



Time To Dig Out Those Old Photos!

WHY OUR VILLAGE COULD BE CALLED JAKE'S TOWN RATHER THAN BROWNTOWN NOTE: This is the first of two articles – this one focuses on the time before Browntown existed as a village. The second article, which will appear in a future edition of this newsletter, focuses on the man (i.e "Jake") who actually built most of Browntown.

PART 1: In the early 1800s Gooney Manor (the area that encompasses most of the Gooney Valley) saw a small influx of settlers as land became available to lease or buy. Amongst these settlers were two brothers, Abraham and Samuel Brown, from Brownsville, MD., near Harper Ferry. (see map below) They, like many of these settlers belonged to a strict religious faith with roots in Germany. The Browns were members of the Church of the Brethren, or Dunkards. It is probable that they still spoke mainly German. Our Browntown did not exist when Abraham and Samuel and their wives (Mary and Abigail Jennings arrived in the Gooney Valley).



The main center of commerce in the Gooney Valley at that time was the small community of Boyd's Mill. The two brothers each bought land (101 acres and 89 acres respectively) two miles south of that community. The 1837 landowners list for Gooney Manor also includes a Rudolph Brown (190 acres) and George W. Brown (100 acres). We do not know much about Rudolph and George but it seems likely that they also came from Brownsville, MD.

Abraham and Samuel were farmers & mill owners, milling grain & sawing timber for neighbors. Abraham also owned and operated a Woolen factory. The precise location of those mills and the woolen factory remains a mystery but they were clearly in the area we know as Browntown.

Ironically, members of the Brown family prior to the Civil War did not refer to the area where they lived as "Browntown". Family letters (known as the "Hezekiah Brown letters") from the period 1843 to 1865 consistently refer to the area as "Old Gooney" or simply as "Gooney".

Both Samuel and Abraham and their close families moved west in the late 1840s, to Wood County VA (later WVA). Abraham never returned and died in Wood County in around 1850. Samuel would later move back to Brownsville, MD. He died there in 1853. An 1847 Winchester newspaper advert for a "Gooney Manor Woolen factory, formerly occupied by Mr. Brown" confirms that the name Browntown was still not in use at that time.

VIRGINIA'S 4 P.M. BURNING LAW NO LONGER IN EFFECT



A NEW COUNTYWIDE OUTDOOR BURN BAN MAY BE ISSUED AT ANY TIME IF CONDITIONS WARRANT IT

OUR SIGN IN THE CENTER OF BROWNTOWN WILL INFORM
YOU OF THE DAILY RISK OF WILDFIRES

NEVER BURN ON DRY OR WINDY DAYS BECAUSE IT IS EASY FOR YOUR FIRE TO SPREAD OUT OF CONTROL.

- Burn only yard debris. Open burning of any material that creates dense smoke or noxious odors is prohibited.
- Keep burn pile small or use burn barrel.
- Clear a 15' radius around a barrel and at least a 25' radius around a burn pile, Ensure no tree branches or power lines above. Wet down surrounding area before, during&after the burn.
- Always have water and fire tools nearby: a water-charged hose, bucket of water, shovel, and dirt or sand nearby.
- Stay with the fire. VA law requires that you monitor a debris burn continually until the fire is completely out.
- Extinguish the fire. Drown the burn pile with water, stir the coals&drown again. Repeat until fire completely out.

If the FIRE is beyond your control, STOP and CALL 911
