Gooney Valley History Club

Jedediah Hotchkiss, Stonewall Jackson's Mapmaker and his work in Gooney Manor In March of 1862, Stonewall Jackson was retreating from the Battle of Kernstown, and he noticed a civilian who seemed to have control over a battalion of men who were balking at Jackson's orders. Jackson inquired and found that this civilian, Jed Hotchkiss, had skills that would be useful to the confederacy. He summoned Jed and told him, "I want you to make a map of the Valley, from Harpers Ferry to Lexington, showing all the points of offense and defense in those places." During that process Hotchkiss did an incredible job of mapping the valley, to include Gooney Manor.

The finished product can be viewed in its entirety at the Strasburg Visitors Center at the Hupp's Hill Museum. The map is about 50" by 100", and packed with information that would be important to a military commander.

Recently our Club found Jed Hotchkiss's sketchbook, which is online and gives us more info about what Gooney Manor looked like in 1862. One takeaway for me was the fact that when Hotchkiss came through our village, he wasn't sure whether to call it Brownton or Brownville, (not Browntown). In his completed map he opted for Brownton. You'll also note, in 1862 the center of Browntown was south of what I like to call Downtown Browntown, with James and Angela Keller's house at 5671 Gooney Manor Loop being the center of the village.

The second most prominent area within the bounds of this map is Boyd's Mill, which not only is a crossroads, but also can boast of a church and a mill. The church known as the Manor Chapel, was where folks from many parts of Gooney Manor would come to worship. Becky Poe mentions this church in her history of the first hundred years of the Browntown Baptist Church. I will point out at this juncture that Jed has a legend on one of the first maps in his sketchbook. Small squares indicate houses, unless otherwise noted, small squares with a cross on top indicate a church, circles with four spokes sticking out, indicate a sawmill, and that circle with 7 spokes sticking out indicates a flouring mill. Keep in mind Mr. Hotchkiss was on horseback while sketching and it appears to me sometimes his designation as a flouring mill might be wrong. I mention this in regards to a flouring mill being located near Win Smedley's house at 5811 Gooney Manor Loop, which we believe was the Brown Mill, which other documents suggest was a carding mill. Which is of some significance as this was the first carding or woolen mill west of the Blue Ridge.

Some other things about this sketch that interest me, are the two roadways on either side of the word Brownton, that lead to the east, then join as a bridle path. Then about halfway down that path, another bridle path heads east on a track that would pretty much match up with today's Smith Run Road. That bridle path heads to Gade's Gap, which today would be Jenkins Gap. One other name on the map that catches my eye is Grant. This name is associated with a store in later histories of Browntown. My guess, is that it was a store by 1862, and possibly the earliest store in Browntown.

There is a strong a high risk of wildfires will be with us again in 2024. Some lessons learned from the recent fir that volunteers can play a key role in establishing firelines and supplying food and water to fir that limited cell phone and internet service are one of the key challenges for those fighting wil tainous areas (like ours!).

The BEARR Group is proposing to make Wildfire Risk Management a top priority for 2024 beginning to collect ideas and information. Questions we hope to address will likely include:

- How to prevent wildfires and make our homes more fire resilient?
- How to prepare our community for a wildfire?
- How to protect yourself and your family during a wildfire
- What can we do to help our neighbors and community during a wildfire emergency?
- What to do after the fire: community recovery/returning home?
