HOW IMPORTANT WERE MENTORS IN YOUR JOURNEY

I have been lucky to have good mentors throughout my career.

One of my earliest mentors was my 4H leader, Mary Jane Beer. When my dachshund passed away unexpectedly, she let me train and show her golden retriever. I decided that I really wanted a golden of my own so Mary Jane made me earn the money to pay for it by grooming, helping out with boarding, and all kinds of odd jobs at her place. Even though it was far away, I rode my bike there every day until I could buy my own golden. I continued to train that dog and did well, even going to Rose City Classic when I was 14.

My own husband, Paul, has been a big supporter and a cheerleader in my journey. When we met, I had not been participating in dog shows for a while but he had a dalmatian at the time. I talked him into letting me train his dog for obedience trials. The dalmatian was well trained and even earned his CD. That experience brought me back to the sport.

After I got my border terrier, it was really Charlotte Ware that made me feel comfortable competing at shows the level of Westminster. I didn't really know any of the other Border Terrier handlers. Charlotte introduced herself to me and said something that I'll never forget: "We need to be nice to each other because we are doing what we love."

I enjoyed the Newfoundlands immensely, I did obedience, draft work, water rescue. I even had the Newfoundland pull children around in a cart at different venues.

After going to several events by myself, I decided that it would be easier to show with something smaller. My first choice was a working dog and definitely not a terrier. However, I did the research and found the border terrier. I encouraged my friend to get one (I have great friends) and she did. When we babysat her dog and I saw how good he was with my sons, I was completely hooked.





WHY DO YOU COMPETE IN CONFORMATION?

It is our way of traveling and seeing the country. When we go to these different shows, we go with friends – It's a vacation on a leash. We meet a lot of people along the way and at the shows.

I've been doing this a long time and it is still fun. I enjoy getting the dogs looking their best for a show. I love the down times when we sit outside our motor home and share a beverage or have a cookout.









DESCRIBE WHAT IT WAS LIKE WHEN YOU WON BEST OF BREED IN 2015

I could tell that it was between me and another well-known border terrier handler just by way the judge kept looking over Turbo and her dog. I worked the dog the entire time we were showing and in the end, the judge picked Turbo.

When Turbo won, I was sequestered with the other breed winners and taken to Madison Square Gardens. Paul ended up doing the media interviews with Turbo. He totally lucked out because his interviewer was a huge football fan in Oregon. When asked what Turbo likes to do in his off time, Paul answered like a true Oregonian – "He likes to watch Duck Football!"

When you are in New York City during Westminster week, the city is in love with the dogs. The hotel had a spa set up just for the dogs. Restaurants have special meals just for the dogs. Everyone loves to take pictures of the Westminster dogs.

WHAT IS A VERSATILITY TITLE?


Border Terriers are active and versatile dogs. They were bred to have the skills and drive to excel in the field, and are happiest when working closely with their owners. Modern day Borders and their owners use these skills to compete in the many dogs sports available today. To recognize and preserve these traits and to encourage owners to enjoy them, the BTCA offers the Versatility Awards, which reward participation in a variety of dog activities. The Versatility Award is designed so that the average Border and owner, with some effort, can earn one. It asks for one title in three different fields, and a total of seven points. About thirty Borders earn a Versatility Award each year. Many go on to earn the Versatility Excellent Award, which requires twelve points, four fields including a working title, and considerable commitment from dog and owner. As a conformation title is not required, these awards are open to the pet as well as the champion and a number of pet Borders have **Versatility Excellent Awards**. 


