### "You've Got Everything, But You've Got Nothing" **Revelation 3:14-22**

#### Intro:

- \* Talk about people who have everything and apparently seems to lack nothing
- \* Illustration: Some students at Pine Ridge (Nate Kanter, Alex Martin)
- \* Make the point that when we think of these people, we usually think of non-believers We almost expect this of non-believers whose money often becomes their God
- **Transition:** The troubling thing about the situation in the church in Laodicea is that they have a huge spiritual condition problem because of the discrepancy between the way they see themselves and the reality of how Jesus sees them

They see themselves as:

- 1. Having Everything and Needing Nothing: (verse 17)
- A. Saying we are rich and do not need a thing! ( this is spiritual arregance)
- B. This is everyone in the church, including the pastor

But Jesus sees them as:

- 2. Having Nothing and Needing Everything: (verses 15-17)
- A. Jesus knows you and your deeds and knows the truth
- They should know better (Colossians 2:1-3; 4:15-16)
- B. You are lukewarm (useless, good for nothing)

He wishes they were either cold or hot because both are beneficial, but lukewarm is not!

Illustration (John Bevere): Cold-don't know God and know they don't know God Hot-know God and looks like they know God

Luke Warm-think they know God and therefore don't think they need God

> this is a person who can blend with the cold or blend with the hot

Jesus will spit them out: He will spit them out because they are not really part of the body; spit out rather than ingested because they are not beneficial to the body

Illustration (John Bevere): can't vomit a steak on a plate because it is not in the body can only vomit something out that

does not really belong to the body

C. You are miserable and wretched

- D. You are poor (Matthew 16:19-21; 19:22-24; Luke 12:15-34; 1 Tim 6:17; James 5:2,3) You have riches, but they do you no good!
- E. You are blind (

You have eye salve to help you see, but it does you no good!

F. You are naked (Matt 22:1-14; Romans 13:14; Revelation 16:15) You have beautiful wool to clothe you but it does you no good!

# G. These are the words of the Amen (valid, binding, trustworthy, true)

Faithful and True Witness (verify what seen heard known) The Ruler of God's Creation

### 3. Where to Go to Get What You Need: (verses 18-20)

A. Counseled to buy from Jesus (only Jesus can give them what they really need!)

- \* Gold Refined with Fire (1 Peter 1:7) rather than the easy life
- \* White Clothes to Wear rather than the black garments of sin
- \* Salve to Put On Your Eyes rather than seeing things from a worldly perspect

B. Hear His Voice and Open the Door

they have everything they need but the one thing they really need and that is fellowship with Jesus You may believe you know Him, but He does not

know you

Illustration: Someone may meet Michael Jordan on the street and say, "I know you" and he will say, "who are you"

C. Be Earnest and Repent

D. You will get what you need and a lot more: the right to sit with me on my throne...

Know:

**Deeds:** 

**Cold:** As a metaphor: it does not represent spiritual lifelessness or an absence of zeal Rather, it signifies a good quality and is analogous to one of the two conditions (hot or cold) in which water proves beneficial

That one's life is neither cold nor hot is to say it is devoid of any good quality **Hot:** Used figuratively, meaning fervent

Wish: An indeclinable particle of wishing or interjection meaning o that! Or would that! One or the Other: Hot or cold

### <u>3:16</u>

Lukewarm: Lukewarm, tepid

The church is likened to lukewarm water, an emetic, something good for little more than inducing vomit and is censured for this blighted condition Hot and cold represent beneficial qualities just as hot water soothes the body and clod water quenches the thirst

God can't find any redeeming feature of this church because it is spiritually bankrupt

About To: Implying purpose, meaning to have in mind, to intend, will Present Indicative Active:

**Spit:** To spit out, vomit with contempt Aorist Infinitive Active:

**Rich:** Happy, prosperous, lacking nothing

Acquired Wealth: Not rich toward God, meaning laying up no treasure in heaven Equal to being happy, where it means to make oneself rich because of the belief that in riches there is happiness (1 Cor 4:8)

Do Not Need: Of personal need, want

Present Indicative Active:

A Thing: Nothing

Realize: To perceive, be aware of, understand

Wretched:

Pitiful: Worthy of pity, pitiable, full of misery, wretched, miserable

**Poor:** Figuratively, a poor, helpless man, a beggar

Blind: Figuratively, in respect to the mind as being blind, ignorant, stupid, slow of understanding

Naked: Naked of spiritual clothing (the imputed righteousness of faith)

Counsel: To counsel with someone, advise

Present Indicative Active:

**Buy:** To buy a thing

Aorist Infinitive Active:

Gold: Spiritually, it denotes the true riches of Christ

**Refined:** To be tried with fire, purified as metals

Perfect Participle Passive:

Fire: Of evils, calamities, trials which purify the faith in hearts of Christians as fire tries and purifies precious metals

Become Rich: Refers to personal enrichment by appropriating Christ principle of sacrifice

Aorist Subjunctive Active:

White Clothes: Symbolically

Wear: To clothe oneself, be clothed

Aorist Subjunctive Middle:

Cover: To not make apparent, visible, show openly

Aorist Subjunctive Passive:

Shameful Nakedness: Spiritual nakedness, being destitute of spiritual clothing of the righteousness which is by faith (cause of the shame)

Salve: A topical remedy applied to the eyes

**Put On:** To anoint (sacred), but with mundane meaning such as to rub with eye salve Aorist Indicative Active:

Love: To have affection for someone with Christian love
