

Iraveling by horse and buggy was slow, but you didn't hear of the accidents them as you do of an automobile new; only when a horse would run off with a buggy.

Father used to put shoes on his horses, and instead of that he has to huy tires to go on the automobile new. Iraueling by automobile is more convenient new then by horse back when mother and

there is gaing to be lead weather, and you sen't expecting if you do have a car now to protect the rain and snow from falling on you.



In old times mother and had had a light by taking a since of flannel cloth for a lamp wick and put the sierce of flannel in a sourcer of tallow and strike a match, and that save a light. They also had a light from the fire place enough for reading and crocheting at night.

Reople have nice comfortable mattresses to sleep upon these days. When mother first started housebeeping she went to the barn and gathered some straw and put it in a mattress cover and sewed it together, and had a mattress out of straw. That was hard work to beep the floor clean under the bed because the straw dust would fall down on the carpet. Some people don't realize the advantage of a cake of soap or a bot of washing powders compaining them with old times. mother


Redbud Festival

VIRGINIA'S 4 P.M. BURNING LAW NO LONGER IN EFFECT



A NEW COUNTYWIDE OUTDOOR BURN BAN MAY BE ISSUED AT ANY TIME IF CONDITIONS WARRANT IT

RECOMMENDED: Call Warren County Communications Center at <u>540-635-4128</u> to let them know <u>before</u> you start burning brush.

OUR NEW SIGN IN THE CENTER OF BROWNTOWN WILL INFORM YOU OF THE DAILY RISK OF WILDFIRES

Never burn on dry or windy days because it is easy for fire to spread out of control.

- 1. Burn only yard debris. Open burning of any material that creates dense smoke or noxious odors is prohibited.
- 2. Keep burn pile small or use burn barrel. Clear a 15' radius around a barrel and at least a 25' radius around a burn pile, Ensure no tree branches or power lines above. Wet down surrounding area before, during & after the burn.
- 3. Always have water and fire tools nearby: a water-charged hose, bucket of water, shovel, and dirt or sand nearby.
- 4. Stay with the fire. VA law requires that you monitor a debris burn continually until the fire is completely out.
- 5. Extinguish the fire. Drown the burn pile with water, stir the coals & drown again. Repeat until fire completely out.
- 6. **Call 911 immediatelyif fire escapes** or gets beyond your control; even a slight delay may be disastrous. Do NOT try to fight the fire unless it is small and you can do so safely and easily. Leave this up to the trained firefighters.
