Past president Marvin Vickers passes away

Former ALSSAR and Wiregrass chapter president Marvin Vickers passed away on Oct. 19 at the age of 80.

Vickers spent more than 30 years of his life as a chaplain in the U.S. Army and later became the executive director of Blue Lake Methodist Assem-

bly before getting involved in the Sons of the American Revolution, first at the chapter level and later as the ALSSAR president in 2013-14.

Services were held on Oct. 24 at the Chapel of Dillard Funeral Home in Troy with the Rev. Tonya Elmore and Rev.

David Morris officiating. Interment followed in Green Hills Memorial Park in Troy.

Marvin is survived by his brother Perry (Elizabeth) Vickers, his sister Claire (Malon) Murphy and his sister-in-law

One big difference in this new website is we finally have a "Members Only" page. You can see a screen shot of the documents that are available on this page.


You will have to create a username and password when you first visit this page and then I grant you access to the page. Don't lose your username and password since I don't have access to those.

Ann Ammons, along with children, grandchildren and nieces and nephew.

Chaplain Colonel (Retired) **MARVIN KERON VICKERS JR.** was born on Dec. 12, 1941 in Elmore Station to a Methodist preacher (Marvin Sr.) and a teacher (Helen). He graduated from Troy High School in 1960 and Troy State College in 1963.

That year, he also married his high school sweetheart, Miss Carolyn Ammons. They remained a power couple until Carolyn's untimely death in 2017.

Family history repeated itself as Marvin set out on a career as a Methodist preacher and Carolyn as a teacher.

Marvin was called to ministry at the age of 19. He graduated from the Emory University Candler School of Theology in 1966. Upon his ordination, he began his service to the Alabama West Florida United Methodist Conference. Marvin served the Perote Charge, Goshen Circuit and Seale/Alexandria charge. He and Carolyn were grateful for the early foundation those churches gave. The Seale/Alexandria charge did and will always remain very special to them.

Upon the entrance of the United States into the Vietnam War, Marvin felt a strong calling to serve his country. He took a different ministry route and in 1967 volunteered for duty in the United States Army. Marvin felt then, as he would tell you now, no one needs God's grace, guidance and discernment more than a solider. Marvin began his military career at Fort Hood, Texas assigned to the 26th Infantry Division "Blue Spaders."

From Fort Hood, he volunteered for assignment in Vietnam. After returning from war, Marvin held assignments at Fort Bragg, N.C.; Kaiserslautern and Karlsruhe, Germany; Fort Wadsworth, N.Y.; Fort Polk, La.; Fort Monmouth, N.J.; Fort Stewart, Ga.; Camp Red Cloud, South Korea; Fort Rucker and Fort Gillem, Georgia.

He held positions as Brigade Chaplain, Director of Education US Army Chaplain Board, Installation Chaplain and Installation Staff Chaplain.

Marvin's final assignment was as the Chaplain to the First United States Army at Fort Gillem. While there, he led and trained over 2,000 chaplains and chaplain assistants involving 27 states and 3 U.S. territories. Over his military career, Marvin learned to drive tanks, earned his jump wings, his German jump wings and ministered to the masses. Marvin retired as a colonel from the U.S. Army after almost 31 years of service.

Carolyn had always claimed she would never marry a soldier, a preacher or a farmer (did I mention Marvin farmed pine trees and drove tractors for fun). God had other plans!

Marvin holds a bachelor of science from Troy State College, a master's degree in divinity from Emory University, a master's degree in education from Long Island University and a master's degree in religious education from Princeton University.

Upon his retirement from the Army, he returned to the Alabama West Florida United Methodist Conference and became the executive director of Blue Lake Methodist Assembly. This is where he became known as "Chappy." He greatly loved Blue Lake and the people who visited and worshipped at this special place. He especially loved his summer counselors. Those young people filled him with such joy.

He and Carolyn split their time between Enterprise and Blue Lake during his years as executive director. He retired from Blue Lake and the United Methodist Church in 2009 and was greatly honored when the main gym at Blue Lake was named Vickers Gym.

A proud Troy alumnus, Marvin played in the university alumni and community bands. In 1983, Marvin was named Troy State University Alumni of the Year. An avid Harley rider, he enjoyed riding with church friends and the Patriot Guard.

He faithfully attended the First United Methodist Church of Enterprise until his health no longer allowed him to do so.

He was married to Carolyn for 55 years. The lights of his life were their children and their spouses Kristin and Jason Capstraw and Keron III and Tracey Vickers. His greatest joy was being "Chappy" to his four grandchildren Audrey and Alan Vickers and Troy and Emery Capstraw.

Marvin passed away on Oct. 19 after suffering from Lyme Disease for over a decade. He left this world peacefully; surrounded by the laughter of family and friends.

To those who knew him, this was fitting. He should be remembered as a charismatic man with the most infectious laugh who loved everyone.

Many events also included local officials, DAR, CAR and other guests.

Our group decided to challenge itself and set a goal of conducting a minimum of 30 grave markings prior to our country's 250th birthday on July 4, 2026.

Our first milestone was to have six grave markings during 2022. It was exciting when we met that milestone on Dec. 4. Only 24 to go!!

This program fits well with the rich environment in north Alabama of patriots' final resting places. The sad part was that most of these patriots were buried in family cemeteries. A large portion of these cemeteries were left to deteriorate because many of their descendents moved on to Texas and other westward locations leaving no one with attachments to take care of them.

Some of these cemeteries have required a significant amount of work. Our first cemetery worked this year took an entire day of work to clear a path just to get to the first headstone. All the work is being done with volunteers who have donated many hours of service.

We normally have three or four cemeteries working at the same time. One of our cemeteries has been active for over a year and I estimate it will be another year before we are able to do the grave marking at old Gray Cemetery in Madison City.

We hope to get more Scout involvement this year.

Another exciting development came early in the year when I contacted the Pomeroy Foundation in upstate New York. Pomeroy has a grant program for historic signs for patriot burials.

Our first hurtle was to get Alabama included in the program. With the help of ALSSAR president Bill Daniel, we were able to get Alabama included in the grant program for these beautiful signs. We were able to get five applications in for Alabama

before the 2022 deadline.

The first one was just approved in December and the check is on the way for the first historic sign from Pomeroy to be installed at the Eldridge Cemetery for patriot John Peyton Powell.

The other four applications are still in the approval process at Pomeroy Foundation. Once the sign is fabricated and installed at the cemetery, we will have a grand ceremony at the sign unveiling.

- Davie Cemetery- Robert Davie (1756-1846)

At the conclusion of the youth luncheon at 2 p.m., smaller groups will make presentations on the America 250 project, public relations, patriot grave marking, color guard, honor guard and Americanism.

The Saturday evening banquet will include the annual awards presentation as well as the installation of new ALSAR officers. A nominating committee consisting of former ALSSAR presidents Edmon McKinley, Jim Maples and David Jones recommended the following compatriots for office:

James Griffith Jr., president, Tennessee Valley; Michael Martin, vice president, Cahaba-Coosa; Benny Hannah, secretary, Tennessee Valley; Dr. Paul Petznick, recording secretary, Birmingham; Scott Martin, treasurer, Cahaba-Coosa; Ron Bearden, registrar, Little River; Rev. Buddy Irvin, chaplain, Black Warrior; Bob England, historian, Shoals Area; Earl Gilliam, genealogist, Gen. John A. Elmore; Joseph Barker, sergeant-at-arms, Gen. John A. Elmore; Jay Maples, chancellor, Tennessee Valley; Bill Daniel, trustee, Cahaba-Coosa; and Griffith, alternate trustee.

The committee, chaired by McKinley, also provided a nominee, David Jones (Black Warrior), to serve a three-year term on the Endowment Fund Board, joining Stephen Hooks (Etowah), who is currently finishing out a two-year term, and John Wallace (Wiregrass), who is finishing out the last year of his three-year term.

The Board of Manager voted to move the convention to a permanent centralized location in 2018 after being previously held at the site of the reigning president. It moved to Prattville's Legends Marriott in 2018 and then to the Hoover Embassy Suites in 2019, where it has remained for four of the last five years. It was held at the American Village's Liberty Hall in 2021 because of the pandemic

Looking for an Alabama connection to George Washington? Check out the Harrison Regional Library in Columbiana

Ever been to Columbiana, Alabama? As a compatriot of the ALSSAR you should make the trip. Alabama has a little known Material Culture connection there to a leader of the great struggle for American freedom. The Karl C Harrison Museum of George Washington, currently housed in the Mildred B. Harrison Regional Library at 50 Lester Street.

The basis for this collection is from a former resident of Shelby County, Charlotte Smith Weaver, a sixth generation granddaughter of Martha Washington! In the 1980s she decided to share her legacy with the public.

As stated on their web site: "The Karl C. Harrison Museum of George Washington collection focuses on art and artifacts from the colonial period through 1865. The collection contains paintings, letters, furniture, porcelain, glassware, silver, jewelry, busts and more.

"Martha Washington's prayer book



printed in New York in 1783, an original 1787 Samuel Vaughn sketch of Mt. Vernon grounds, writing instruments and tools from George Washington's survey case and an original tintype depicting Robert E. Lee in his uniform for the last time are just a few collection highlights."

As I have frequently found in the past, visits to smaller museums and collections are the most informative and personable. The present curator, Donald Relyea,

does not disappoint. He is very knowledgeable about the collection and enjoys giving tours and speaking with visitors.

Relyea is a retired accountant and retired Army Reserve master sergeant. In 2005 he reenlisted into the First Pennsylvania Regiment, a history reenactment group dedicated to portraying a unit of the "First Continental Line" that served during the entire Revolutionary War.

It was a small step to volunteering at the Karl C. Harrison Museum of George Washington, and after a while he was offered his current position as curator and has been there nine years.

The museum is currently operating on donations, so please take the trip to Columbiana, give them your dime and see this wonderful treasure right here in Alabama!
