In April, KWOS members had a rare treat: two professional presentations; the first from KWOS vice president, Leigh Coolidge at the Key West Tropical Forest and Botanic Garden on 20th April, finally introducing our collaboration to preserve and produce native Florida and Caribbean basin orchids.

have just received photos of our first seedings, which have been produced in collaboration with Fairchild Tropical Gardens in Coral Gables. Fairchild have been doing our laboratory work as part of their Million Orchid Project.

Once our facilities are a reality at the Botanic Garden, we will be doing flasking and propagation here in the Keys. The focus is on the five species of native orchids: brassia caudata, encyclia tampiensis, epidendum nocturnum, cyrtiopodium punctatum, and vanilla barbellata.

Before any of this can happen however, is the minor matter of fund raising. This effort will prove to be the most important undertaking the KWOS has ever attempted, and a departure from our friendly social get togethers. The road to success here is largely dependent upon, not just professionalism, but basic fund-raising capabilities.

José Exposito, of Soroa Orchids in Homestead, and long-time supporter of the KWOS, gave an effortless, highly informative, and entertaining presentation on growing tips and a survival guide for orchid lovers in south Florida. Having lost his entire nursery in 1992, when Andrew mowed down a very narrow stretch across Homestead, he has dispensed with frills, gives a nononsense presentation without the help of any pictorial aids, which boils down to a how-to-guide to grow orchids here in the Keys. He did observe that we tend to throw together various species under the same tree and expect them to flourish even though each species requires different growing conditions.

Since the Covid pandemic we have not held summer meetings at members' homes. In the past, the summer meetings also featured snacks and drinks in addition to the opportunity to see members' orchid collections. If anyone would like to take on this opportunity, we will get the information out to the membership.
