

# CLINICAL STUDY: CECS/PGSD/SPIKE'S DISEASE - PLEASE CONSIDER

Paroxysmal Gluten Sensitive Dyskinesia (PGSD) aka Canine Epileptoid Cramping Syndrome (CECS) and as Spike's Disease, is a seizure like disorder recorded in a number of breeds but is of particular concern in the Border Terrier. Symptoms are highly variable but a common factor is that the animal remains fully conscious during the episode. Episodes can last minutes to hours. Also, paroxysmal implies that the abnormal activity comes in episodes with the dog being normal at other times. The condition has almost certainly been present in the breed for a very long time but the true prevalence isn't known.

Looking for: a dog that you think has CECS/PGSD/Spike's Disease Or any dog with unknown Paroxysmal Dyskinesia that has not responded to antiepileptics.

Dr. Yael Merbl is a clinical neurologist at Cornell University Veterinary College. She is interested in looking into CECS/PGSD in Border Terriers, and a possible relationship to the gut microbiome. She is working with a team that includes Dr. Kenneth Simpson who works on gut microbiome, and Dr. Jacquelyn Evans, working on the genetics side.

- In order to know if this study is worth pursuing, we need to know if there are owners of affected Border Terriers willing to participate in the study. The study is NON-INVASIVE, it entails if possible, submitting a video clip (cell phones are fine) of your dog having an episode; answering a short questionnaire; collecting a cheek swab, and a fecal sample. Dr. Merbl will mail you the questionnaire, the swab, and the collection container with a return stamped envelope so all you need to do is drop it back in the mail and pass a video of your dog event via email.
- Dogs recruited into the study they may request a serum sample, and if needed will pay for the veterinary cost for getting the sample.
- However, it is important to get enough dogs. This would include dogs that have responded to a Gluten Free Diet. Dogs that have not responded to a Gluten Free diet. Dogs thought to have epilepsy but have not responded to anti-epileptics.
- In order to get normal controls, housemates of affected dogs may be asked to be sampled. And Dr. Merbl says she might come to the specialty and collect samples from as many Border Terriers as possible throughout the week.
- Ideally we would like to recruit a minimum of 50 possible affected Border Terriers, but we do not know if this is even possible. The health committee gets periodic reports, but not enough dogs to make this a valid study.
- If you have a dog that has, or has in the past, a Paroxysmal dyskinesia episode and are willing to participate in this study please send an email to Dr. Merbl with BORDER TERRIER in the subject line.
