Hello Alamitos Heights Neighbors,

Next year, our Alamitos Heights Improvement Association (AHIA) will be celebrating 100 years of service to the community! In 1923, the focus of AHIA was to beautify our neighborhood. In those days oil wells dominated the landscape and by 1927

Alamitos Heights was open for oil drilling. Our neighborhood logo of an oil well turning into a Royal Palm symbolizes this focus on cleaning up the land and beautifying our community.

Over the years, the focus of AHIA has expanded, our current mission statement is, "Creating Community Together." As 2022 draws to a close I am very proud of the work AHIA has accomplished in creating community. After two years of COVID restrictions we successfully brought back our Easter Egg Hunt, Neighborhood Picnic, Toss-Shred-Recycle Event, and more than two dozen Wine Down Friday gatherings! We also hosted two Community Meetings at the Greek Orthodox Church so that neighbors could meet the candidates for the 3<sup>rd</sup> District Council Seat and for the office of Mayor of Long Beach.

#### Remembering Bill Thomas

He joined the AHIA board in 2006 and held positions such as treasurer, vicepresident, and president. He and Shirley were recipients of AHIA's Pioneer Award in 2012. He loved to garden and take care of his Koi fish (who were great listeners of his stories). He was an avid reader and a quite a writer. He documented and wrote about regional history, global politics, religion as well as his thoughts, life journeys and philosophies. He was a college athlete, Navy pilot, businessman, entrepreneur, world traveler, husband, father, grandfather, friend, and a terrific neighbor to many. He will be missed.







#### How Is Your Watering?

With all the talk of ongoing drought and climate change it seems like a good time to take a hard look at the landscapes in our neighborhood. There are some misconceptions about water usage in the landscape. There is a big difference between sprin-



klers watering lawns several times per week and deep watering trees and shrubs with a focused drip system once or twice per week. Shrinking our lawns or removing them all together and replacing with permeable surfaces, pathways and landscaping can save thousands of gallons of water per month. Often a non-turf surface can be more usable as a surface for outdoor furniture or play equipment. Another benefit of lawn free landscaping? A weekly 'mow and blow' service can be eliminated cutting down on noise and air pollution.

Watering our trees should be a priority, the tree canopy in Alamitos Heights is one of the features that makes our neighborhood so charming. Selecting the right tree for the right location is very important so you don't set yourself up for an expensive trimming habit to keep a large tree from outgrowing a small space. Do your research, or hire a pro, before planting to avoid this common mistake. AHIA will be sponsoring the planting of parkway trees this coming Fall and Winter. If you are missing a street tree, please contact us to see about planting a new Brisbane Box Tree or Arbutus 'Marina' in place of a Magnolia. You can see a nice example of the trees that we planted last year at the corner of 6th street and Los Altos.

By planting shrubs and perennials that are native to our climate you will be supporting wildlife, Birds, Butterflies and Bees, without battling to keep plants better suited to a wetter, cooler climate healthy. Plants native to Australia and South Africa do just as well, and sometimes better in the landscape as California Natives, some of which tend to go 'summer dormant' and look a little out of place in a more traditional style landscape. Many nurseries have sections devoted to these plants.

October-April is the best time to plant in Southern California. Take advantage of the expanded Lawn-to-Garden program offered by the Long Beach Water Department for incentives and ideas at https://lblawntogarden.com.
