations board with high recommendations.

This is Phil Steigerwald's second evaluation for this school year.

Phil has been rather dissatisfied with being at Mt. Angel Seminary. He would have preferred to have gone to a seminary in a more urbanized setting. This has tended to dampen Phil's enthusiasm in some ways. He approached his bishop, Archbishop Dwyer recently and asked if he might transfer to another seminary and the Archbishop told him that he didn't feel this was possible now.

Phil has taken this decision well and intends to carry on here knowing that this seems to be what the Lord wants for him.

I told Phil that my impression of him has been that he has fairly sizeable potential, but that he has a tendency to do more talking than doing. He recognizes that this is a weakness in himself, but feels that he has been trying to work at improving in what he does. He sees himself as improving at taking good initiative and pointed out several ways that he has been attempting to accomplish this.

Phil is creative in his ideals and is good at assessing situations. He tends to be quite progressive and flexible in his attitudes and thinks of himself as being a prayerful person. He likes spontaneous type of praying more than formalized prayer. He was one of the leaders in working up a new liturgy program that we have going this past Spring.

It is my hope that Phil will continue to develop in his practice as well as his ideas and that he will be able to work out what problems that he has in time.

Phil has been involved in two projects this year. He began with a youth club in Salem, The Exit. This involvement lasted until the end of the year. At that time, due to organizational difficulties with the project itself, our participation in it was terminated. Then Phil asked me what else there was to get into. After some delay he began to work with Father Sacco in Woodburn.

The success of the project in Woodburn has not been altogether total. There were some problems in getting started, created in large part by my office and the communication with the pastor. These were not great, but they did get in the way of Phil's involvement. This was worked through by a meeting with Father Sacco and the concerned students here and myself. Phil has seen a need for some sort of reflection periods apart from the Pastoral Counseling class, and for more active involvement by myself in his pastoral work. There were no reflection seminars scheduled this year, and I must take the blame for that. But that should be remedied this coming year.

Phil, in our interview, talked about his ability to relate to persons in a supportive way, when things are going well. But when there is something to say that is negative, he finds difficulty in initiating the contacts. This has been in the way of his more regular contact with me. I did not know this and so was not able to expedite more open communication. This is not to say however that Phil has not grown in his work in Woodburn. I feel hopeful that Phil will grow in his awareness of ministry and how he as a minister should function.

Phil has served in a variety of pastoral capacities during the past year: a coffee house for youth in Salem; parish work during inter-term, where he was involved in religious education, home visitation (including communion calls), and some instruction; Winter and Spring terms at St. Luke's Parish in Woodburn doing home visitations.

Phil chose to work this year at Salem Hospital with Chaplain E.T. Eberhart. He selected this assignment because of a desire to learn more about ministry to the sick and because of supervisory possibilities with Chaplain Eberhart. He is currently assigned to the OB-GYN section of the hospital which is located in the General Unit, some distance from the Memorial Unit where his two classmates are serving.

Phil feels that he needs a strong foundation in faith as a basis for his ministry and that there must be a congruence between what he does and what he says. He is struggling with situations where he is unsure of what to say. I encourage him to pursue this.

Phil sees one of his strengths in the area of liturgical leadership, particularly with groups that he knows. He enjoys working in this area of ministry. He feels some need for greater self confidence, especially in new situations. As he develops his ability to risk making himself available to others, his ministry will become more effective.

There are obviously areas of growth that need further development, one of which might be the difference between Phil's evaluation of himself and how others evaluate him, and Phil's reaction to this.

Phil came to Mt. Angel Seminary school of Theology after completing his undergraduate work at Portland State University while living in the Portland House of Studies. He is presently in his second year of theological studies in our school. Before entering the House of Studies, Phil had spent over a year with the Society of Jesus as a novice for the religious community. He left shortly after commencing his second year with them. His leaving was mutually acceptable to both Phil and his novice master with that community. The apparent reason for leaving was the lack of maturity to make that sort of commitment which the Society would demand.

Phil is 24 years old, the youngest of four children in his family. His parents live in Seattle and are encouraging his present decision to study for the priesthood. He gets along very well with his family although there are times of tensions between himself and other sisters. He is affiliated with the Archdiocese of Portland.

Academically, Phil is above average and is apparently producing at that level of performance. I believe that he could do even better with a more judicious use of his time, but I would not want him to study so much that he would then deprive himself and the community of his socialable nature. He gets along very well with all the members of the Theology School and is respected by the faculty as a whole.

It has been my observation in the time that I have been with this job that Phil tends to react or act in a very emotional fashion and this before he analyzes the total dimensions of his reactions and what these will entail by way of subsequent demands placed upon him. He admits that this form of reaction sometimes causes him a considerable amount of anguish and he is attempting to place some order in the process of action by thinking out situations before he commences or rushes into a response. This lack of pre-analysis leads him into some tensions within himself and with his peers and those in authority but he is trying to work the matter out. He could use and would appreciate any advice on this matter that the Board members could give him. Phil is still very much attracted to attending a theological school in a more urbanized area although that desire is not presenting the problem to him that it did last year.

Early in the year, I had to re-enforce in Phil the necessity to carry through to conclusion on areas of assigned or expected of him. He had a tendency to start things off and then presume that they would be taken care of by someone else. He has become most reliable and helpful in completing the things begun.

Phil is a very honest and frank young man and I believe has little hesitation in telling me where he is and what his feelings are at any given time. I deeply appreciate this form of open honesty and integrity. I would suggest that he discuss the above area of emotional responding with his spiritual director. He could also profitably analyze his social involvements to make sure that these are not too demanding upon him time and energy. He is an extremely social oriented person and he does get himself too involved at times which causes him some tensions. I believe Phil is making good progress at the present time and have every expectation to see further signs of growth as the year progresses.


Enclosed with this letter, you will find the evaluation reports for two of your students who were considered at a recent meeting of our Evaluation Board. The reports are the result of a personal and private interview which each student had with the Board members prior to the Evaluation meeting. The purpose of this letter is to give you a summary of what the Board's reaction was to these two students; i.e., PHILIP STEIGERWALD AND CHARLES AMSBERRY.

Concerning Philip Steigerwald, it was the feeling of the Board that Phil does in fact over-react in an emotional way. He gets himself into some rather tense situations by reacting to a given set of circumstances before he thoroughly analyzes what that reaction may bring to him by way of consequences. We did point this fact out to him and he is improving in his reactional release. He will continue to work on this major area of need-growth. Phil also has some basic fear of self manifestation of his whole person for such might effect his message and its acceptance. It was felt that Phil needs to take some risks with himself and his relationships with others in order to grow to a greater appreciation of his own self worth. It was generally felt that Phil is making good progress this year and he certainly manifests a greater peace and dedication than may have been present previously.

Charles Amsberry has just started his theological studies this year. He is spiritually and academically a fine young man and in many ways could be considered an "ideal" student. He is most cooperative and supportive and dedicated to the purpose for which he is here. He does tend to have a great deal of naivete about life and reality. He has been sheltered from many situations which other young men of his age would have lived through and thus experienced from them. Chuck tends to be a bit too passive and dependent upon others in his life and we have suggested that he attempt to become more aggressive and forceful in using the very good qualities that he possesses. We shall continue to work with this young man along these areas of growth. We are pleased with his dedication and sincerity to the purpose for which he is here.

If there is anything further I can answer for you regarding these young men or any of your students in this division, please let me know.

Most Reverend and dear Archbishop Dwyer:

Mr. Philip Steigerwald is considering the possibility of enrolling in a course of clinical pastoral education during the Summer of 1974. I am writing this letter in support of Mr. Steigerwald's request. I do so for several reasons.

I am personally convinced of the value of CPE as an educational program for men studying for the Priesthood. It provides a period of concentrated pastoral endeavor under qualified supervision. Its programs are so arranged that the student can focus on his growth in pastoral skills as well as become more aware of his personal strengths and weaknesses. It provides a forum where the student can integrate his theological background with his pastoral performance.

Mr. Steigerwald is in his second year of theological studies. His field education placement this year at Salem Hospital is one that he values because of the quality of supervision he is receiving and the learning opportunities in the hospital setting. I have talked with his supervisor, Chaplain E.T. Eberhart, and we both feel that Mr. Steigerwald would profit by involvement in a basic unit (10-12 weeks) of Clinical Pastoral Education.

I am in hopes that the Archdiocese will be able to assist Mr. Steigerwald in pursuing his request. If I can be of assistance to you in reaching a decision I will be most happy to do so.
