



# **100 YEARS OF HISTORY**

During the latter part of the 1880s and through the early 1930s, immigration from Italy had begun to establish itself in the major American cities. Feelings of resentment began to surface towards Italians, so when the United States government established tight quotas just on Italian immigration, Italian organizations began to form and become involved in supporting their communities. Negativity was also beginning to occur in the Bay Area. Local Italians would not be hired "full time and were hired to work at lower wages without benefits. South San Francisco, known for its industries, hired Italians because they were known for their "hard working" ethics. Realizing the importance of knowing the English language and the importance of voting, classes were formed in their homes.

As an incentive for those who became citizens, on the 7<sup>th</sup> of December, 1916, they formed the Italian American Citizens Club, an organization that would seek to portray the positive image of Italians in our area. It also became a strong political club that dealt with the everyday problems confronting the community. Instead of confronting prejudice and racial slurs with protests and marches, they decided to endorse candidates that were supportive of Italian communities. Candidates for school board, city council, sheriff, judges, and county officials, would appear before the membership asking for their support. Social events were open to the community at large. They included dinners, picnics. Sponsoring of soccer teams, parades on Columbus Day and the 4<sup>th</sup> of July. Other Italian

organizations and clubs of other ethnic groups were invited to participate, showing the acceptance and the unity between the various groups in our city.

The monthly meetings, established in 1916, were initially held in the Italian language until April 1<sup>st</sup>, 1926, when English was installed. On January 6, 1927, the members voted to open their meetings with the Pledge of Allegiance. Emigrating from a county ruled by a King, and the beginning of the rise of fascism, two important bylaws were installed; the first; "no one person would rule and the membership would vote on all items". The President would conduct the meetings; members of the board would chair the committees, and the membership voted for approval or disapproval. The second, accepted on June of 1935, "No member of the club that is an elected public official, can have an official position in the club due to conflict of interest". This was their way of forming an active, democratic organization, without political conflict of interest.

On July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1937, a parade with representation from throughout the Bay Area, which included a Queen, floats and musical marching bands, a marble bust of George Washington, was presented to the city of South San Francisco. It celebrated the first President of the United States, but more importantly, the fact that his grandparents had emigrated from England. Since its presentation, the statue located on front lawn of the City Hall, has continued to represent the past and current history of the Italian community of our city.

On the 7<sup>th</sup> of December 1941, the United States entered into World War II. In South San Francisco, approximately 1,019 young men and women had entered the military. Of these, 336 were Italian Americans, sons and daughters of local IACC families that continuously had sought recognition to become accepted as Americans. Eleven of these eventually paid the maximum price, never to return home. In May, of 1942, in the decisive battle of the Coral Sea, an Italian American naval aviator, born and raised in South San Francisco, became the first American national hero to return home. After the war he became a member of the IACC.




In 1953, the IACC was reorganized. Continuing to be a force in protecting the rights of Italians, it became more involved in promoting social and cultural events for its members and the community. Searching for ideas to increase its membership, the first major change came in the early 1980's. It was the acceptance of wives as members. This led to the inclusion of all ethnic groups to become members.

The second major event occurred in 1986, when the club organized a sporting event known as the "Italian American Games". Beginning with three sports, at the height of its success it had 14 different sports. The games also contributed to the construction of six Bocce courts at the Orange Avenue Memorial Park. What many of you today do not know, is that the first Bocce court, built by the IACC was under the 300 block of Grand Avenue in the late 70's. The IACC has continued with its social events, such as dinners and picnics, including cruises to the Caribbean, Alaska, and the extremely popular group trips to Italy. On the cultural side, theatrical and musical groups from Lucca, Italy, have been invited to perform, Lucca Drive was dedicated, scholarships are awarded to graduating High School seniors that study Italian, and a "Person of the Year" award is presented at the annual Christmas Dinner.


This year, we have celebrated the Centennial of the South San Francisco Italian American Citizens Club. We acknowledge the sacrifice of an organization, whose ethnic group sought to be accepted as Americans, and with the help of other ethnic Americans, managed to become one of the most popular organizations, prior and after, World War II. The IACC was, and continues to be, an organization that helped to build the history of the city of South San Francisco. It is our hope that its future will be as positive and successful as its past, and that the IACC's future continues to be acknowledged and documented for the betterment of our members and our community.


Ribbons worn by IACC Officers, 1936 By-Laws booklet

**Art. 1.** This Club has the purpose to maintain a high moral standard among its Members and of fostering the general interests of our City and those in particular of the Italian element.

**Art. 2.** To this Club can belong any Italo-American citizen of irreproachable behavior and aiming to attain the general welfare of the commonwealth and not aiming exclusively to his own personal interest and aggrandizement.

**Art. 3.** This Club has the right to refuse membership to persons whose behavior is, or has been, improper. It has also the right to expel a Member who acts in such a way as to show disregard for the fundamental principles of this Club and whose only object is his personal profit.

**Art. 4.** It is absolutely imperative to all Members of this Club to maintain a decorous behavior during its meetings and to willingly submit to the majority's deliberations imparting, by so doing, force and prestige to the Club.


**Art. 5.** When circumstances require an investigation, the Club has the right to nominate a Committee of three of its Members. This Committee must be of an integrity beyond suspicion and immune of any interest and of any influence which might frustrate the purpose for which said committee has been nominated.

**Art. 6.** This Club has the right to choose candidates to public offices, municipal, scholastic or otherwise. The candidates chosen by this Club will have its gratuitous support but, if elected, must do their utmost to fulfill their promises and to carry out the recommendations made by this Club.

**Art. 7.** The candidates indorsed by this Club are entitled to hold a public meeting during the electoral campaign. This Club will solicit by mail all the Italo-American Citizens of the district. The expenses of said meeting must be paid by the candidates.

**Art. 8.** The candidates for a public office (County or State) who solicit the indorsement of this Club are requested to contribute an amount of money sufficient to cover the expenses necessary to foster their campaign. If a candidate is not indorsed, his contribution will be immediately returned.

**Art. 9.** This Club has the right to apply disciplinary measures to Members who oppose any candidate indorsed by the Club. Such measures will, according to the gravity of the offense, vary from a simple reprimand, made by the President during a public meeting, to expulsion from the Club of the offending Member.



**Art. 10.** If a Member has made, or is making, a campaign derogatory to the dignity and the good name of the Club he will be liable to expulsion. Action in this regard will be taken on the recommendation of a jury nominated by the President.

The expulsion must be approved by a majority of two-thirds of the Assembly.

To the Member under accusation must be granted the opportunity to defend himself either personally or by some other Member.

**Art. 11.** The right of voting will be granted to all Members who have paid their annual dues at least thirty days before the questions to be discussed have been submitted.

**Art. 12.** The nomination of the Officers of this Club will take place at the regular meeting in December. The election, and inauguration of the elected Officers, will take place at the first meeting on the following month.

**Art. 13.** The regular meetings will take place on the first Thursday of each month.

**Art. 14.** No Member holding a public or political position can be an Officer of this club.

**Art. 15.** All new Members must be instructed on the rules and regulations of this Club.

During the discussions both the English and the Italian languages may be used.

### THE GEORGE WASHINGTON MONUMENT

On July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1937, a parade hosted by the Italian American Citizens Club was represented by organizations throughout the Bay Area. It included a Queen, floats and musical marching bands, plus a presentation of a marble bust of George Washington to the city of South San Francisco. The bust was to celebrate the first President of the United States, but more importantly, the fact that his grandparents had immigrated to America from England, the same as Italians from Italy. Since its presentation, the statue, located on front lawn of the City Hall, has continued to represent the past and current history of the Italian community of our city.

### PARADES 1920's - 1940's

### IACC ANNUAL 4<sup>TH</sup> OF JULY PARADE

On July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1937, to celebrate the dedication of the George Washington monument, the IACC invited the local community of So. San Francisco to participate in an Independence Day Parade. Residents and businesses decorated floats, as well as school marching bands and various organizations marched in the parade. As a result, the Parade became an annual City event for many years.













# THE IACC ITALIAN AMERICAN GAMES

Beginning in 1986 and ending in 1995, the Italian American Games became the renaissance of the IACC. Organizing a sporting event for Italians and Americans of Italian descent, three sports (Bocce, Bike Racing and Tennis) were first introduced. The event proved to be so successful that at the height of its success, 14 different sports were offered open to all ethnic groups. Teams from the Italian cities of Lucca, Florence, Perugia and Bologna participated. As a result of financial support from the city of South San Francisco and the monies derived from the games (the IACC donated \$90,000 dollars), six Bocce Courts (two of them covered) were built at the local Orange Memorial Park. Each year, at the Games dinner/dance, Hollywood celebrities such as actor Joseph Campanella, comedian singer Sonny King and others, were showcased. By 1995, the Games became so popular, that the IACC could no longer continue to manage them. During this period, the IACC membership soared to almost 500 members. Bocce was retained as the only Games sport, until 2010 on the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Games. To this day, the IACC continues to offer competitive night and day Bocce leagues to its members.

# Cooley's Anemia

Leading the Fight Against Thalassemia

The South San Francisco Italian American Citizens Club has, since the early 90's, contributed to the Cooley's Anemia Research Foundation. At that time, members Gloria Galeotti and Alvaro Bettucchi visited the Children's Hospital, located in Oakland California. There they met Dr. Carol Hyman, who took them on a tour of the hospital and visited various patients. Bringing back the information to the membership, it was then voted to support the Cooley's Anemia Foundation.



Cooley's Anemia is a genetic condition, where a lack of beta protein in the hemoglobin, can cause significant health problems; including bone deformities and spleen enlargement, that requires regular blood transfusions and extensive ongoing medical care. This genetic disorder is found primarily in infants of Mediterranean descent, such as in Italians, Greeks and Spanish.

Dr. Carol Hyman received her medical degrees from Cornell University-New York. Later completed her training at Mount Sinai Hospital in New York and at the Children's Hospital in Los Angeles. Her early career interests were in hemolytic disease in newborns and childhood leukemia. For over 25 years, she headed Cedars-Sinai's Cooley's Anemia Program. Later, she came to the Children's Hospital in Oakland. In 1994, Dr. Carol Hyman became the IACC's third "Person of the Year" recipient.

To date, the IACC has contributed over \$44,000 to the Cooley's Anemia Foundation.

# OCTOBER 23, 2016 REDEDICATION OF THE GEORGE WASHINGTON STATUE BY THE IACC AT THE SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO CITY HALL
