Originally I wanted to write about Robert Johnson's great song, "Love in Vain' for the February 2019 CBS BluesLetter. What with Valentines day and all it seemed originally like an obvious choice for that specific February issue. But Johnson's "Love in Vain" is far from an obvious Blues or love song. It is far reaching in it's imagery. Additionally, the loneliness Love in Vain communicates is far removed from the Hallmark hearts and flowers of Valentine's Day. It is a classic Blues song.

First of all, Robert Johnson stands incredibly tall in the pantheon of Blues singers that came from the Pre-World War II Mississippi Delta. Johnson was one of the first true assimilators from that region of the country. He learned from local legends such as Son House, Willie Brown and Charley Patton and also studied recordings of artists ranging from Skip James and Lonnie Johnson, among many, to Big Band Jazz.

Robert Johnson's ability to play two or more guitar parts at one was a direct influence on Jimi Hendrix, among many. Keith Richards has aptly described Robert Johnson as having "four brains." Vocally, Robert Johnson was a chameleon. Part of that was his natural and applied gift, the other part of that was his youth. When Robert Johnson died, on August 16, 1938, he was only 27.

Yet, as an artist, Robert Johnson had a maturity far beyond his years. The themes of his songs reflect both his genius and his more obvious influences. Songs like, "Stones in My Passway, Hellhound on My Trail and Me and the Devil Blues" reflect an artist driven by forces that haunted him. But "Love in Vain" remains one of my favorites.

It is a song of unrequited love, one of the best. "Love in Vain" was was recorded at Johnson's last Dallas TX session on June 20, 1937. It was the last of of his original 78 RPM records that was released, posthumously, as "Love in Vain Blues" in 1939. In the final 1937 session, Johnson prefaced the recording of "Love in Vain" with the words.

"I want to go on to next one myself." That was the only recording of Johnson's speaking voice

The opening lines are some of the best in the Blues, almost cinematic in their scope, as and the scene was set;

"And I followed her to the station And I followed her to the station Well it's hard to tell, it's hard to tell When all your love's in vain

With a suitcase in my hand With a suitcase in my hand

All my love's in vain"

Johnson continues this visual with an emotional second verse talking about the train rolling up to the station and that he looked his lover "in the eye." There is a parting with Johnson concluding;

"Well I was so lonesome, I felt so lonesome, I could not help but cry All my love's in vain."

There is a magnificence in these simple lyrics to me, of things unsaid between two lovers. But the greatest verse for me is the third verse, where Robert Johnson sang heartbreakingly;

"When the train, it left the station When the train, it left the station Well the blue light was my Blues


With two lights on behind With two lights on behind And the red light was my mind

All my love's in vain"

In the last verse Robert moans, almost wordlessly, for a woman named Willie Mae. This song is one of great examples of heartbreak turned into art turned into transcendence. "Love in Vain" has a straight ahead accompaniment that framed absolutely perfect lyrics.

In total, Johnson did two takes of this song. But it is the first take that is the classic. Years later, in 1969, The Rolling Stones recorded a Gram Parsons influenced version of Actually, one of the best moments of their career. Also worth noting is Eric Clapton's version on his album, "Me and Mr. Johnson," released in 2004.

The thing that Clapton, the Stones, myself and so many others have gotten from Robert Johnson is the fact that every facet of the human experience is contained in his 29 songs. That is why he remains a pinnacle figure in the pursuit of Blues history, both past and future.



CBS and YOU!

Willie Dixon said it best: "The blues are the roots - everything else is the fruits" - and it's through your membership in the **Charlotte Blues Society** and other organizations like it that keep the plant growing strong.

That's even more important today than when Dixon, the most important bass player and songwriter in the golden era of Chicago blues, spoke the words. Even though the music we love laid the groundwork for every form of music that's evolved in the Western world, the blues have hit hard times and need your support more than ever to continue.

Sure, listen to TV commercials today and you'll hear the voices of **Etta James** or **Sugar Pie DeSanto** playing in the background, and you might see artists like the late **Lazy Lester** or **Andrew "Jr. Boy" Jones** pushing products. But even though the sound of blues interweaves with our daily lives, the music itself – and the people who make it– are being pushed into the background.

Mainstream artists make million\$ covering blues songs, but the blues itself has no place on the stage when it comes to the **Grammys**. The two awards blues artists do receive are handed out at a secondary event prior to the big show on national TV. With more and more legendary clubs – like Charlotte's **Double Door Inn** – closing each year, it's getting harder and harder for musicians to tour and put food on their families' tables.

But folks like YOU and organizations like this one provide a beacon of hope for future generations.

As someone who's been involved with blues societies in multiple states, this writer's come to understand how important your help at the grassroots level is. As members of the **Charlotte Blues Society**, you're doing a great job, supporting international and regional artists alike when they appear at shows, festivals and our own monthly events.

The force is strong here -- but we need your assistance to make it even stronger. It's a common adage that you can't feel the blues until you've lived them, and one glance around the room at our events shows that to be true. While there are some millennials and members of the Networking '90s, the crowd's much older.

We need to recruit the younger generation to keep the blues and the roots that feed it growing strong with your assistance. It won't take much of an effort. Simply invite a friend, neighbor or younger relative to tag along the next time you're coming to an event – and let the music work its magic.

Every member of the **Charlotte Blues Society** is here for a reason. The sounds definitely strike a positive chord in your soul.

If you've got time and energy to spare, we really could use more your assistance: Anything and everything from recruiting new members, as detailed above, to working with board members in setting up and staffing events or even volunteering to become a member of the board itself.

Alligator Records president Bruce Iglauer considers Kingfish a natural fit for the blues and roots label. "At the age of 20, Kingfish is one of the most exciting and passionate young artists I've seen in many years. He's creating new music that feels like blues but doesn't copy what's already been done. His roots are firmly in the Mississippi Delta, and you can hear that raw Delta honesty in his playing and singing. His guitar work is technically dazzling, but it's all about the emotions of the song and moving the audience. He's perfectly capable of crowd-pleasing shredding, but his music is remarkably mature. He knows which are the important notes, the notes that tell the story and grab the audience, and he leaves out the extraneous ones. He sings with the intensity and directness of a seasoned blues artist. He venerates the blues masters of the past and present but is eagerly making his own statement, inspired by the music they created. I'm watching him become a young, visionary blues giant. He has an amazing future ahead of him, and I'm proud that he's joined the Alligator family."

Sprung from the same earth as so many of the Delta blues masters, Kingfish comes bursting out of Clarksdale, Mississippi, just ten miles from the legendary crossroads of Highways 61 and 49. A student of the Delta's musical history, he is acutely aware of the musicians and the music that emerged from his corner of the world. "I do think I have an old soul, that I've been here before," he says. "I'm moving forward with one foot in the past. You don't see too many kids into blues music. In my town, every kid wants to be a rapper – I wanted to do something no one else was doing." And although he grew up near the crossroads where Robert Johnson allegedly cut a deal with the devil, Kingfish insists he didn't do any of that to make his guitar howl the blues. "I just practice all the time," he says, "that's the only deal I made, and it's with myself."

With the release of KINGFISH, Christone "Kingfish" Ingram is ready to blaze a trail with the blues torch that's been passed to him. With his eye-popping guitar playing and his reach-out-and-grab-you-by-the-collar vocals, Kingfishdelivers each song with unmatched passion and precision. Steeped in the rich, vivid history of the blues, he's driven by his burning desire to create contemporary music that speaks to his generation and beyond. Kingfish is inspired by the music of Robert Johnson, but dreams of one day collaborating with Kendrick Lamar and soul-funk bassist Thundercat. "My core is blues," he says, "but it's important for me to create a sound and style that is uniquely my own. I have a lot to say, so please stay tuned."

Kingfish will be performing in concert across North America. He will be headlining his own shows as well as opening select dates for Buddy Guy and Vampire Weekend.

Legendary Rhythm & Blues Cruise #32: Heartbreak and Joy



The February sailing of the Legendary Rhythm & Blues Cruise left Fort Lauderdale, Fla., with a markedly different attitude this time around despite the presence of 85-year-old teenager Bobby Rush, Victor Wainwright & The Train, The Lowriders (formerly known as War), Taj Mahal, Lil' Ed & The Blues Imperials and dozens more.

The majority of the 2,800 passengers had looked forward eagerly to seeing Welch-Ledbetter Connection for the first time as they breathed new life into West Side Chicago soul-blues. But they were still in shock after the sudden passing of Mike Ledbetter a week before at age 33.

Usually the world's largest dysfunctional family reunion, the first few hours aboard resembled a wake more than a party. Folks who knew Mike well, this writer included, were already cried out when we boarded. The hugs we shared with his partner, guitarist Monster Mike Welch, and their extended families were long, profound and deep.

For those who only knew him through his music, however, tears flowed.

But music – and the blues in particular – is a healer. And once Danielle Nicole kicked off the sail-away with special guest Latimore, feelings of sorrow began to fade as cruisers quickly realized that the week was truly going to be a celebration of Ledbetter's life, not another funeral.

That emotion was never more evident than when the Connection took the stage. Welch's powerful solos – both with his own group and during numerous guest appearances throughout the week -- conveyed his innermost emotions at losing both his musical partner and his best friend.

In Mike's absence, a pair of very special guests assisted in lightening the mood: two of Ledbetter's favorite vocalists -- Curtis Salgado and Andrew Duncanson. One of the most melismatic vocalists on the planet and front man for Kilborn Alley Blues Band, it was Andy who inspired him to abandon opera for the blues. As the evening progressed, the mood brightened dramatically as Janiva Magness, Mark Hummel's Golden State-Lone Star Revue, Dwayne Dopsie & The Zydeco Hellraisers, Irma Thomas, Tommy Castro & The Painkillers, Popa Chubby, Taj and Lil' Ed took to various stages.

The party atmosphere set in completely by the ship stopped in the Bahamas the next morning and built in intensity as Tom Hambridge & The Rattlesnakes, Tab Benoit, Vanessa Collier, Kenny Wayne Shepherd, Rush, Indigenous and Phantom Blues Band took charge.

With stops in St. Thomas and St. Martin and a piano bar featuring the Rev. Billy C. Wirtz, Leon Blue, Dave Keyes, Kelley Hunt and others, cruisers danced til they dropped.

While Ledbetter's absence remained a factor throughout, there was reason to rejoice, too. The voyage was a coming-out party for the new generation of blues superstars in waiting – young men who still don't have albums of their own.

Just 20 years old, Christone "Kingfish" Ingram took the ship by storm, delivering guitar runs that can only be described as a cross between Luther Allison and B.B. King. And acoustic guitarist/vocalist Jontavious "Quon" Willis -- only 22 and mature far beyond his age – breathed new life into songs recorded long before his grandparents were born. And soul-blues lovers had reason to celebrate, too. The Keeshea Pratt Band blew the back off of it and proved beyond a doubt that their win at the 2018 International Blues Challenge was no fluke.

Usually, when the ship returns to port, most cruisers are shedding tears because they don't want to leave. Like the first day, however, the last night was different: There were smiles all around.

Everyone agreed that Mike Ledbetter can never be replaced, but there are rising stars in his wake and the music we love will remain vital long after most of us are gone.

Big Al and the Heavyweights – World Full of Trouble (EllerSoul Records ELL 1811) www.bigal.net

Originally formed by Big Al Lauro and Warren Haynes as the Unknown Blues Band in 1993, the Heavyweights are based in Louisiana and deliver a tasty stew that infuses blues, zydeco, jazz, country and more. They're augmented here with contributions from Jason Ricci on harp and Bob Margolin and

John Lisi on guitars.

The disc fires out of the gate with Ricci opening the title cut, but quickly reduces to a simmer throughout the all-original set. Highlights include the rock-steady, horn-driven shuffle "Fool For You," the burning ballad "Testify" – about love won and lost – and "Mother Trucker," a country-flavored pleaser that comes complete with steel guitar.

A little soul and much, much more – all delivered with Southern

flair.





Ina Forsman – Been Meaning To Tell You (Ruf Records RUF 1262) www.inaforsman.com

A star in her native Finland since age 15, Ina Forsman burst onto the international blues scene with her debut CD in 2016, displaying one of the most unique, melismatic voices on the planet. This alloriginal follow-up proves that she's no one-shot wonder. Like her first album, this disc was recorded in Austin under the direction of legendary tenor sax player/producer Mark "Kaz' Kazanoff with a stellar lineup that includes the sensational Laura Chavez on guitar. Several of the tunes feature rapid-fire lyrics delivered in perfectly unaccented English. Although that closely mirroring rap, they remain comfortably within the soul-blues format

Highlights include the ballad "Be My Home,' a paean to partnering up to overcome hard times, "Get Mine,' a funky soul-blues, and "All Is Good,' an old-school soul blues that expresses her appreciation for the acclaim she's already enjoyed. Powerful modern blues, and strongly recommended.

Shaw Davis & The Black Ties – Tales From The West (Self-produced CD) www.shawdavisblackties.com

Based out of Pompano Beach, Fla., Shaw Davis & The Black Ties are a powerful New Age rock-blues trio that delivers their music at the extreme high end of the scale. Still in his early 20s, Davis is a picker with a stinging attack that serves up a never-ending fuselage of blistering single-note runs. His rhythm section – bassist Patrick Stevenson and drummer Bobby Van Stone – is equally intense. This release includes seven originals and covers culled from the catalogs of Frank Zappa and Hill Country legend Junior Kimbrough. A flurry of low-register notes kick off the stop-time "Take My Hand" before a faithful take on Zappa's "Willie The Pimp" while "Tales From The West."

Other offerings include the fan favorite "Mamma Told Me" and "Know Where You Been." If your tastes run to over-the-top blues-rock with strong heavy metal overtones, you'll love this one. If you're a blues traditionalist, however, there's little if anything here

for you.





Delta Moon – Babylon Is Falling (Jumping Jack Records 12018) www.deltamoon.com

captured top honors in the International Blues Challenge in 2003 and remain at the top of their game with their tenth release -- a double-barreled mix of bottleneck slide and lap steel guitar and tunes that are both topical and thought-provoking. Fronted by guitarists/tunesmiths Tom Gray and Mark Johnson, they blend a Delta feel with Southern rock and roots. A haunting chord and spare rhythm opens the Hill Country-flavored "Long Way To Go," which offers a shoulder to lean on for the long journey ahead. Although never specifically mentioned in the lyrics, it could refer to social upheaval and the struggle for racial equality. It ties in neatly with the title song, "Babylon Is Falling," a funky, modern remake of a traditional gospel number.

Delta Moon represented the Charlotte Blues Society when it

Don't miss Delta's remake of "One More Heartache," a 1966 hit for Marvin Gaye. Stripped of its Motown feel, the emotions – and tears – still come through loud and clear. Slide lovers will be drawn to the original "Little Pink Pistol."

Big Joe & The Dynaflows – Rockhouse Party (Severn Records CD 0074) www.bigjoem.com

Veteran vocalist/drummer Big Joe Maher teams with Nashville heavyweight producer player Kevin McKendree for this rocksolid CD, proving once again that he hasn't lost a step in a career spanning back to the '60s.

Based out of the Washington, D.C., area, the Dynaflows deliver blues and R&B on five originals and eight covers -- aided by three-time Blues Music Award winning bassist and vocalist Mookie Brill and McKendree on keys.

Four familiar covers gathered from the catalogs of Roosevelt Sykes, Little Milton, O.V. Wright and Dave Bartholomew open the action before the original ballad, a"World Gone Wrong," a sly political statement that suggests simply that people are angrier now and things aren't the way they used to be. Other highlights are the stop-time pleaser "Go With The Flow," about picking up a lady in a brand new Dynaflow, the loping "I'm A Country Boy," which sings about the perils of city life, and the jazzy "Sleepy Joe."

While Rockhouse Party doesn't cut much new ground, it's as comfortable as an old pair of slippers on a chilly night and perfect for any blues lover with old-school sensibilities.



Marty Gunther has lived a blessed life where the blues is concerned. A native Rhode Islander now based in Charlotte and App State alum, his first experiences with live music came at the feet of first-generation blues legends at the Newport Folk Festivals in the 1960s. A professional journalist and harmonica player whose work appears in Blues Blast Magazine and other outlets, he was a longtime member of the Chicago blues community before founding the Nucklebusters, a band that's been entertaining South Florida since 1987. Marty is also a member of Charlotte Blues Society and on the Board of Directors of CBS.







BLUES JAM GUIDELINES

Blues Jam Guidelines and Courtesies Charlotte Blues Society Blues Jam.

You are participating in a tradition that is over 25 years in the making. The Charlotte Blues Society has consistently promoted a Blues Jam as part of its Blues Sunday. The Charlotte Blues Society's Blues Sunday occurs on the first Sunday of each month. The Blues Jams do not happen at every Blues Sunday. Always refer to charlottebluessociety.org for details and schedules. We hope your experience will be inspiring and that your own musical abilities will be informed by these jams.

We offer the following guidelines to consider when signing on as a participating jammer:

*A practical suggestion, sign up early. On the sign-up sheet please list your instrument and/or ability that you wish to contribute to the Jam. While the Blues has a lot of variations, please be advised this is a Blues Jam. Please keep it real ladies and gentlemen.

*Be respectful of any equipment that you use, backline and PA, treat it as your own or possibly better than your own. If you have a special amp, pedal or set-up that you need to use, remember guideline #1; Come early

*Keep track of your place on the sign-up sheet. It is not up to the Jam Master to track you down when your time to shine arrives.

*Please be advised that you need to be tuned and ready BEFORE you get on stage. Additionally, if you are a guitarist that tunes down a half step, please note the House band will be tuned to standard 440. Two choices remain, either tune to 440 or make allowances in your choice of a chord voicing.

*If you only hear yourself on stage, perhaps you are too loud. Likewise, if you hear everyone else, but not yourself; turn up.

*Be respectful of your fellow musicians, no matter what their ability may be. Everyone usually starts at the same place.

*In regards to soloing, again please be respectful of other musicians in the jam. For example, rhythm guitar is not just something to waste your time on while you wait for your next solo. One of the lessons of a Blues Jam is to learn how to be as apt an accompanist as you hope to be as a soloist. The Jam Master will be generous with solos, but be mindful of other musicians that may be waiting to jam.

*Lastly, have fun. Also respect the traditions as well as the innovations of the Blues. Likewise, respect the Charlotte Blues Society and The Rabbit Hole for providing the space and equipment for you to jam.

We are fortunate to have an experienced blues man and great "Jam Master" in Michael Ingmire. Help him make it a great jam by following our guidelines. No matter what degree of experience you have, Michael will help make your first, and every jam, one that is fun and make you want to come back for more!




