



REFLECTIONS FROM Fr. Matthew

"Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit. (John 12:24)

Today's Gospel from John is a preparation for the beginning of the passion narrative to follow. Jesus has just raised Lazarus from the dead—an important sign in John's Gospel, which inspired many people to believe in Jesus. This event also marks the turning point in Jesus' conflict with the Jewish authorities. John's Gospel tells us that the Sanhedrin met after this event and made plans to kill Jesus. In the 12th chapter of John's Gospel, Jesus is anointed at Bethany and enters Jerusalem in triumph.

Following his triumphant entry into Jerusalem, Jesus predicted his suffering, death, and Resurrection and prepared his disciples to believe in the salvation that his death would accomplish. Using the metaphor of the grain of wheat, Jesus presented the idea that his dying would be beneficial. He also taught that those who would be his disciples must follow his example of sacrifice. This theme will be repeated in John's account of the Last Supper, when Jesus washed the feet of his disciples as an example of how they must serve one another.

The final section of today's Gospel might be read as John's parallel to the agony in the garden. Unlike the Synoptic Gospels, the Gospel of John does not record Jesus' anguished prayer in the garden of Gethsemane before his arrest. After announcing his conviction that it is for this purpose that he came, a voice from heaven speaks, as if in answer to Jesus' prayer. This voice, like the one heard at Jesus' baptism and at Jesus' Transfiguration affirms that God welcomes the sacrifice that Jesus will make on behalf of others.

The Gospel today is a preparation for the celebration of our Holy Week and to understand Jesus' passion, death, and Resurrection. Through his death and Resurrection, Jesus conquered Satan, the ruler of this world. In this way the world is judged, but the judgment is not condemnation. Instead, through Jesus' dying and rising, salvation is brought to the world.

God's Gift of Forgiveness

Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation

"Peace be with you!" With these words, the Risen Lord greeted his frightened Apostles in the Upper Room on the day of His Resurrection. They were troubled, anxious, and fearful—much like each one of us at some point in our lives. Christ repeated the words, "Peace be with you." But then he added, "Receive the holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them." (Jn 20:19-23).

What an extraordinary gift! The Risen Lord was proclaiming that all the suffering he had just endured was in order to make available the gifts of salvation and forgiveness. He wanted the Apostles to receive these gifts. He wanted them to become apostles of this forgiveness to others.

In the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, also called confession, we meet the Lord, who wants to grant forgiveness and the grace to live a renewed life in him. In this sacrament, he prepares us to receive him free from serious sin, with a lively faith, earnest hope, and sacrificial love in the Eucharist. The Church sees confession as so important that she requires that every Catholic go at least once a year. The Church also encourages frequent confession in order to grow closer to Christ Jesus and his Body, the Church. By the grace of the Holy Spirit, we seek forgiveness and repentance, let go of patterns of sin, grow in the life of virtue, and witness to a joyful conversion. Since the graces of the sacrament are so similar to the purpose of the New Evangelization, Pope Benedict XVI has said, "The New Evangelization . . . begins in the confessional!"

During Lent—in addition to the various penitential acts, we are encouraged to respond to the call of the New Evangelization to encounter Christ in the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. Come to the Lord and experience the extraordinary grace of his forgiveness!

Our Parish has confessions after our daily Masses, on our second Mission Day on March 19th beginning at 8 pm, and on the **Day of Reconciliation in the Archdiocese on March 20th at St. Mathias Parish from 8 am to 8 pm.** Let us prepare to celebrate the paschal mysteries through this powerful sacrament of Healing and Forgiveness.

From the USCCB Pastoral Exhortations

How to go to Confession

- Examine your conscience, call to mind your sins, and then enter the confessional.
- The priest will welcome and receive you.
- Make the sign of the cross and say: "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."
- ◆ The priest will invite you to trust in God. He may also read a text of Sacred Scripture.
- Say these or similar words:
- "Bless me Father for I have sinned. It has been long since my last confession. These are my sins..."
- Tell the priest your sins. Then say these or similar words: "For these and all of my sins, I am sorry."
- Accept your work of penance (prayers, act of kindness, etc.) to help make satisfaction and amend your life.
- Express your sorrow for your sins (Act of Contrition) in these or similar words:
- "O my God, I am sorry and repent with all my heart for all the wrong I have done and for the good I have failed to do, because by sinning I have offended you, who are all good and worthy to be loved above all things. I firmly resolve, with the help of your grace, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid the occasions of sin. Through the merits of the Passion of our Savior Jesus Christ, Lord, have mercy.

- Receive God's forgiveness as the priest prays the Prayer of Absolution.
- At the end of the Prayer of Absolution, reply: "Amen."
- Give praise to God. When the priest says: "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good," conclude: "For his mercy endures forever."
- Go in peace and remember to say or do your penance.
