Ezekiel 36:26 - I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh.

Have you ever stepped outside and felt the shift in the air? The breeze carries a different scent, the sun sits lower in the sky, and the leaves begin to let go. Seasons don't ask permission to change, they simply do. And in that quiet transformation, God whispers a truth: change is not only natural, it's necessary.

There was a time when I felt stuck—emotionally, spiritually, even relationally. Like winter had settled into my soul. I was going through the motions, but something inside had hardened. I didn't laugh as easily. I didn't pray as freely. I didn't love as deeply.

Challenge for this Month:

Recognize your season. Are you in a time of pruning, planting, or harvest? Ask God to show you what He's doing in this season of your life.

<u>Let the Spirit move freely</u>. Don't resist the wind of change. Invite the Holy Spirit to stir up what's stagnant and breathe life into what's dormant.

<u>Lean into transformation</u>. Heart change isn't cosmetic, it's foundational. Let God dig deep, even if it's uncomfortable. He's not interested in surface-level fixes; He wants to make you new.

Prayer: Lord, I see the seasons changing around me, and I feel the shift within me. Thank You for not leaving me where I was. Thank You for the promise of a new heart and a new spirit. Help me to embrace the transformation You're working in me. Let my life reflect Your grace, Your growth, and Your glory.



What is an Advent Wreath?

The Advent wreath is a beautiful reminder of what the season of Advent is all about. Its circle shape shows us that God's love has no beginning and no end, and the evergreen branches remind us of the new life we have in Christ. Each candle on the wreath has a special meaning as we prepare our hearts for Christmas.

The first candle is the candle of **Hope**, reminding us to trust in God's promises. The second is **Love**, showing us how deeply God cares for us by sending His Son. The third candle represents **Joy**, celebrating the happiness we feel as Christmas gets closer. The fourth candle is **Peace**, reminding us of the angels' message of peace on earth when Jesus was born.

Finally, the center **Christ Candle** is lit on Christmas Eve, celebrating that Jesus, the true light of the world, has come to us.

Wethodist Historical Woment

Rev. James Mellard and Rev. Joseph Travis

In 1804 membership slowly grew, but weekly attendance was poor. Rev. James Mellard, serving his one year in Georgetown, decided to do something to boost the crowds for his sermons. Mellard marched to the middle of Front Street in Georgetown near the market. He began to preach – loudly – with great zeal to every sinner he saw pass by.

Within minutes Mellard was the talk of the town. Some men in military uniforms tried to drown him out with a drum and bugle. The Reverend shouted louder. The men threatened to throw him in the Sampit River. He kept on preaching. One of the men drew a sword, but he continued until his sermon was complete.

Mellard's street preaching worked. Great crowds filled the sanctuary. At a time when all other preachers were rotated after one year, Mellard was sent to Georgetown for a second 12 months.

Joseph Travis was the next minister to spend time in Georgetown where he found a large number of black members, but less than a dozen whites. William Wayne, the town's first Methodist, was elderly but still dedicated and at work. Travis' first Sunday on the job in Georgetown, people packed the church to hear the new minister. But - men smoked cigars during the service!

After months of hard work, Travis built up his congregation. He had few members, but the church was crowded. People with no church membership and even Episcopalians came to hear him preach. Still, Travis' worries were far from over. Local people threw broken bricks at the church building at night. Others threatened to throw him in a local pond. Travis was lame; he couldn't swim and would drown.

For three nights men waited outside the church door to seize him. The third night Travis preached to a filled room. As the service ended, a mixed-race man rushed forward to the pulpit. He told Travis to leave quickly in the middle of the crowd. Travis sneaked outside before the three men knew he was gone.


Once away from the church, Travis found a friend waiting to protect him. John Shackelford was no Methodist. He was wealthy, influential and the owner of 11 slaves. Shackelford had heard the men were planning to drown the preacher and wanted to help. Shackelford saw him safely to a Mrs. Carr's house not far from the church. The preacher hid there until the mob gave up and went home.

Travis kept on preaching even when he was discouraged. Once he wrote that it was good he was broke and had hocked his horse, or he would have ridden straight out of town.

Travis was about to give up on Georgetown when he had a strange vision one night. He dreamed a huge raging bull blocked the door to the local church. He cried for help from the onlooking crowd, but no one came forward. Travis then shouted, "In the name of God, I seize you." He caught the bull by the horns and twisted its neck around completely. The bull ran. It crept under the church, never to be seen again. Travis woke up. He believed the dream was a sign. He would win souls in this "bull" of a town.

A few Sundays later, Travis watched strange things happening in the church. About halfway through his sermon, a "tawdry-dressed" woman fell out of her seat and shouted for mercy. Then another person shouted. And another. Suddenly the whole congregation stood up as if in a trance. No one was smiling. Every face was deathly pale. Travis took this as a sign that he had "conquered the bull." He hopped down from the pulpit and invited all sinners forward, adding 30 or 40 to his flock in one night.


