Is a process, under the elected leadership, where local communities manage disasters



## What is a Disaster?

**Disaster** – dis-as-ter n.

- a. An occurrence causing widespread destruction and distress; a catastrophe
- b. A grave misfortune
- c. Informal A total failure

### **Technological**


human caused, unintentional

# What to Expect After a Disaster?

- Delayed emergency response
- No utilities
- No cell phone service
- Collapsed buildings, fires, road blockages
- Vulnerable populations at risk

# Local Establishment of an EM Program

- □ Pursuant to City Code of Ordinances, Secs. 2-27 2-45,
- Chapter 418 of Texas Government Code (Texas Disaster Act 1975),
- Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief Act,
- Homeland Security Presidential Directive (HSPD) 5,
- and other local, State and Federal authorities as applicable.







# Who is in Charge of a Local EM Program?

In Texas, the County Judge or Mayor is the Emergency Management Director



City of Lewisville Mayor Rudy Durham

May designate a person to serve as **Emergency Management**Coordinator to manage the Emergency Management Program

# Role of Elected Official During a Disaster

- Responsible for ensuring public safety and welfare of citizens
- Provide policy guidance on priorities and objectives based on situational needs and the Emergency Plan
- Oversee resource coordination and support to the on-scene command from the EOC or through dispatch

### **Authority to:**

- Declare a local state of disaster
- Evacuate or restrict the movement of people from a disaster area
- Suspend various procedural laws/rules
- Commandeer private property
- Obligate funds
- Implement price controls
- Commit resources
- Command resources necessary to protect population, stop the spread of damage, protect environment

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
# 4 Phases of Emergency Management

- Flood/Fire Insurance
- Update Building Codes
- Hazard & Vulnerability Analysis
- Critical Infrastructure Assessments
- Aging Infrastructure

- Emergency Management Plans
- Training and Exercises
- Public Education/Outreach
- Federal Grants










# **New CERT Program**

COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

- Free basic disaster survival training/equipment
  - Light search and rescue, disaster first aid and triage, cribbing, shut off utilities,

fire extinguisher, Incident Command, disaster psychology

- 20 hours classroom/skills training (Friday evening and 2 Saturdays)
- Check on neighbors or respond in coordination with OEM
- Opportunity for additional training



# **New NERP Program**

- The Neighborhood Emergency Response Plan (NERP) is a neighborhood community driven effort to promote community preparedness prior, during and after any large scale emergency or disaster.
- In the event of an emergency, City responders will be overwhelmed and cannot get to everyone right away
- Communities with strong connections with their neighbors are able to adapt to an emergency because of the willingness to organize and help each other



### Sample Drill #1

Planning Committee: Nancy Hernandez, John Smith, Robert Cooper, Joe Gonzalez

Drill Date: Saturday, November 15, 2014

Drill Start Time and End Time: 1:30 PM - 3:00 PM

Drill Location (Start Location/End Location): Nancy Hernandez home residence

Practice Emergency: (i.e., flood, ice storm): Tornado

#### Goal(s):

- All neighborhood members successfully understand their roles and responsibilities in case of a tornado.
- All neighborhood members have successfully received a test phone message with appropriate messages.

#### Objective(s):

- 1. Allow neighborhood members to identify their roles in case of a tornado.
- 2. Test the Communications Phone Tree.

Drill Description (What will happen during the exercise):

- Mock siren will sound
- Everyone will follow what is recorded on the Neighborhood Information Worksheet page\_\_\_(make sure everyone has a copy)
- Stay in the predetermined shelter until the "tornado passes" 15 minutes
- · After the "tornado" passed, go through priority one on the Neighborhood Information Worksheet
- Once priority one is taken care of move to priority two (refer to Emergency Signals and Tasks worksheet page \_\_\_\_)

Emergency: Tornado

Government level signal (news, radio, etc.): Weather reports

Neighborhood level signal (phone tree, bill board, etc.): Contact Tree prior to the tornado

What needs to be done? (Be sure to think about shelter type, checking in on each other, warnings, resources-food, water, etc., social distancing, etc.)

If there are any questions about any tasks, report to the Neighborhood Meeting Site. When all tasks are completed, report to the Neighborhood Meeting Site.

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

## 3. RESPONSE



### Steps to take during a disaster

- Monitor Severe Weather
- First Responders mitigate the incident using ICS
- Mutual Aid
- Evacuation
- Sheltering
- State deployment
- Special Events



# **Emergency Operations Center**

- Support field operations
- Obtain, provide resources
- Coordinate among agencies
- Maintain up-to-date information
- Monitor Special Events
- Request external assistance from other jurisdictions, state, federal organizations, public sector
- Coordinate with decision makers
- Provide Emergency Warnings and Notifications to Public











### **Emergency Notification System**

## 4. RECOVERY



- •Steps to restore the community after a disaster
  - Rebuild
  - Emotional Needs of Community
  - Activate Recovery Plans
  - Utilize alternate facilities that are in the plan (COOP)
  - Request Federal Funding
    - Denton County threshold\$2,4 million
