It was exciting to see the guys lined up by the door going into the gym, waiting eagerly for their turn to sign in for worship on a Thursday morning. It had been a long while since this many could come together and worship with their Christian brothers. Seeing the joy and excitement on their faces was a great start to the day. It only got better from there.

The service was bilingual, so we heard it in both English and Spanish. As I listened to two inmates sing "Silent Night" in Spanish, I could only sit back and truly feel like I was part of the song. I could not understand a word they sang, but since I know the song, it was easy to worship with them and know what they were singing. Those two men accompanied themselves with guitars and sang with the most beautiful harmony. I wanted to record it so I could share it with you (but that is not allowed). The only recording is in my memory.

Listening to the men joyfully sing familiar carols as they were led by two keyboards and several guitars was pure bliss. Several of the inmates are so willing to share their gifts and leadership skills to help lead worship. The inmates truly know how to worship. You could feel the presence of the Holy Spirit in that place. The end of the hour and a half came all too quickly.

As we shared the gospel message of Christmas and had a four-week Advent liturgy condensed into less than an hour, we could see them taking it all in. Hearing their comments afterward was indeed heartwarming. I was truly blessed and honored to be a small part of this event. I sure wish you could have been there.

For most people, getting locked out of prison is wonderful. But some of us New Life volunteers are excited about our *return to prison!*

In 2011, New Life Church went into the prison for the first time, and I was part of that very first service. I went in with some trepidation because I had a distorted view of prison from movies and television. It was nothing like I expected. I found people very much like me, who'd made bad choices ... and been caught. I loved it from the very first visit.

My husband, Dwight, and I went in regularly for many years and made friends with the men there. We prayed with them and for them as they dealt with the daily struggles and disappointments of prison life.

Then, due to prison regulations, we were not permitted to go in for some time. After COVID, Dwight and I reapplied and were again given permission to be inside the walls. After going in a couple of times, we were notified that due to a discrepancy on our application we were denied ... AGAIN!

Following the required yearlong wait, we reapplied and were allowed into the prison. What a JOY that has been! It is such a delight to see how the church on the inside is flourishing. The inmate-led services are so heartfelt and sincere, and we see so much growth. What a reminder that we are only instruments and that the Holy Spirit is doing His work.

We rejoice that God has made a path for us to be back inside and hope to continue His work in the prison for as long as we are able.
