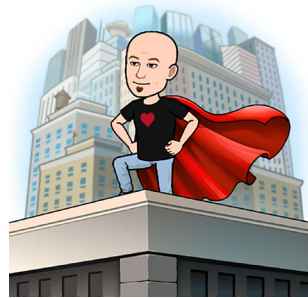

The dawning of a new day

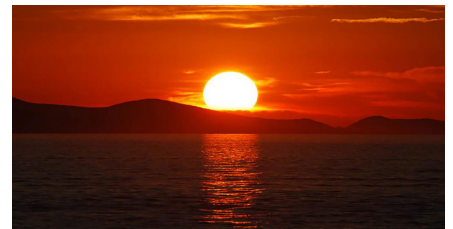

After the pandemic's dark night, a new day is dawning.

The numbers have improved significantly! The Newton Correctional Facility currently has zero individuals positive for COVID-19. In fact, there are only seven inmates and three staff members within the entire Iowa Department of Corrections who are positive for COVID-19 (as of June 19, 2021).

It appears the worst is behind us. It's been 15 months since New Life volunteers and mentors were "locked out" of the prison. However, 59% of the inmates in Iowa prisons are now fully vaccinated, and vaccinated inmates will be able to have in-person visitors starting in July. This change will allow our mentors to resume their one-on-one ministry. Meanwhile, volunteers continue to wait for the vaccination process to be finalized. Please pray for the prison staff who will decide when to reopen. Pray for the in-person ministry of New Life Prison Church to return soon.
