




This is Juan Diego's badge –also called *the Juan Diego badge*; named after Juan Diego Cuauhtlatoatzin.




Juan Diego's badge is one of two *badges* located in the lower left corner of *Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe*. To learn more, I encourage you to read *Killing Guadalupe*. You can also learn more in *The Wagers, The Elder Badge*, and *Steve's Top Secret Notebook*.


What follows are images found in the Juan Diego badge. I added outlines to many of the images, and added color to a few.






In the center of Juan Diego's badge, Juan Diego once held a perfect copy of Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe, until the badge was severely damaged by nitric acid, in 1820.





































Juan Diego's badge shows that the original Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe image was holographic -or lenticular- meaning it moved when you viewed it at different angles. This section of Juan Diego's badge shows the original 6-winged angel's head moved, as did the arch of the leftmost wing.












This is sort of how I originally saw the central image (although seeing some of the images within this image, correctly, took weeks). Later, I saw the image more as you see it on the next page (although, today, I see the eyes of the young snake-beast coming out of its parent's mouth, on the left, much smaller than depicted on the next page).
