Ministry of the Word

One or more of the lectionaries provided readings for the day or other selected passages of Scriptures are read. A Gospel reading must be read.

THE FIRST READING

Isaiah 2:1-5

God promises through the words of Isaiah that he will usher in an age of perfect peace, with no need for weapons, whether of iron or of the pen. No divisions will exist among the people; all will be one in their variety and in their difference.

THE EPISTLE

Romans 13:11-14

Paul cautions his readers to check for their own wakefulness, to pursue thoughts, habits, relationships, and situations that will challenge them to being alert, rather than to falling asleep and living in darkness.

A reading (lesson) from the Letter of Paul to the Romans:

You know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

THE GOSPEL

The symptoms of the end of the age will not necessarily be like a blaring alarm or a tumultous storm, rousing those who slumber; instead, those who wish to be part of God's Kingdom are cautioned to stay awake.

THE NICENE CREED

Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.
