
Remember the prisoner

New Life is now an organized church

We give thanks to God for the final stamp of approval for New Life to become an organized church!

At the February 8 meeting of Classis Central Plains of the Christian Reformed Church, delegates voted decisively in favor of the status change. On Sunday, March 1, we gathered with the outside members for a meal and discussed forming a council on the outside to replace the New Life Board. We currently have 36 commissioned members for New Life. A commissioned member will have a dual membership at their outside church and New Life. We also have a council on the inside made up of incarcerated men who are strong believers. The outside council will primarily be administrative, while the inside council will focus on serving and shepherding. Please keep New Life Prison Church in your prayers.

What does New Life becoming an organized church mean for the men in the Newton Correctional Facility? The chapel clerk, Steve, reflects, "New Life is more than just a ministry; it's an extended family. The volunteers aren't just visitors—they represent a piece of life that is missing for many inmates. In a world driven by condemnation and unforgiveness, New Life is a constant reminder of God's never-failing presence. It's definitely a light that always shines in the darkness."

Max: As a family, we work together to serve the men in the prison.


Who are the men we serve?
