During the sub-committee meeting, the biggest impact was made by a man and a woman who had both committed felonies. Their speeches were quite passionate, because the legislation would affect them directly. Everyone in attendance spoke in favor of the change.

Volunteer spotlight: Dale Albright

How did you get started at New Life Prison Church?

For a number of years, I would stop and visit my uncle and aunt, Ernest and Jean De Jong. Those visits always included their prison ministry. After I quit working full-time, I started volunteering with New Life.

What did it mean to receive the Flame Fund Reward?

The Flame Fund is an endowment from a very small country church near Conroy, Iowa. The by-laws of the endowment require that a percentage of the yearly income be given to local causes, regional causes, and national and international causes. I am not a member of this church, but an acquaintance recommended I

apply. New Life was given the award as a local cause. It was an honor to be a tool in applying for and receiving a portion of the endowment for the benefit of New Life Prison Church.

Why do you feel inspired to help men in prison?

First, I was inspired by what this ministry meant to my uncle and aunt. In addition, so much of Biblical history revolves around prisons and prisoners, in both the Old and New Testaments. Jesus instructs us to take his Gospel to all corners and to all peoples. I felt this was a way I could serve outside "normal channels."

Why do you drive over 60 miles each way every Thursday?

For me, I feel it is necessary for the prisoners to know we are committed to them and care for them—that they know they are part of God's family. By being as regular as I can, I hope they feel and understand this. I hope they keep it as a part of their current prison lives, as well as their future lives when they are released from prison.

It is important to note that this is just my personal feeling and not an expectation I believe needs to apply to other volunteers.

How has New Life Prison Church impacted your life?

New Life has impacted me in ways I never anticipated. My original intent was to use this ministry as a way to give of myself, but the reality is that I also receive. Being part of Brothers-in-Blue was impactful and a unique way to witness how Christ changes lives. Being a tool in the ministry of Christ is a privilege.

The third week of each month, when a regular service is conducted, is as meaningful as any Sunday service. The communion we receive with the prisoners, which is served by the inside council members, is very impactful for me. It gives a special feeling of Jesus' command of doing this in remembrance of Him and sharing it with prisoners.
