GOONEY VALLEY HISTORY CLUB POSTAL DELIVERY IN THE GOONEY - PART 3

The Civil War Years: May, 1861 to April, 1865

Much of what happened in our valley during the Civil War years remains a mystery. Our only post office during the first half of the 19th century was Hambaugh's. William Boyd had become postmaster in 1825 and we know that he still held that position in 1850 and very likely until at least 1861 when the first rumor spread that Virginia had secended.

When the conflict between the northern and southern states finally exploded into war, tearing the country apart, the nation's communication system was also ripped in two. Postmaster General Montgomery Blair cut off mail service to the rebellious Southern states and the 3¢ US stamp was not valid in the CSA after June 1, 1861 when the Confederate Post Office took over mail service operations and 8,535 of the nation's 28,586 post offices came under Confederate control.

Hambaugh's post office disappears from the official record and presumably closed. 571 men from Warren County entered the Confederate army from Warren County, joining such units as the 49th Virginia Infantry (the "Warren Blues"), Mosby's Brigade, Chew's Brigade, and, the Ross' Brigade ("White Cavalry"). Many volunteered, while others were conscripted when the Conscription Act of April 16, 1862, made any white male between 18 and 35 years old liable to three years of military service. By February, 1864, conscription had expanded to men of 17 to 50 years old, for service of an unlimited period.

It was possible for postmasters to claim exemption from conscription but this does not seem to have made any difference with respect to Hambaugh's post office. When the Confederates listed the new postal route from Luray to Front Royal in April 1863 there was no mention of Hambaugh's and the nearest post office was listed as Bentonville. Times must have been hard for both white and black families living in the Gooney Valley during the war – most white men had gone off to war and sending and receiving mail would have required a long ride to Bentonville or Front Royal, with major delays in delivery and no guarantee that soldiers would be able to receive or send letters. It is not known how many enslaved people in the Gooney stayed and continued to work for their owners during those years.

After the war ended it took some time to get the US postal service working again. Hambaugh's post office was reestablished on October 4, 1867 with the new postmaster being James W. Boyd. On July 1, 1868 the postal route (No. 4667) between Front Royal and Hambaugh's was reinstated, with Charles Leech contracted to collect and deliver mail.

RECENT WILDFIRES - On March 18 an Elevated Fire Danger Warning was issued, followed by a Red Flag Warning on March 19. A day later Warren County Fire & Rescue reported multiple large brush fires caused by low humidity, high winds and downed powerlines. These fires overwhelmed local fire and rescue and law enforcement resources. Multiple buildings were damaged and several emergency responders sustained injuries.

WCFR reported on March 20 that "the County's emergency response system was operating on a "no units avail-able situation" and that evacuations near McCoys Ford Road were being implemented and an emergency shelter was opened at the Rivermont Fire Station. Crews also worked on a large fire in the Milldale area where approximately five homes were evacuated. A Local State of Emergency was declared at 8pm that evening.

WHAT ABOUT THE RISKS OF WILDFIRES IN OUR AREA?

The Virginia Dept of Forestry (VDF) has carried out a Community Wildfire Risk Assessment for Browntown and the Gooney valley (approx. 4,200 acres). Key results from this assessment are as follows:

- Total Assessed Rating 142 = High Risk
- Suppression Rating: <u>High</u> Hazard
- Surrounding Environment Rating: <u>High</u> Hazard
- Structures Rating: <u>High</u> Hazard
