Charles E. "Sonny" Cheeks Jr., 75, of Bentonville, Virginia passed away on Thursday, May 1, 2025 at his home. Sonny was born on July 9, 1949 in Marion, Virginia to the late Charles Sr. and Beulah McKinnon Cheeks. He was also preceded in death by his sister, Gloria Dodson. He graduated from Richard Montgomery High School in Rockville, Maryland in 1968 and retired from both IBM and Lockheed Martin. 

# GOONEY VALLEY HISTORY CLUB

#### WHY OUR VILLAGE COULD BE CALLED JAKE'S TOWN, RATHER THAN BROWNTOWN



NOTE: This is the second of two articles – the first (in the May 2025 Newsletter) focused on the time before Browntown existed as a village. This second article, focuses on the man (i.e "Jake") who actually built most of the historic buildings in Browntown.

The first known reference to a village called "Brownton or Brownsville" was in a Confederate Civil War Map prepared by Captain and Engineer Jedediah Hotchkiss in 1862. The map shows only about 11 houses in the village.

The name "Browntown" was first used in a local newspaper in 1870, although "Gooney Manor" continued to be the more common name for the Browntown area until 1874. In the late 1870s everything changed! Two 1879 articles in the Warren Sentinel declared that: "The village of Browntown seven years ago would hardly have deserved that name, for it could only boast of three or four houses, a blacksmith shop and, in apple time, a brandy camp.....Browntown is improving fast and now has a population of 155."

#### WHAT BROUGHT ABOUT THIS CHANGE?

In the early 1870s James Boyd began to sell half-acre lots along both sides of the Gooney, north of the mill, and a village was born which would soon become a major manufacturing center

In 1874 the Cover Brothers, two Lutherans from Pennsylvania, bought up huge tracts of land in the valley and opened a tannery which employed large numbers of workers. Besides the men who worked in the tannery, there were timbermen who cut the oak, peelers who removed the bark from the trees, and the teamsters who hauled timber, bark, and the finished products. Other factories that existed in Browntown were a hardwood factory, a stave factory, and a handle factory. There was also a cooper shop and a wheelwright shop, licensed distilleries and taverns, and up to three or four stores. In 1882, Old School Baptists, Missionary (Southern) Baptists, Methodists, and Lutherans purchased a lot and erected a union church. A decade later, the affluent Lutherans bought another lot and erected their own church.

In 1890, the Browntown School was relocated to the lot next to the union church and in 1907 a new school was built, that is now our Community Center. This industrial boom ended when the tannery closed and moved to North Carolina. Other factories also closed soon after, leaving only C.T. Edmonds woodworking factory which finally closed when Mr. Edmonds died in 1927.

SO WHY COULD "JAKE'S TOWN" BE A MORE APPROPRIATE NAME THAN BROWNTOWN? The reason is simple – most of the historic buildings that you see in Browntown today have nothing to do with the Brown brothers from Brownsville, MD. The man who built Browntown was Jacob ("Jake") Masemer, a Lutheran, born Hanover, Pennsylvania 1852, who moved to Browntown in 1871 as a single man. He was married three times & had 8 children and died in Browntown in 1925.

#### HELP AVAILABLE FROM WARREN COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE

EMERGENCY ALERTS- Want to receive emergency alerts for inclement weather alerts & other emergencies in Warren County? Warren County Sheriff's Office is partnering with Smart911™.

If you are interested in signing up for alerts, visit: smart911.com



Text-To-911 is the ability to send a "short message" (SMS) to 911 when you are unable to make a voice 911 call.

Texting provides a method for individuals to contact a 9-1-1 center for help in situations where their safety could be in jeopardy if they were to be heard speaking. It also provides individuals with special needs or who may not be able to speak, access to emergency services when they need help or want to report an emergency.

\*\*NOTE: Like other 911 calls, Text-to-911 should only be used for emergencies. While text to 9-1-1 offers an additional means to contact emergency services, voice communication is always preferred as the best form of communication.

If you try to send a text to 911 where Text-to-911 service is NOT available, you will receive a "bounce-back" message stating Text-to-911 is unavailable & you should contact emergency services by another means, such as a voice call or telecommunications relay services (the latter for those who are deaf, hard of hearing, or have a speech disability).

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His occupation is listed on his death certificate simply as "contractor", but during his life he was one of Browntown's most well-known farmers, builders, and merchants.

Although Jacob Masemer's name is unfamiliar inhabitants most of the current Browntown, his legacy can be seen in the many historic buildings in the village of Browntown, including the 1907 school building (now the BCCA), the Union and Baptist churches, the store O.J. Rudacille and the beautiful "Creekside" house at the corner of Smith Run and Gooney Manor Loop. Without Jacob, our beautiful village would not exist. So, step aside Abraham and Samuel. You got us started but there really is only one man who can lay claim to being the founding father of Browntown.
