

One or more of the lectionaries provided readings for the day or other selected passages of Scriptures are read. A Gospel reading must be read.

THE FIRST READING

Zephaniah 1:7,12-18

Zephaniah prophesies that there will be consequences to the people's sin. Persistent disobedience will not be disregarded.

A reading (lesson) from the Book of the Prophet Zephaniah:

Be silent before the Lord GOD! For the day of the LORD is at hand; the LORD has prepared a sacrifice, he has consecrated his guests. At that time I will search Jerusalem with lamps, and I will punish the people who rest complacently on their dregs, those who say in their hearts, "The LORD will not do good, nor will he do harm." Their wealth shall be plundered, and their houses laid waste. Though they build houses, they shall not inhabit them; though they plant vineyards, they shall not drink wine from them. The great day of the LORD is near, near and hastening fast; the sound of the day of the LORD is bitter, the warrior cries aloud there. That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and anguish, a day of ruin and devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness, a day of trumpet blast and battle cry against the fortified cities and against the lofty battlements. I will bring such distress upon people that they shall walk like the blind; because they have sinned against the LORD, their blood shall be poured out like dust, and their flesh like dung. Neither their silver nor their gold will be able to save them on the day of the LORD's wrath; in the fire of his passion the whole earth shall be consumed; for a full, a terrible end he will make of all the inhabitants of the earth.

THE EPISTLE

1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

The Thessalonians, and we ourselves, are called to live according to God's perspective of creation rather than the temptation to the sleepiness of this world.

A reading (lesson) from the First Letter of Paul to the Thessalonians:

Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labor pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. So then let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; for those who sleep sleep at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation. For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him. Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus tells the parable of the talents, of those whom much has been given, much will be expected.

His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.' And the one with the two talents also came forward, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me two talents; see, I have made two more talents.' His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.' Then the one who had received the one talent also came forward, saying, 'Master, I knew that you were a

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harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed; so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours.' But his master replied, 'You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'"

THE BLAME GAME

by The Rev. Dr. Nathanael Saint-Pierre (Matthew 25:14 – 30)

I have studied, but I need your strength. I have prepared, but I need your power,
I'm willing, and I want to, but only you can make me able
Silently now I wait for thee, ready my God thy will to see
Open mine eyes and illumine me. Spirit divine

Opening: Are you one of those who are never satisfied with the gifts you receive? Would you like more or different gifts or even the gifts your neighbor receives? Are you, like me, questioning what God has given to you and are afraid to use them or playing the blame game?

Situation: Although the Lukan version reports that ten servants received one pound each (Luke 19:12-27) to do the Master's business, Matthew's Jesus mentions only three servants to his listeners in today's story. Each received according to his ability. The first received five times as much as the last, but each received a significant amount. A talent is equal to about 6,000 denarii. Since one denarius is a common laborer's daily wage, a talent would roughly equal 20 years' wages for the average worker. Five talents, the amount entrusted to each one of the servants, is comparable to one hundred years' worth of labor, an astronomical amount of money.

What each of the servants decided to do with the talents they received was different. One traded and made a profit; the second also generated a benefit for the master, but the third, paralyzed by the gossip in the community about the master and by his fear (some would call that laziness), dug a hole and put the money there for safekeeping. Upon the master's return, everyone was held accountable for his actions.

Complication: What did faithfulness look like when waiting for the Matthean community? What does faithfulness look like in a time of waiting for us? Was Jesus the master who wanted to expand his dominion and reap benefits? Is Jesus the enslaver who demands productivity from those who believe in him?

Resolution: It is common in Matthew to meet stories in which the transactional nature of relationships is evident. To get something, one must do something; when given something, one must do something in return. But this text should not be translated as a promotional tool for the prosperity gospel. This story is part of an eschatological section of Matthew's Gospel describing the reality of a community asking itself how to wait for the return of its master. What should they be doing with the treasure entrusted to them by Jesus? This treasure is the good news they

have received from Jesus. Should they bury it underground? Should they risk their lives to spread it?

The Matthean community existed during the time of the Roman Empire's occupation. To be followers or disciples of Jesus and proclaim him as Lord was risky business. Those who believed in Jesus faced two challenges after his execution/crucifixion and resurrection: Roman imperialism, in which the emperor was the godly figure, and Jewish tradition, which considered Jesus as a heretic or idolatry by a group of enlightened. The Matthean Jesus used the word master to describe the landowner, the lord, heading away for an unpredictable journey. Some translations use the word slaves to name the intendant at the landowner's service.

Today's church faces the same kinds of challenges when it comes to responding to our call. The world is in turmoil. We see violence and injustice all around us. Children are bombed. Civilians are killed. Whole cities are wiped off the map for the empire's expansion. Believers have seen apocalyptic images but do not know what to make out of them. What we believe was a thing of the past -- despite how confident we are saying we want to dismantle racism -- White Supremacy is alive and well. Who is going to voice that Jesus preached a different gospel? Surely not the hypocrites who support the violence unconditionally. Definitely not those who benefit from weapon marketing. The Church should, but the fear of being labeled as antisemitic or too political prevents it from voicing what God is for all to hear: love.

If some people might be tempted to identify the master as God, let me be quick to say that God is NOT a slave master. God invites us to serve him, but God does not enslave anyone. Even more important is for me to affirm that God is not a harsh man, reaping where he did not sow and gathering where he did not scatter seed. It is dangerous to try to make this parable about describing the nature of God. God is God, not a man. God is love, not a capitalist businessman. The Bible never describes Jesus, God incarnate, as a man looking for his own gain. Jesus was a provider to the needy. Jesus was the healer of the sick, the restorer of the broken, and the redeemer of the lost. Jesus performed healing on the Sabbath day to teach his disciples what faithfulness to God really meant. Faithfulness to God is

not blind obedience; it is consistency. Faithfulness to God was not for Jesus to wait until resurrection. Faithfulness to God was to do God's will when challenging, to question the temple's practices and the hypocrites' rituals. The Matthean Jesus was working while waiting.

Yes, today, that story applies to us. It is not because we expect Jesus to return that we must be idle while waiting. Jesus is with us, still expecting us to transform the unjust structures of our world.

God still gives today. Not the same amount for each servant. God's job is to provide, leaving us to share our gifts with God's creation. While God expects us to take risks, God will never ask back what God gives. The church must be brave enough to take risks because God will not ask us what we do with God's gift. God is not obsessed with benefits and profits. In the parable for today, what upset the master was not the fact that one servant buried the gift he received underground. It was the denigration of the master by the servant. How can a person accept a deal with another when he knows the latter is a profit grabber and a dishonest investor? Too often, when it comes to receiving, we don't question the integrity of the giver. When we are held accountable, we have harsh criticism for the giver.

Celebration: A woman was married to a government official. The guy constantly bought expensive gifts for her. She never questioned her husband and always went out telling her friends how she was spoiled. She received flowers, went to expensive restaurants, and was offered precious metals and expensive jewelry.

One day, FBI agents showed up at her house, handcuffed her, and took her away. She pretended that she never knew her husband was a thief. He ran around with other women. He was violent towards her. He even raped her. But she was so afraid. She never told anyone about it. She stayed with him to protect her life. She shifted all the blame onto her husband, not realizing it was a test. Her husband was behind her arrest and wanted to see what she would say under pressure.

Faithfulness is not tested in easy times when all is well. Faithfulness is tested when life is rough and during the storm. It is so easy to throw someone under the bus and have them be blamed. It is so easy to call people names. Today's gospel is a reminder that Christians are to be vigilant and active at all times. Unexpectedly, the master will come and hold us accountable. Seeking excuses for our inactivity will not account for it. There'll be no need to play the blame game. **Amen**.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for ALL. Do this for the remembrance of me."
