Preparations under way for convention

The ALSSAR state convention will return to the Hoover Embassy Suites on Feb. 21-22 and compatriots are encouraged to attend the annual two-day event.

Activities get under way on Friday (Feb. 21) with a trio of free seminars before the welcome reception at 6:30 p.m.

Compatriots can sign up for "Tools for the Family Detective," a presentation by Aimee Cross detailing the latest technology on searching for family ancestors; the "SAR Scavenger Hunt," a presentation by secretary Ron Dains and past president Jim Griffith on how to navigate the SAR web site; and "Tips and Tools for SAR Application Success" by ALSSAR registrar Ron Bearden.

Saturday's events include the Southern District meeting, the ALSSAR business meeting, the annual orations contest and the youth awards luncheon.

The convention wraps up on Saturday night with the annual awards banquet, which includes recognition of compatriots, a special guest and the installation of new officers for 2025-26.

Deadline to register for the convention is Feb. 13.

Bearden to hold annual genealogy workshop

Once again, ALSSAR registrar Ron Bearden will hold the annual genealogy workshop at the state convention. This year, the workshop will be entitled "Tips & Tools for SAR Application Success."

Bearden will cover the basics of completing an application for those just starting out as an SAR application preparer. He will discuss a few new web sites and links that are now available to aid us in genealogical research, then discuss new developments using artificial intelligence in genealogical research.

Bearden will conclude with a discussion on writing a proof argument or using the new proof argument forms when a proof argument is needed to prove the genealogy, service, residency, or specific place of occurrence on an SAR application.

There will be opportunities for questions during each segment of the workshop and

there will be plenty of handouts.

The workshop will be a little later in the afternoon this year to give everyone plenty of time to get there. It will take place from 3-5 p.m. on the first day of the convention (Friday, Feb. 21) at the convention hotel, the Embassy Suites in Hoover.

There is no cost for the workshop.

Attendees do NOT have to be registered for the conven-

tion to attend and the workshop is open to any SAR or DAR member or prospective member of either organization.

However, any attendee who is not registered for the convention should still fill out and submit a convention registration form (on pages 6-7 of this newsletter) and indicate they will attend the genealogy workshop only.

We need this information to make sure we prepare the right number of handouts.

Bearden has been a member of the SAR since 1989 and has served as the ALSSAR registrar for 20 years.

He is a member of the NSSAR Genealogy Committee, has been awarded the NSSAR Gold Liberty Medal for (200) first line sponsorships and has personally sponsored over 325 members to SAR.

In Memory...

The Black Warrior River and Tennessee Valley chapters are mourning the recent loss of compatriots Buddy McGee and Allie Cavett Swann over the last two months.

JAMES ELDRIDGE McGEE of Cottondale, a member of the Black Warrior River chapter, passed away on Nov. 12. He was 89.

McGee, on Feb. 18, 1935, lived in Cottondale all his life. He was a lifelong member of Cottondale Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), where he was baptized in his youth. This church is his family's home church with a rich history that started in 1885 with his great grandfather and first minister B.F Hinton. He was very proud that his legacy continues into the seventh generation. McGee was a trustee, a deacon and was instrumental in the construction of the family life center.

He attended Cottondale Elementary School and graduated from Holt High School in 1953. He excelled in football, basketball and baseball, receiving the Jimmy Walker Award for the most outstanding student athlete. He was a member of coach Woody Clements' first football team.

After high school he was recruited to play fastpitch softball for the Pepsi Cola team where he and his family enjoyed traveling throughout the southeast. He was honored to be inducted into the West Alabama Softball Hall of Fame in 1999.

McGee was a master electrician and a member of the IBEW Local 136 for 71 years. He was the owner of McGee Electric Company, a commercial electrical contracting business. During his years in business, he was a mentor and made many friends along the way.

In addition to his membership in the Black Warrior River chapter, he was a Mason and Shriner, a member of the Tuscaloosa Genealogical Society, a lifetime member of the National Rifle Association and president of the Cottondale Cemetery Association.

He is survived by his wife of 71 years, Carolyn Ray McGee; his children Elisa M. (David) Ember, Ashley (Sara) McGee, Chris (Miriam) McGee and Jennifer M. (Raiford "Bo") Wilson; his grandchildren, who fondly called him "Bud", Brett (Julie) Ember, Meghan E. (David) Adair, Rachael M. (Josh) Pope, Jason McGee, James "Gee" (Heather) McGee, Jon Wesley McGee, Bryant Wilson and Walker Wilson; his greatgrandchildren, Jacob and Josh Ember, Emberly and Adley Adair, Lincoln Pope, John Ashley McGee, Estes and Marek McGee, Aiden and Ryder McGee.

Services were held on Nov. 15 at Tuscaloosa Memorial Chapel Funeral Home. Interment with Masonic Rites followed at Tuscaloosa Memorial Park Cemetery.

ALLIE CAVETT SWANN, a member of the Tennessee Valley chapter, passed away peacefully on Dec. 11. He was 91.

Swann was born to Evelyn and Allie Swann on Sept. 14, 1933, in Columbus, Miss., at his mother's family home and

grew up in Macon, Miss., with two younger sisters, Sallie and Rose.

He attended East Mississippi Junior College before enlisting with the U.S. Army, serving in Okinawa as a member of the Army Band during the Korean War. Upon returning to Mississippi following his military service, he graduated from Mississippi State University with a dual degree in accounting and economics. At MSU, he was a member of Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity and created many lifelong friendships there. He went on to earn his MBA from the University of Alabama.

Swann worked briefly for an audit firm before he began his long tenure of 37 years at Marshall Space Flight Center, before retiring from his position as Center Comptroller.

While working as a young accountant at NASA, he was introduced to Linda Calline Reitzel by her mother with whom he worked. Allie and Linda married in July 1962, adding five children to their family within eight years.

He was a member of Trinity UMC for 62 years, and he and Linda raised all five children at Trinity. He and Linda were members of Cokesbury Class and longtime members of their PC Group. Allie also participated in two mission trips to Bolivia with the church to support construction of a Methodist school.

In addition to working at NASA, later in his career Swann taught accounting classes at Snead State, Alabama A&M University, Athens State University and the University of Alabama in Huntsville.

Following his retirement from NASA, Swann was passionate about being involved with several local non-profits as a board member and volunteer, working tirelessly on improving financial reporting, policies, and processes, as well as improving the business administration functions of nonprofits. He worked with First Stop as a board member, worked with a group from Trinity to establish Team Read at Whitesburg Elementary and was a member of Sons of the American Revolution.

With a deep interest in genealogy and tracing his family history, Swann was instrumental in the restoration of the Cavett Cemetery in Meridianville, where ancestors are buried.

One of his most loved roles was as a board member and Foundation Board member for Burritt on the Mountain as well as Volunteer of the Year. He served as the project manager for the Baron's Bluff building construction at Burritt and was honored with a plaque at the entrance of Baron's Bluff.

Survivors include his wife of 63 years, Linda Reitzel Swann; five children, Cynthia Diaddario (Dave), Steven (Beth), Douglas (Katherine), Hallie Swann (Pat Moffatt), and Laura Swann; 12 grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; two additional great-grandchildren on the way; his sister, Sallie Ellis; and many nieces and nephews.

Visitation was held on Dec. 15 with a memorial service following at Laughlin Service Funeral Home.


