Open Channel Project Update



An important change to our area is the open channel project. It is underway and here is a brief update on where the project stands. The city has selected Reyes construction to build the open channel project. Reyes recently completed the second phase of Naples Seawall replacement, and finished on schedule and on budget, a good sign.

Construction costs for the project have risen since the project was initially funded 3 years ago, and the city is negotiating with the Port of Long Beach to help cover the shortfall. Assuming the additional funding is secured, the contract would go next to city council for approval (May-June?) and construction would begin in the Fall. Duration is still believed to be 12-24months. Deep your eyes out for progress over the coming months.

The Founding of Marina Vista Park



During the late 1970's, oil operations occupying what is now Marina Vista Park were consolidated into the small oil pump operation adjacent to Marine Stadium. In addition, soil dredged during the creation of the Spinnaker Bay Channel was added to the land that would become the park. But the soil had a high salt content making it poor for planting and the city lacked funds to build the park.

It was at that time, Jan Hall Zolin, Former 3rd District Council Woman, reached out to the AHIA Board President Virginia Benedict to see if they could mobilize Alamitos Heights neighbors to make the park a reality. After some negotiations, the City agreed to put in the irrigation if Jan and Virginia could raise the money to get all the grass and to have it planted! And that is just what they did.

Park Nursery (now Armstrong Garden) agreed to provide all the grass and to chip in half the cost themselves. Alamitos Heights Improvement Association raised the other half of the funds. But because the soil was poor, regular grass seed could not be used!

Instead, Park Nursery recommended the park be planted with stolons, an above-the-ground stem that creeps along the surface of the soil and growing a clone of the original plant on the end. These had to be hand planted one at a time no more than 6 inches apart from each other so they could form a root colony to survive.

Jan and Virginia solved the grass issue, now find a way to plant this grass all over Marina Vista Park! They organized a group of more than 100 volunteers from Alamitos Heights neighborhood, along with neighboring communities Belmont Heights, Belmont Park, and Belmont Shore, to hand plant all of Marina Vista Park. Jan also worked with the Long Beach Firefighters Association Local 372 to donate the baseball diamond and backstop for the park!

The progress continues. In March, Council Woman Suzie Price unveiled the new Colorado Lagoon Playground. She has championed opening the channel between the Colorado Lagoon and Alamitos Bay's Marine Stadium to improve the lagoon's water quality.

It's a great reminder the Alamitos Heights community, with other neighborhood organizations, have made lasting contributions to everyone's quality of life. Today the work to be good stewards of Marina Vista Park, the Colorado Lagoon, and all our precious inter coastal



waterways continues. Central to these efforts are neighborhoods with a shared sense of community coupled with strong local representation.

AHIA is Helping You Clean Up: Toss - Shred - Recycle Event - May 21

Need a place to take all those things you've been meaning to get rid of? We've got you covered. Alamitos Heights Improvement Association (AHIA) continuously look to find ways to make our neighborhood better and serve the



needs of Alamitos Heights residents. That's why we're bringing back Toss-Shred-Recycle Event free to all current AHIA members. Nonmembers are welcome to take advantage for a small fee.

Get it Shred: A shredding truck will be available from 9

AM to Noon. The 1st 10 Standard Boxes are free to current members. And \$1 per box starting with #11. Bring those old tax returns and personal papers for safe destruction. Nonmembers fee will be \$5 per box. There is no limit to the number of boxes you can bring.

Dump it: AHIA provided a 40-yard dumpster to collect refuse too large for city waste bins such as such as old mattresses, wood, old furniture, appliances. It will be available from 9am until it is full or noon. When it's full, it will be closed. Use of the dumpster is for AHIA members only.

Recycle: Bring your metal, household batteries, electronic waste, cardboard, car tires – this is free to all residents. We were fortunate to have the Long Beach Conservation Corps participate with us in the event.

AHIA \$35 dues may be paid on the day of event by cash or check, or PayPal . If you're not an AHIA member, please join to support events like this.
