Mac Arnold was the bass player in the 1966 lineup of the Muddy Waters band that included Luther Johnson, Sammy Lawhorn and Muddy on guitars, Francis Clay on drums and Otis Spann on piano. After moving on from Muddy Waters (with a standing invitation to come back anytime), Mac's next band, the Soul Invaders, backed B.B. King, Jr. Wells, Tyrone Davis, and many others. When Mac moved to Los Angeles in the early '70s, he joined the house band at Don Cornelius's Soul Train television show. He moved back to his native South Carolina in the '80s. After a period of relative musical inactivity, Arnold returned to the fore in 2005 with Plate Full O' Blues. "Give It Away" is their 5th album to date.

Wed., 10/12 (9:00) Joe Smothers & Jack Lawrence (\$10 / \$12)

Roots and Americana innovators who toured with the late Doc Watson .

Fri., 12/14 (9:00) The Nighthawks (\$14)

A younger Mark Wenner did not know there were rules against mixing Blues, R&B, honky-tonk country, doo-wop, and rockabilly into one delicious stew. But that's what he did when he formed The Nighthawks, a band based on American roots music.

Wed., 10/19 (9:00) Kara Grainger (\$12 / \$15)

This Aussie soul slinger is known for her groove-rooted sound and mean slide guitar, her sultry vocal melting hearts and minds. Influences are the sounds of Stax recordings in Memphis and by the Funky style of blues and soul from New Orleans.

Thurs., 10/20 (9:00) Tinsley Ellis (\$15 / \$18)

Ellis wears his Southern roots proudly, and it is most evident on his latest album, "Tough Love," wherein he blends the red clay soul of those who came before him with the finely honed power of blues guitar and heartfelt vocals.

Fri., 10/21 (10:00) Flow Tribe (\$12 / \$15)

The band has spent the last 12 years refining a sound that blends many rhythms with the soul of New Orleans, their hometown. They've toured from California to Key West, giving rollicking performances and building a loyal fan base along the way.

Thur., 10/27 (8:30) Tommy Castro & The Painkillers (\$15 / \$17)

During his 40-year career, Castro has played thousands of shows, packing dance floors, and always leaves 'em screaming for more. Castro is a fierce road warrior who fervently delivers his driving, blues-soaked music to fans all over the world.

Fri., 10/28 (9:00) Patrick Sweany (\$15)

Sweany is a musical omnivore, devouring every popular music sound of the last 70 years, and mixing them together into his own stew. He swings through blues, folk, soul, bluegrass, and maybe some classic '50s rock.

Sat., 10/29 (9:30) Halloween Party with Randy Franklin & The Sardines (\$10 / \$12)

In high school, Randy began jamming with local bands and performing solo throughout the Charlotte area. He has played honkytonk country rock and originals, then later formed his own band playing "bluegrass-meets-high-energy-rock-n-roll." The foundation was soon laid for Crisis, When he isn't touring with Crisis, he still enjoys performing solo shows in the Charlotte area.

The Monday Night All-Stars Every Monday Show: 10:00 \$5 at the Door

The All-Stars have been one of the most consistent surprises on the Double Door Inn music calendar. Their set list runs the gamut from Bob Marley to Earth, Wind & Fire. A diverse, and often large, crowd will dance and sing along, sometimes dropping their jaws at the talent that's present on stage. They don't call them "All-Stars" for nothing.

CONFIRMED — BLUES ALBUM FOR DECEMBER



Remember when Eric Clapton was spotted recording with the Rolling Stones over the summer? A source close to the band revealed, "Eric was in the next studio alone so he came in to say hello," and "they ended up jamming and recorded two songs." The source added that producer Don Was said it was "the best thing he has ever done with the Stones."

While the Stones have yet to confirm the new music, they've been dropping some major hints on social media, most of which point to the blues. One day, Mick Jagger tweeted out a photo of a harmonica case with Rolling Stones picks thrown in, and cleverly captioned it with the hashtag #playingtheblues. Another day, he tweeted out "rehearsing something new." Next, the band swapped out their classic red tongue logo for a blue one, across their entire online presence.

In a recent French interview, producer Was confirmed the genre of the album, and revealed that it is scheduled to be released this December. "The album consists of covers of blues

songs of Chicago," he began. "It was recorded live in the studio in just three days, with the musicians in a circle around the microphones. There was no retouching on the pieces. The record sounds very crude, very authentic. It captures the essence of what they are."

Last month, international Blues celebrity Abe Reid helped celebrate the culmination of the southern book tour for "Bars, Blues and Booze: Stories from the Drink House" with author Emily Edwards. Reid is one of many musicians contributing stories to the collection, which features wild, gritty tales from blues artists whose careers navigated the crossroads of southern liquor laws, spirituality, race, and the music of a rich southern vernacular.

Author Emily Edwards collected the stories that give the "blue collar" musician a wild, gritty glamour and emphasize the riotous freedom of fans that sometimes risked the strong arm of southern liquor laws in order to chase the good times.



LOUISIANA ACCORDIONIST BUCKWHEAT ZYDECO

Musician Stanley "Buckwheat" Dural Jr., who rose from a cotton picking family in southwest Louisiana to introduce zydeco music to the world through his namesake band Buckwheat Zydeco, died on Saturday, Sept. 24. He was 68.

Dural gained fame by introducing zydeco music of southwest Louisiana to the world. "This is one of the world's true genius musicians. A completely natural musician who could just fit in in any scenario," stated Ted Fox, Dural's manager.

But Dural took zydeco music mainstream, launching a major-label album — the Grammy-nominated "On a Night Like This," — with Island Records in 1987.

He went on to jam with musical greats like Eric Clapton, play at former President Bill Clinton's inauguration, and perform at the 1996 Olympics closing ceremony in Atlanta.

He jammed with Jimmy Fallon on the final episode of "Late Night with Jimmy Fallon." Fallon played the guitar backed up by the Roots while Buckwheat Zydeco rocked the accordion – just another example of how he brought zydeco to unprecedented new audiences.

Dural earned his nickname because he had braided hair when he was younger that resembled Buckwheat from The Little Rascals television show. His father played the accordion but the younger Dural preferred listening to and playing rhythm & blues and learned to play the organ. While Dural was internationally famous for his zydeco music he was also an accomplished R&B artist and a diverse musician.



By the late 1950s he was backing up musicians and eventually formed his own band. In 1976 he joined legendary zydeco artist Clifton Chenier's Red Hot Louisiana Band as an organist, launching an important musical turn in his career. In 1978 he took up the accordion so closely associated with zydeco music and later formed his own band called Buckwheat Zydeco.

His manager called him an "oldfashioned showbiz professional" who was always focused on giving

the audience — regardless of either they were eight or 80,000-strong — a good time. He described one evening in 1987 where Dural took the stage during a concert where legends Clapton, Ringo Starr and Phil Collins were already jamming. Playing a Hammond B3 — a multi-tiered organ — Dural got into a back-andforth jam with Clapton, who eventually turned around, stuck out his hand to Dural and said: "Hi! I'm Eric Clapton. Who are you?" The two went on to tour together, including a 12-night gig at London's Royal Albert Hall."


He had this incredible charisma both onstage and personally," Fox said. "To the end of his days with all the stuff that he'd done, all the awards, he was still the same Stanley Dural Jr. who was picking cotton when he was 5-years-old."

Some people described Dural and his music as **Cajun**. The term generally refers to the French-speaking Catholics expelled from Nova Scotia by the British during the 1700's who eventually settled southwest Louisiana, although it's often used to refer more generically to French-speaking people in the area regardless of where they're from.

But Fox said while Dural loved Cajun music and often performed with Cajun musicians, he was very clear that he and his music were **Creole**, to the point where Fox said he even included in contracts language explaining that he was not Cajun.


Joanna Connor — Her First Studio Release in 14 Years

Slim Harpo: Blues King Bee of Baton Rouge (A Biography from LSU Press)

Slim Harpo finally gets a full biography thanks to a new release by music journalist Martin Hawkins. Slim Harpo: Blues King Bee of Baton Rouge delves into the history of this Baton Rouge performer whose work formed the foundation for the city's blues scene and was later covered by the Stones, Muddy Waters, Pink Floyd, the Kinks, Van Morrison, and dozens more.

As Louis Armstrong forever tethered jazz to New Orleans and Clifton Chenier fixed Lafayette as home to zydeco, Slim Harpo established Baton Rouge as a base for the blues. In the only complete biography of this internationally renowned blues singer and musician, Hawkins traces Harpo's rural upbringing near Louisiana's capital, his professional development fostered by the local music scene, and his national success with R&B hits like "Rainin' in My Heart," "Baby Scratch My Back, and "I'm A King Bee," among others. Hawkins follows Harpo's global musical impact from the early 1960s to today and offers a detailed look at the nature of the independent recording business that enabled his remarkable legacy.
