This past Sunday was Divine Mercy Sunday. The second reading (I Peter I:3-9) was especially appropriate for our lives over the past weeks. It was about faith that is tested, but faith which finds itself stronger because of the tests that have challenged it. St. Peter knew that we can either grow through adverse circumstances, or just turn away from them and never really move on. It's not only faith, but all life that is subject to being tested by changes and circumstances. Long ago I was taught that what I do with those difficult moments would have a direct bearing on my future and my happiness. If I refuse to give in to hopelessness, I will find a vision that will keep me safe on the journey ahead. I also learned that moving forward is the only real path to salvation. If I hold on to the past (which is so often much better in recollection than it ever was in reality) I will simply stand still. To believe in God, and to believe in ourselves will always help us see the vision that St. Peter's words foretold. Those words promise us of a better world today and eternal happiness forever.

I heard a phrase the other day that caught me off guard. The person said, the doors of the buildings may be closed for now, but the CHURCH is still open, and we are the Body of Christ, the Church. I had to ask myself, "Am I really open to what God is calling me to do right now, or have I shut down?" I confess that the jury is still out on the answer to that one. I hope I am a better, more thoughtful and more reflective person when this is all over. This current time of crisis will be over one day soon, and we need to believe now more than ever that God has been and is always on our side through it all.

As we move ahead together, please remember that Fr. Thomas and I are keeping you all in prayer as we celebrate our masses privately and remember the special needs of every one of you. Thanks also to many of you who have been able to join us through the YouTube celebrations. For all those who don't have computer access, there are many opportunities to be a part of mass on various television and radio outlets.
