	We will be asking for contact details from those
	who gather so that we can help with the 'track
	and trace' program. This is not a requirement
	but continuing to use the track and trace system
	will allow the NHS to monitor the spread and
	individuals to know if they may have come into
	contact with the virus.
	Track and Trace QR codes, linked to the
	NHS Track and Trace app are displayed in
	the Minster.
	We will also offer paper based methods of
	providing this information.
	Surfaces within the Minster are being regularly
	cleaned and sanitized.
	All areas of the church will now be accessible.
	The children's area will be temporarily re-
	instated into the church on the South side while
	the Social Supermarket is still in place.
	Candles will be available to light with signs to
	advise visitors to take care and allow one minute
	between using hand sanitizer and lighting a
	candle, due to the alcohol content.
	Prayer stations are design specifically to reduce
	transmission risks (i.e. nothing that involves
	blowing out of candles, removal of masks etc)
	The common cup will remain suspended, as will
	the sharing of the peace.

Cases of possible on-site infection Where someone is showing symptoms of corona virus, there is a high risk of transmission.	3	2	6	<ul> <li>Where an employee or volunteer shows symptoms of coronavirus, they will be sent home immediately and asked to follow government guidance.</li> <li>Employees or volunteers that have needed to work within 2 metres of the person showing symptoms will also be sent home immediately and asked to follow government guidance.</li> <li>Upon possible infection, all areas that a symptomatic person has been in need to be deep cleaned. If this is not possible, it should be completely vacated for 72 hours to allow the virus time to die on any contaminated surfaces or items.</li> <li>Public areas that a symptomatic has spent minimal time in should be thoroughly cleaned as normal.</li> <li>Cleaning staff should use disposable cloths and cleaning solutions that will kill the virus e.g. bleach spray. They must also wear appropriate PPE e.g. gloves, face masks, eye protection. They should put all clothes in the washing machine as soon as they get home.</li> <li>Waste from cleaning of areas where possible cases have been should be double bagged and held in a secure place for 72 hours before being disposed of in the black wheelie bins.</li> <li>Those who are showing symptoms, those who have shown symptoms or those who live with someone who has had symptoms in the last 14 days will not be allowed on site.</li> </ul>	Staff	Ongoing
