At this 3-hour event it is surprising how many items are tossed, recycled and shredded. Who knew there were so many household batteries in Alamitos Heights? The

recycling of metals, electronics and batteries are free to all Alamitos Heights residents. This year we have a simple request. If you are not a member or have not renewed your dues, please join or renew. If our dues are too much for what you want to toss or shred, please make a cash donation commensurate with your use of the dumpster or document shredding truck. The dumpster and shredding are available until full or noon whichever happens first.

We are grateful for the support of the Port of Long Beach, the 3rd District office, and the Conservation Corps of Long Beach.

We have our preliminary City permits. But all permits are subject to state and local regulations pertaining to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Spotlight on a Neighbor: Elizabeth Lucas





Liz didn't begin her career as an artist, but as a teacher of biology and physiology where she would draw to help students.






An accomplished calligrapher, she cultivated her artistic skills



AHIA is an all-volunteer nonprofit organization dedicated to creating community and sponsoring improvements within Alamitos Heights. The COVID-19 pandemic has forced us to cancel and adjust important parts of our schedule.

In spite of the pandemic we have accomplished several of our neighborhood improvement goals. We purchased new plants and replanted the 6th street traffic circles.

In doing this project we initiated requests and cooperated with the City of LB Public Works Department to remove the previously installed Agave plants and double check and repair the irrigation system as needed.

We haven't gotten to upgrading and replanting the Manila "median" (the strip of land between Manilla and Bellflower) yet. However, we did cause Public Works to inspect and repair the irrigation system, reset the automatic sprinkler timers, and remove and stump grind some plants in preparation for replanting, refreshing and updating the landscaping. As a result of our efforts, Public

Works is working closer with the

City's subcontractor on cleaning up and maintaining the median. As the pandemic restrictions ease, we are looking forward to more activity in our summer and fall programs including our Toss It-Recycle It-Shred It day and our annual Lagoon Tree Lighting Ceremony. There is likely room for additional safer outdoor activities. We whole-heartedly welcome your ideas and suggestions! Parkway and Yard Landscaping Tips



As residents replace their grass lawns with drought tolerant plantings, there are some common problems to avoid. Remember, drought tolerant plants need some irrigation and street trees need regular and deep watering. One planting concern are the dangerous sharp thorns on many popular Agaves. The Agaves are not appropriate for

planting adjacent to sidewalks. As they mature the thorns are a danger to pedestrians. Consider other Succulents and Aloe's, with similar traits minus the vicious thorns.

'Sticks on Fire' (Euphorbia tirucalli) is another popular plant encroaching on sidewalks. This plant emits a poisonous milky sap that painfully burns the skin and eyes and may cause blindness. These are really dangerous and probably should be sold with a warning label. Never plant this in areas where people or pets could brush up against them. 'Sticks on Fire' grow to be very large and are difficult to maintain. Every time they are cut toxic sap pours out.

Sometimes a pretty plant is more than a pretty plant. Learning more about plants before installing them will make your landscaping a beautiful, long lasting, and rewarding improvement to your property. Plus it will be it safer for children, pets and adults.



Sticks on Fire

In Memory of a Neighbor

In April, Alamitos Heights lost a treasured resident – Cynthia (Cindy) Desatoff. She was a long-time active Alamitos Heights resident, instrumental in the restoration of Colorado Lagoon, and beloved by neighborhood kids. We reprint this excellent article about Cindy as published in the Grunion Gazette and written by Harry Saltzgaver.

Cynthia Desatoff, 67, who helped found the Friends of the Colorado Lagoon and successfully fought Los Angeles County over water quality there, died April 27 at her home.

Desatoff was born Cynthia Lynn Zinszer in Kansas, husband Paul Desatoff said. She moved to California with her parents in the mid-1950s and was raised in Topanga Canyon with two younger sisters, Pamela and Debra, and younger brother Ron.

Cynthia became a model and actor in her teens and early 20s and toured the country for Disney Studios as Cinderella. She was working in film and television production when she met and married director/cameraman Paul Desatoff. They raised two daughters, Jennifer and Margaret, together.

The couple moved to a home on Monrovia, overlooking the

Colorado Lagoon, in 1995. The next year, public meetings began about the Termino Avenue Storm Drain, which ends at the lagoon.



"There was a meeting at Jefferson Middle School," Desatoff said. "It was evident from the beginning it (the project) was a disaster. We met Michael Paul and Ray Thorn there... We met with people in the neighborhood, and she said 'come over to my house and we'll talk. That's when FoCl (Friends of Colorado Lagoon) began."

Cynthia continued to lead the charge, speaking at City Council meetings and participating in the lawsuit against Los Angeles County that FoCL ultimately won — a victory critical to the lagoon's restoration.

"She would sit quietly at FOCL meetings, taking in everything being said," friend Tina Pirazzi said, "and when she had absorbed everything, only then would she make thoughtful, yet poignant comments, letting everyone know in her quiet way, that she had listened carefully to everything that had just been said."

"Cindy was just an old Topanga Canyon hippie," Desatoff said. "(FOCL) will live on as an example of her dedication to making, not just Long Beach but the world, a viable and more beautiful environment."

In addition to her siblings, daughters and husband, Cynthia leaves behind granddaughter Charlotte Lynn Taylor and many nieces, nephews and cousins. A memorial is tentatively planned for July 3, pending COVID19 restrictions.

A Tree in Every Parkway

In April and May, West Coast Arborists, Inc. moved efficiently through our neighborhood trimming trees. Paying special attention to the Tuliptree Scale affected Magnolias. When they left 32 of the most severely infested trees were removed, plus their stumps ground out.

Replacing those trees will take planning and planting effort. It will require growing time and regular watering of new trees. AHIA's goal is to fill every parkway with a tree.

We've begun this project by contacting City departments and officials. And we are looking at suppliers for best in class product and pricing. We are reviewing the AHIA budget for funds to invest in trees. Plus we are looking for home-owners who might step up

and purchase trees so we can help with spotting the planting location and help with digging holes for new trees.

The urge is to replant right now. Yet the fall is the best time to plant to maximize tree survival. Fall is when the weather is cooler and the freshly planted tree doesn't have to fight the hot summer heat and can acclimate to its new home.

AHIA's Tree Committee recommends two trees. Both are visually compatible with our Magnolias. They are drought resistant with a manageable root system. And they are Tuliptree Scale resistant. Each option is cleaner, dropping fewer leaves and neither drops cones that are tripping hazards like the magnolias. Our recommended


trees will create a legacy urban forest with an eye catching and cooling shade canopy to rival what we have today.

We recommend either the Brisbane Box Tree - Tristania (Lophostemon) conferta. This is a moderate to fast growing vertical evergreen tree with a well-mannered root system and interesting bark. Or the slow to moderate growing evergreen Marina Strawberry Tree - Arbutus 'Marina' with its broad canopy and beautiful flowers and red peeling bark. This tree is planted in our 6th Street traffic circles.
