

Celebrating the Sacraments

Baptism is celebrated during or after Mass on the second Sunday of the month. Due to current restrictions, all baptisms will take place after Mass until further notice. A Baptismal preparation class is required. Classes will be held quarterly in 2020/2021, so it is recommended you schedule a class early, possibly before your child is born. You must call the parish office to register for the class and the Baptism.

<u>Reconciliation (Confession)</u> At this time reconciliation is by appointment only. Please call the pastor to set up an appointment. A regular schedule for monthly Confession will be announced when available.

<u>Anointing of the Sick</u> Until further notice, individual anointing may be requested by calling the pastor.

<u>Weddings</u> Please call the Parish office to make arrangements no later than 6 months prior to your anticipated date. A process of preparation including participation in an Archdiocesan Engaged Encounter is required of all couples seeking marriage in the church.



GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

November 15, 2020 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

God gives us the gift of His very self and asks us to invest it. Investing God's greatest gift of Himself wisely, allows God's kingdom to grow and flourish. God trusts us with this pearl of great price in hopes that it will produce abundant fruit. While God's gift of self is realized in the gifts of faith, hope, and love, they are not meant to be solely for personal benefit. They are intended to be shared and are at the heart of Jesus' blueprint for happiness, the Beatitudes.

When we properly invest God's greatest gift, His most treasured possession, we invest in the wellbeing of all of our brothers and sisters and the world in which we live. We take up most seriously our call to be stewards and properly manage, not only our own affairs, but the affairs of those around and before us. God has put tremendous confidence in us. Do we have that same confidence in God?

We often go the extra mile and put in the additional effort when it comes to those concerns closest to us: our families, friends, careers, home and securities. But when it comes to things that are not as close to us, we can become lax and less conscientious. Tending to God's treasure requires a great deal of focus and persistent hard work. It demands that I see the bigger picture, God's picture, in which self-sacrifice is a given as we labor for the establishment of God's kingdom, God's vision. Fear and a lack of trust can loom large, however. We are afraid of letting go of what is "mine" and apprehensive of jeopardizing what we have in order to venture into something bigger and more promising.

Fear and a lack of trust serve no purpose in God's kingdom. They benefit neither the person nor God. What is required is a courageous resolve that produces the fortitude necessary to stay the course and do what God is asking. Doing all in our power to cultivate the seeds of faith, hope, and love in our world, working diligently to put all of our relationships in proper order, becoming attentive to systems and ideologies that hurt and oppress people, being mindful of injustice, and laboring on behalf of the poor and the needy are at the core of what each of us is asked to do. It is how we invest God's most precious gift wisely. If persistent, alert and attentive, then life will gradually improve around us, there will be greater peace and we will experience joy.




First Reconciliation Meeting

Catholics and the Mystery of Death IV: How to Help a Grieving Person during the Holidays

A family member, neighbor, co-worker or friend may be dreading the approach of the holidays and you are wondering how you can help them. Here are some thoughts:

- 1. Listen to them. Listen to their feelings, their thoughts, their stories, their memories. Then listen some more.
- 2. Become at ease with any bursts of emotion. Don't immediately force any tissue on them. Let them emote.
- 3. Go on walks with them, on their schedule, preferably outdoors.
- 4. Assist them if they wish, with their holiday chores: shopping wrapping, decorating, mailing.
- 5. Assist them, if they wish, with their everyday chores: grocery shopping, errand running, household tasks or child care. Remember their energy is in short supply.
- 6. Let food be an elemental way to express your loving care. Take meals in to them or invite them to eat with you.
- 7. Give them a gift basket or box that they can open immediately and fill it with things like a candle, writing, some of their favorite treats.
- 8. Accept and protect their need for privacy and solitude.
- 9. Let go of any expectations about how they should grieve so they can grieve in their own best way.
- 10. Be a consistent, calming, accepting presence with phone calls, your emails, your visits, your notecards.
- 11. If they ask for your feedback on decisions they are making, give it. If they ask...
- 12. Radiate genuine hope for them, either with or without your words.
- 13. Ask them, "What would help?" and then do it.
- 14. Be present to them after the holidays in as many ways as before the holidays. Each time brings its own need.
- 15. Carry this person you love, and carry their loved one too, in your heart and soul through each of the days leading up to and away from each holiday. You need not let them know you are doing that because if you really are doing it, they will know and be grateful.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Brothers and Sisters of MPH Parish,

Once again, thank you for all the kindness, prayers and good wishes you have sent my way these past few weeks. This week I want to share some news as well as some thoughts for us as we move forward. I will begin with my current situation.

- A few years ago, when my gallbladder surgery happened, I found out that I have what is called NASH or Non-Alcoholic Fatty Liver disease. It has several possible side effects, but mostly invisible symptoms until they begin to occur. The past year or so I had some digestive and other physical issues and found it had progressed to cirrhosis. Around Labor Day weekend I became very ill and went to the hospital the first time. I have had several attempts at treatments but, none have brought any permanent relief. On the 6th I was transferred from Elmbrook to Froedtert and have since learned that my long-term prognosis will require a liver transplant. Over the past two weeks the process to figure out the details and possible time frame have been taking place. I know that this will mean a significant change in my life for a while, but I wanted to share that information with all of you at this time. When I know more, I will share that with you as the story unfolds. I would also like to tell you how important it is to take care of yourselves. Fatty liver is impacting millions of lives, and many people are unaware that it can often be treated successfully before it's too late. It is truly a challenge to us all, especially given our lifestyle and diet as North Americans.
- As we talk about so many of the challenges to our lives and the life of our parish community, we often wonder what will happen next? First, as mentioned in previous communications, we have received an offer from a charter school to purchase our St. Aloysius property. The Archbishop has given us the necessary permission to move ahead with negotiations. If all works out, we will be selling the property shortly after the New Year.
- At that time, the 7 PM Mass Sunday night will move to the 106th Street site. We will share in a farewell mass after Christmas, and then move on with our plans to create one liturgical site. To move ahead, we will also be implementing the rest of the Mass changes the first weekend of July. We waited two years to make this move and the time has come to embrace it. All weekend masses will take place at the 106th Street site beginning July 4th weekend. I have learned several important lessons during these last months and beginning each day with confidence and faith renewed is the only way to continue our development as a Faith Community. I know it is hard for all of us, and I know and respect the fact that some will choose not to continue with us, but the time has come to act faithfully and sincerely. To continue to stand still or accept the status quo will only prolong implementing decisions that have already been made.
- Let us move together as we strive to come closer to God through our Worship and Ministry. There will be more information in the monthly letter in two weeks, and until then, please be safe, be careful and take care of yourselves as we make our way through these interesting and challenging times.
