



REFLECTIONS FROM FR. MATTHEW

"Called to be Eucharist in the World"

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, also called the Feast of *Corpus Christi*, Latin for "the Body of Christ." This year we have the gospel from Luke's account of the feeding of the five thousand which is situated in the part of his gospel that focuses on mission (9:1-50), and it can be seen as symbolic of the outreach of the church.

We celebrate and honor this great gift of Jesus shared with the world in his personal fullness, in his "body and blood". We know eucharist is the lifeline of the Church. The context of Jesus feeding the five thousand is a great reminder of who the Church is in the world today. "Jesus spoke to the crowds about the kingdom of God, and healed those who needed to be cured" (Lk 9:11). The disciples were getting worried about the people being hungry and tell Jesus to send the crowd away to find shelter and food, neither of which is available in the lonely place, but Jesus responds with the challenge: "Give them some food yourselves".

Jesus' command that the Twelve seat the crowd in a hundred groups of fifty each is an image of the local churches gathered as the church universal. Just as Jesus has taught the crowd throughout the day, so he will now teach his disciples something more about the kingdom in action when he takes, blesses, breaks, and places the five loaves and two fishes into the hands of the disciples to give to the crowd. When the fragments of the meal are collected, they fill twelve baskets. Such is the superabundant hospitality of God in Christ, that there will always be more than enough to feed the future church of the Twelve when it gathers for its Eucharistic meal.

As we celebrate this great feast, the central gift of our Catholic faith, let us become the Eucharist we receive and bring it to people who are eagerly waiting for Christ. Let us bring Jesus through the Word and through our actions, feeding the hungry and healing the broken. Let us become a Eucharistic Community in our neighborhood through all our outreach ministries and share the good news of the Kingdom of God.

WE ARE A EUCHARISTIC COMMUNITY

"He said to them, 'Give them some food yourselves." Luke 9:13

This Sunday we celebrate the Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. It is here that Jesus took the five loaves and the two fish, looked up to heaven, said the blessing over them, broke them and then gave them to the disciples to share with the crowd. This is what we are expected to do each time we receive the Eucharist – go out and be Jesus to the world by taking the gift of the Eucharist and sharing it.

The parishioners of Mother of Perpetual Help do this in very visible ways on a regular basis.

We have always been involved with **sharing food**:

We have a parish food pantry – it is supported by our generous parishioners every week (food too much to tally plus regular financial donations), Hunger Task Force once/month (over \$35,000 worth of food last year), our neighboring community neighbors (regular donation drop-offs), and the Meijer Simply Give campaigns (they match our donations so that we receive thousands of dollars from them in food cards which we then buy food with). We in turn, distribute food two days a week year-round to community members in need. *So far in 2022* we have served 1,456 adults and 326 children (through May). The numbers here are rising.



We donate and prepare food, as well as serve guests at two
Milwaukee Community Meal programs. Together they involve hundreds of MPH volunteers and we welcome
more:



Capuchin Community Services' St. Ben's Community Meal program: they serve over 90,000 people/year; we currently do bag dinners every 3rd and 4th Friday for 85 people; and serve 150+, every 3rd Monday with both sets of numbers going up; St. Vincent de Paul's Crossroads Kitchen Meal Program: here we serve 130+ to-go meals every 5th Friday and Sunday. They hope to resume in person dining soon. We need additional volunteers.

In addition to food:

We make and share Prayer Shawls: 100's per year to parishioners, Zilber Hospice and Froedert Hospital.

We have a Barb's Baby Ministry: here parishioners make and donate baby blankets, burp cloths, and sweaters, as well as donate diapers, wipes, toiletries, new and gently used clothing, pacifiers, bibs, socks, towels, cash and more. We then share these with families with newborns and toddlers, helping about 15 families per month who are referred to us via many local ministries.

GOSPEL MEDITATION ON The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Jesus went to those most in need. He forgave the sinner, ate with the outcast, defended, and fed those who were poor and hungry. He worked for true justice, risked being unpopular, willingly accepted suffering and death, and always stayed connected with his Abba, Father. Jesus also consistently reminded folks that God's compassion, love, and mercy trump everything, even the law. This is the Christ that the Eucharist calls us to be. As we look around our churches, our towns and cities, and our world, there are many people who need to see the face and body of Christ. Some of those most in need may be right within our families. But it is always in the poorest of the poor and those most vulnerable that we find the greatest need. There are many who cannot function on their own. When the gift of the Eucharistic Christ takes root in our hearts, we can more readily see the face of Christ in others.

Many people are vulnerable. Highest on that list are the homeless. They show us the face of Christ. Whatever the cause, to have no place to go and no place to call home takes a toll on the human spirit. For Jesus when there were hungry people, they were fed. God asks us to do the same ... feed people. There are many who are hungry physically, emotionally, and spiritually. Gifted by the Eucharistic presence of Christ, we can bring them Christ. Who are the hungry around us and how can we feed them?

When someone is hurting, you comfort them. When someone is hungry, you feed them. When someone needs clothes, you provide them. When someone is cold, you warm them. When someone is in prison, you visit them. With over a million people who are homeless and over a quarter of them children, it is important to ask the question, "why?" and strategize for ways to lessen or alleviate the problem. Nevertheless, we are not off the hook for responding to the immediate needs that present themselves at our doors. Whether a person's current station in life is self-imposed or the result of being victimized, they are sacred vessels. We cannot lock the door and send them away and still believe we bear the Eucharistic presence of Christ. It doesn't work like that.

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
