The Browntown Union Church, as it appeared in 1929

More on the Village of Browntown by Dan Pezzoni. This is from his draft of a survey done for The Browntown Historic District: 82 Browntown Road. Browntown Union Church. The church originally served Methodist, Lutheran, and Old and New School Baptist congregations on a rotating basis, hence the term "union church." The site was acquired from James W. and Zoe Boyd in June 1882 and the building is thought to have been built soon after. Most recently the Old School Baptists and the Agape Love Baptist Church worshipped here, but currently no congregation meets here and the Browntown Baptist Church serves as caretaker of the building. According to Renee O'Connell, the church was built by Jacob Masemer for \$1,600 and was dedicated November 10, 1882. According to longtime Browntown resident and former church trustee Sam Baggaly, the original steeple spire was removed in 1984. The current spire was added in 1996 through the fundraising efforts of Anna Rae Rudacille White in memory of Raymond H. Rudacille. When the church was dedicated it was said the bell had the sweetest ring in the valley. Far in the background, I believe we can see Effie Manuel's house.

On March 5th we experienced high gusty winds which took down the steeple on the oldest church in Browntown. Luckily no one was injured, and it appears the roof itself was spared any major damage. The belfry is now open to the weather, and hopefully that will be taken care of soon.

Reminder from Warren County Fire & Rescue, March 20, 2025

One year ago, Warren County, Virginia's tranquil landscape was transformed into a scene of devastation as several brush fires swept across the region. The blazes, fueled by dry conditions and strong winds, burned 120-plus acres, threatened homes, and tested the resilience of local communities.

"On March 20, 2024, reports of small fires quickly escalated into a full-fledged emergency. Strong gusts and a lack of rainfall created the perfect conditions for the flames to spread rapidly. Firefighters from Warren County worked to contain the inferno, facing treacherous terrain and unpredictable fire behavior. Many residents were forced to evacuate as the flames inched closer to their homes. Emergency responders acted swiftly, coordinating efforts to prevent loss of life and minimize property damage. A temporary shelter was opened at Rivermont Fire Department for residents to escape. Warren County Fire and Rescue worked into the night to contain the fires."

While nature slowly healed, the lessons from the disaster serve as a stark reminder of the power and unpredictability of wildfires. Remember, the Virginia 4 PM Burn Law is in effect through April 30th. No burning until after 4:00 PM; fires must be attended at all times, and no fuel should be added or fire started after midnight. Any fire should be completely extinguished before leaving it.

****Blue Mountain Subdivision and High Knob Subdivision are currently no-burn areas year-round.**

Red Flag Warnings have already been issued this year for areas west of the Blue Ridge, based on dry conditions, fallen trees, and low humidity "which may result in favorable conditions for the rapid spread of fires".

Alton W. Mathews 1913-1983

Mary McKinney gave me this photo of Alton, most likely standing on the tracks in Bentonville. I believe Alton, among other things was a farmer, landlord, storekeeper and auctioneer. I found a Warren Sentinel article today from 1963 that tells of a Mathews Reunion to be held at Dickey Ridge, 300 to 500 guests were expected for the event. According to Alton the first Mathews to arrive in Warren County was Alexander, in 1746. Alton estimated there were three or four thousand descendants of this family, at the time of this reunion, one of the oldest and largest family lines in Virginia. According to Alton, Alexander came to America in 1706, emigrating from Northern Ireland. One of his eight children, Benjamin remained in the South River District.
