I'm Vaccinated. What's Next? What you can do to protect others

So, you received your second COVID-19 vaccine dose, what's next? If you're one of the lucky ones who's fully vaccinated for COVID-19, you're probably feeling hopeful that you're free of risk from the virus. Although you might be tempted to ditch your mask, gather with friends and family, and travel freely, CDC rules for protecting yourself and others haven't changed.

Until vaccines are widely distributed to most of the population, stay informed and keep yourself and others safe.

Keep your mask on: Even though it's tempting to return to life as you knew it, protecting yourself and others will continue to slow the spread, even if you don't get sick yourself. While others wait for the COVID-19 vaccine, you must continue practicing good habits. These include covering your mouth and nose with a mask when around others, staying at least 6 feet away from others, avoiding crowds, and washing your hands often.

Monitor any potential side effects: It's normal for some people to experience side effects after getting any vaccine. You may feel pain or have swelling on your arm or flu-like symptoms, such as fever, chills, tiredness, headache, throughout the rest of your body. They should go away after a few days, but if they don't, contact your health care provider.

Osborne Ott Baker went home to be with his Lord and Savior on Feb. 5, at Hidden Springs Senior Living in Bentonville, just 10 days after holding his wife's hand while she left her earthly home, Shirley reached down and took Ott's hand to join her in their heavenly home. Ott was born at home in Browntown, on Dec. 30, 1933, the son of the late Clarence Baker and Mozel Henry Baker. Ott attended Warren County Schools, graduating in 1953. Ott married the love of his life, Shirley Virginia Atkins on July 20, 1957. They started their married life in Arlington, for a couple of years before moving to Browntown. In 1970 they built "Farriers Knob" and lived there until moving to Hidden Springs in 2019. Ott and Shirley were never blessed with children but they had a very special relationship with Chris Manuel whom they thought of as a son. Ott was a member of Bentonville Baptist Church where he was affectionately known as the "Candy Man" to all that knew him. Ott and Shirley loved square dancing. They were members of the "Rivermont Ramblers" for many years. Ott started his career serving his country in the United States Army from 1954-1956. After that he worked at Hudson Supply Structural Steel Co.from 1957-1959. Ott was a self-taught farrier, applying his trade up and down the Shenandoah Valley for more than forty years. Ott had a team of horses that he trained himself. They could be seen hitched to his big green and red wagon in many area parades. He also had a beautiful sleigh and he and Shirley could be seen riding thru Browntown, the bells on the horses ringing loud for all to hear. Ott lost his wife of 63 years on Jan. 26.Ott is survived by his sisters, Nannie Sue Cornell, Beverly Stefko and Eleanor Weaver, a brother, Orivel Baker and numerous nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his sisters Helen VanderArk, Elizabeth Kailan and Ida Mae Hagen, and brothers Clarence Baker, Jr. and Norman "Teedle" Baker.

Hikes In and Around Browntown, by Denise Vowell

Last month we ran a list of 4 hikes by Carole Tomhave. This month we are running the first of 10 hikes by Denise Vowell. This hike would include the Jenkins Gap, and the Lands Run hike, from Carole's hikes, plus a trek along the Appalachian Trail.

Hike 4. Compton's Loop (Strenuous)

Distance: 9. 5 miles. Add 0.8 if both the Compton's Spur trails are hiked.

Elevation Gain: Approximately 1400 feet while on trails, not including the spur trails. This loop includes some walking on unimproved (dirt) country roads, as well as trails.

Directions: From BCC turn left onto Browntown Rd., and left again onto Smith Run Rd (about 0.1 miles from the BCC). Continue 2.2 miles until Smith Run Rd ends. Parking is available along both sides of the road, but avoid blocking the trailhead or any of the driveways. The first 0.2 mile is along private land.

Please stay on the trail. Red paint on the trees and white boundary signs will appear on your left, just before reaching the concrete post that contains trail information and marks the entrance to SNP. The trail is yellow-blazed, indicating that it is open to foot and horse traffic. You will notice some signs of the fire that burned in this area in 2011, but most of the trees remain. There will be several small stream crossings over the next half mile. All contain stepping stones that will allow you to cross. Use caution, as the stones may be slippery or tilt unexpectedly. As you walk along the trail you will see signs of the old wagon road, both on the trail itself, and off to the sides, in the places the trail was rerouted. A wide turn to the left marks a return to the wagon road, which continues uphill. There are several long switchbacks in this part of the climb. In the fall, winter, and early spring, at several of the switchbacks you can look down into the Browntown valley and see the church steeple in the distance. When the trail widens again, and skirts the side of a hill, the steepest climbs are behind you. When you have reached the intersection with the Appalachian Trail (the AT) in about 1.2 miles you will see a concrete pillar marking the intersection. Turn left, taking the white-blazed AT north to Compton's Peak. The trail is mostly level or gently uphill for about half a mile, then begins to climb more steeply. In the flatter area, the trail parallels Skyline Dr. and also shows some evidence of the 2011 fire. The mountain laurel and rhododendron thickets burned, but have largely rebounded. In about one mile, you will pass over a small spring fed stream. The trail continues to climb for a short distance, then levels out. In slightly less than half a mile from the stream, you will reach a concrete pillar marking Compton's Peak. However, the actual high point is along the blueblazed trail to the left (west).

If you hike the spur trails, you will add 0.8 miles to this loop. At the end of the spur trail to the left (west), there are several large rocks providing viewing points of the valley and the Shenandoah River. On the spur trail to the east (also blue-blazed), there is one very steep part on just before the basalt formation. Exercise caution particularly in wet weather. The columnar basalt formation (evidence of a very old lava flow) is said to be the largest one in SNP, and is best viewed from underneath. Continue along the AT heading north, and descend Compton's Peak. As you approach Skyline Drive after about a mile of descent, the trail becomes terraced. Cross Skyline Drive and continue down the AT for about 1/4 mile, before turning left onto the Dickey Ridge Trail, which is blue-blazed, meaning it is open only to foot traffic. In 0.1 mile, you will see Fort Windham Rocks on your right, looking as though some giant dropped a huge pile of rocks alongside the trail. How it was named is a mystery, but it does resemble a crumbled fortress. In about half a mile, you will reach the intersection of Dickey Ridge and Springhouse Trail. Continue on the Dickey Ridge Trail, reaching Skyline Drive in about 0.6 miles. Cross the drive to the Lands Run parking area, and turn left onto the Lands Run Fire Road. Continue down the fire road 0.6 miles to the Lands Run waterfall. View from the top of the falls are just before a metal culvert across the road; view of the falls from the side areon unblazed side trails to the right shortly after crossing the culvert. Continue down Lands Run Fire Road to the park gate, about 1.6 miles. Pass to the side of the gate and continue along Lands Run Road (VA 622), a pretty country road, 1.1 miles to the intersection of Smith Run Road. This road is wider and more frequently traveled than Lands Run Road. Turn left onto Smith Run road, and return to your car in 1.2 miles.

The virus has not gone away! Lord Fairfax Health district reports deadliest day of pandemic

Deaths related to the COVID-19 pandemic reached a new high in the valley on Monday as the Lord Fairfax Health District added 12 deaths, surpassing Friday's single-day high of 11.

The district reported new deaths in all six of its localities: four in Frederick, three in Winchester, two in Page and one each in Clarke, Warren and Shenandoah.

vaccination appointments provided by CVS.

Most of the CVS locations where vaccinations are available are in the southern-most regions of Virginia but if you are prepared to drive a long distance these may be an option for some of us here in Warren County

The Redbud Festival is still tentatively planned for April 24th More information and will follow later once we have organized the event for crafters, entertainment, duck race, bake sale and silent auction.


