1 lg. field		2 or 3 dogs
¹ / ₂ doz. Children		A bit of brook
		A few pebbles

Mix children and dogs together. Put on a field, stirring constantly. Pour brook over pebbles.

Sprinkle field with flowers, Spread over all a blue sky. Bake in the sun. When brown sit away to cool in a bath tub.

OPERATION TELEPHONE: PROVIDING PEACE OF MIND FOR THOSE WHO LIVE ALONE When you or a loved one is home alone for long periods of time, one call can make all the difference.

"Operation Telephone" is a free service offered by Warren County Sheriff's Dept to provide members of our community peace of mind. Participants are asked to call WCSD each day at 540-635-4128. If their office is not contacted by 3:00 pm, they call the person's home. If unable to make contact, one of their deputies goes to the residence to check on the individual. Also, there is an app (https://www.snugsafe.com) so that if you don't login by a set time each day, text messages are sent to your nominated contacts.

BEARR Group Officially Becomes a Standing Committee of the BCCA

At the April, 2022 BCCA monthly membership meeting a motion was made to acknowledge the Browntown Emergency Response & Risk Reduction Group, (BEARR Group), as an official *standing committee* of the BCCA. The motion asserted that the BEARR Group was first acknowledged in the February 8, 2021 BCCA public meeting, making that the actual date of the establishment of the "Group" as a standing committee. The motion was passed by a majority vote of the BCCA membership. BCCA President, John Bell, subsequently entertained a motion that the accounting for the high visibility 9-1-1 street address sign sales initiative be handled by the BCCA treasurer, in a separate account. This motion was also passed by the BCCA membership.

The BEARR Group will continue selling the signs as a BCCA fundraiser and will report their activities and achievements at BCCA monthly public business meetings.




