# "Remembering Yesterday, Preserving Our Tomorrow" November, 2022

Last Month an article about a Browntown Picnic held in 1878, now an article about the Browntown Picnic, held in 1879.



# Warren Sentinel, Vol. 11, # 20, 22 August 1879, page 3:

Dear Sentinel: I seldom attempt to write for the public, first, because of incompetency, and for the further reason of a disinclination to bore editors and printers. However, as it is one of the duties of a local paper to inform its readers of all that is going on in the various sections of its county, I shall for the present forget my consideration for you and your co-laborers and tell you something of Browntown, its picnic, public speaking, etc. Browntown is located about ten miles from and in a Southwest direction from your county seat, in a basin formed by the peaks of the Blue Ridge. The adjacent lands are undulating, or to express myself more accurately, are broken, yet of average fertility, producing fine corn and rye. The village seven years ago would hardly have deserved that name, for it could only boast of three or four houses, a blacksmith shop and, in apple time, a brandy camp. Yet it has had the appellation of Browntown so long: "that the memory of man runneth not to the contrary."

The Browntown of today, however, is in fact a prosperous village; thirty or forty tasty dwellings now adorn the place with a population of from two hundred to two hundred and fifty, striding with all their energies to keep pace with Front Royal. All seem willing to accord this progressive spirit to the Cover Bros. These gentlemen have erected within the corporation limits a large steam tannery which has been remunerative to its owners, furnishing employment regularly to fifteen or twenty hands, besides distributing annually thousands of dollars to the bark peelers of the neighborhood. This enterprising manufactory is turning out about fifty sides of leather per day and has stacked upon its yard \$30,000 worth of tan-bark.

The people of this vicinity are a sunburnt, double-fisted, hard-working, sensible class, fond of fun. They will ride fifteen or twenty miles to attend a circus or a dance. They are in the habit of meeting annually to enjoy themselves at a picnic, and it was at one of these grand jollifications your correspondent had the pleasure of being on August 16th, and really a good time he had. On one of those shaded hillsides, too steep to climb except by the aid of bushes by which one could pull himself up as it were, some two hundred and fifty or more persons had assembled. A portion of the hill had been dug away and a platform as horizontal as the location would admit of had been erected, and this point seemed to be the center of attraction. On one side of the platform, leaning against a huge oak, sat two of African descent, with eyes shut, mouths open and feet patting, they, with banjo and violin, made music for a number of young and enthusiastic dancers.

About two o'clock dancing was suspended and feasting began, and such baskets of nice things will ever make the people of Browntown proverbial for something good to eat as they are for something bad to drink—we fear, however, many more picnics will exterminate Updike's Rocky Mountain Sheep.







# **2023** BROWNTOWN JULY4<sup>TH</sup>CELEBRATION – CAN WE MAKE IT HAPPEN?



A group of Revolutionary soldiers used to meet in Browntown every July 4th for many years to enjoy a festival, talk over their trials and shed tears of joy for the great victories they achieved and bequeathed for all coming generations. They would make an exhibition of the wounds they received during the clash of steel, and sing The Star Spangled Banner.

The tradition of a Browntown July 4<sup>th</sup> celebration was revived sometime later in the 20<sup>th</sup> century and was a regular event until 2010. The celebration included a parade, Bluegrass and Dixieland Jazz music, games, a cake walk, displays of crafts, a "Pony Plop" raffle, and even (in 1989) a belly dancer. Finally, at sunset, people would set up their chairs and enjoy a fireworks display.

Some of us would like to explore the possibility of reviving this tradition in 2023. It will take a lot of effort to make this happen but we are optimistic that "with a lot of help from our friends" we can start a whole new tradition of July 4<sup>th</sup> celebrations to be enjoyed by all.

# 2022 Browntown Christmas Lights


