PASTOR'S PAGE

Gerard Tersteegen was a German reformed writer who died in 1769. He is famously quoted as saying, "A God comprehended is no God." I think what he was meaning by this is that if we will only allow for a God who fits conveniently within the human capacity to reason, we have not only eliminated the possibility of an infinite personal God, but rather we have become gods ourselves. Another way of saying this is that a God comprehended will never be able to act outside of our ability to understand Him.

Rudolf Otto, another German theologian, wrote a book entitled, The Idea of the Holy. In this book, he makes a useful distinction between the words, irrational, and non-rational. Simply put, what he means by irrational is that which is against reason. But what he means by non-rational is that which is beyond reason. If we do not allow for those things which are beyond reason, the non-rational, then we must disallow the existence of a God who operates outside of the human capacity to understand His divine nature, and omnipotent power.

Let me offer Isaiah 43:13 for your consideration. Here we read, "Even from eternity I am He." I don't know if you've ever tried to wrap your mind around eternity, but if you have you soon realize that it's beyond your ability to comprehend. Everything we experience has an end. There is an English idiom attributed to Chauser in the 1300s which we've all heard, "All good things must come to an end." That statement stands up to human reason, but what if it also explained the nature and existence of God? We would be back to Tersteegen's axiom, "A God comprehended is no God."

Again from the book of Isaiah considered the sixth chapter. When Isaiah said, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, lofty and exalted, his immediate response is recorded in verse five; "Woe is me, for I am ruined! Because I am a man of uncleaned lips, and I live among people of unclean lips; for my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts." A comprehensive study of scripture reveals that when you step into the presence of a Holy God, you not only understand who He is, but you also understand who you are. When Moses met God in the burning bush, his first response was to hide his face. When the disciples went up onto the mount of transfiguration with Jesus, they fell down and became like dead men. Hebrews 10:13 says, "It is a terrifying thing to fall into the hands of the living God."

We have deemphasized the existence of a Holy God. I think the primary reason is that when we embrace a Holy God, it exposes who we truly are. All of Job's arguments made perfect sense from a rational point of view. But when the Lord of glory entered the conversation, Job's response was silence. He said, "Behold, I am insignificant; what can I reply to Thee? I lay my hand on my mouth." Perhaps this is what the Psalmist meant when he said, "Be still and know that I am God." If you only allow for a God that makes perfect sense then your life never will.

Behind the Hymn: For the Beauty of the Earth

For the beauty of the earth,
For the glory of the skies,
For the love which from our birth,
Over and around us lies;
Lord of all, to thee we raise
This our hymn of grateful praise.

"For the Beauty of the Earth," written by Folliott Sandford Pierpoint in 1864, celebrates the beauty of creation and expresses gratitude for God's gifts.

Author and Inspiration

Folliott Sandford Pierpoint was a British poet and teacher who composed this beloved hymn at the age of 29. The hymn was inspired by a spring morning view of his native city, Bath, England. Pierpoint was moved by the natural beauty surrounding him, which led him to write verses that reflect his gratitude for the earth, human love, and the divine.

Original Context

Originally titled "The Sacrifice of Praise," the hymn was published in 1864 in a collection called Lyra Eucharistica, which focused on the Eucharistic hymns. The refrain, "Christ, our God, to Thee we raise / This our sacrifice of praise," connects the hymn to the themes of the Lord's Supper and thanksgiving. The hymn was intended for communion services, emphasizing the relationship between creation and the divine.

Evolution and Themes

The hymn originally consisted of eight stanzas, but many hymnals today include only four to six. Each stanza highlights different aspects of God's creation, such as the beauty of the earth, the joy of human love, and the church. Over time, the hymn has been adapted for various liturgical occasions, making it accessible to a broader audience. The original themes of gratitude and praise remain central to its message, resonating with worshippers across denominations.

The Story of Operation Christmas Child

How did an idea about a shoebox turn into a worldwide gift-giving sensation?

As we look forward to celebrating the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, Operation Christmas Child is also marking a birthday. This year marks 31 years since Samaritan's Purse began collecting shoeboxes filled with gifts for hurting children around the world.

In 1993, a man in England asked us to collect Christmas gifts for children in war-torn Bosnia. I called a church in Charlotte, where Pastor Ross Rhoads invited his congregation to fill showboxes with children's gifts, and they overwhelmed us with 11 thousand boxes – so many that the church ran out of room to store them. I'll never forget Ross telling me, "Franklin, this is obviously something the Lord has blessed."

From the start, Operation Christmas Child has always dedicated to sharing the Gospel, and the Lord has blessed us with an abundance of gift boxes – 209 million over 30 years.

Around the world, a whole generation of children have grown up after coming to know Jesus through Operation Christmas Child.

The boxes that are collected are shipped to many countries around the world. Each box will have a book about Jesus for the children to learn and study. Many of the recipients will remember these gifts for years to come.

After sharing the story of the Good Samaritan, Jesus said "Go and do likewise." That is the mission of Samaritan's Purse—to follow the example of Christ by helping those in need and proclaiming the hope of the Gospel.
