#### October by the numbers:

General treasury receipts: \$35,402.79 (+ \$7,772.87 from last month) General treasury expenses: \$23,636.44 (- \$12,382.05 over last month) Net, general treasury: + \$11,766.35 (+ \$20,154.92 from last month)

Accounting checking balance 10/31: \$112,148.79 (- \$11,515.96 from last month) Actual Bank checking balance 10/31: \$139,448.56 (- \$1,700.54 from last month)

Unrestricted cash available to spend in GT checking (approx.) as of 10/31: \$80,000 (+ \$14,000)

#### **Committee on Finance reported that:**

Expenditures and income are generally in line with 83% of the amount approved in the 2021 ministry funding plan.

Receipts from pledges in October were greater than in September and \$1200 more than the required monthly average.

It appears that the congregation will be able to carry a positive balance into 2022.

Council approved the payment of last quarter commitments to our local benevolence, \$5,150.

#### **Council approved recommendations from the COVID Task Force:**

Continued voluntary use of masks during worship.

Beginning November 28, resume serving coffee and donuts in the fellowship hall following worship. The kitchen will remain closed and group meals will be prohibited at this time.

Incidence of COVID cases will be monitored throughout the holiday season with a review of the current policy in mid-January.

#### **Campus ministry:**

Pastor Libby requested providing packaged snacks to the campus center prior to the second week in December.

We encourage and support students as they prepare for finals, using the student center for quiet study. The kitchen in the student center may be used for warming foods but no cooked food preparation at this time.

Masks are required, which is consistent with practice on campus, and persons are expected to sign in and out of the center.

With the VT home football schedule completed, parking fees yielded \$13,300.

**Capital campaign:** In preparation of setting goals within the capital campaign, council received options and costs for replacing the roof on the church building 5-7 years from now.

Based on today's prices this project will cost in excess of \$120,000 depending on whether the new roof is placed on top of the existing roof or if the existing roof is removed prior to installing the new roof. Additional costs, up to \$20,000 depending on the amount of area involved, need to be considered for structural requirements related to the addition of solar panels.

Certified testing reported that the existing roof contains no asbestos.

**Council Approved:** Renewal of Scout Troop 704 Charter.

At the November 14th annual congregational meeting, LMLC members voted to elect John Anstrom and Linda Libey as new council members, each serving a 3-year term. As required by the Commonwealth of Virginia, all non-profit organizations must name Trustees whose primary responsibility is to represent the non-profit during the sale or purchase of property or equipment. Our Trustees for 2022 are Teresa Cassell, Jenny Akers and Marti Larson. Please hold these newly-elected members in prayer and thank them for stepping up!

#### The Significance of the Advent Wreath & Candles

The Advent wreath has its roots in the pre-Christian practices of Northern Europe, as people sought the return of the sun during the darkest month of the year. As early as the Middle Ages, Christians used fire and candlelight to represent Christ's coming into the world, or "advent." From those practices, the Advent wreath developed in Germany several centuries ago as a sign of the hopeful expectation we hold in our hearts at the anticipated return in glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. The circle represents the eternal victory over death we receive by our baptism into Jesus Christ. Evergreens symbolize God's faithfulness, even in death; the lighted candles remind us of the light Christ brings into the world.

Through the years the color of Advent wreath candles has changed; blue candles are often preferred to distinguish from the Lenten use of purple, and to represent the color of hope. A pink candle may be used on the third Sunday of Advent, known as "Gaudete Sunday" (meaning 'rejoice!'); this practice is based in Philippians 4:4-6, "rejoice in the Lord always."



- -The first candle on Advent I symbolizes Hope: God is faithful and keeps God's promises.
- -The second candle lit on Advent II symbolizes that Jesus is the Prince of Peace, leading us to spiritual peace.
- -The third candle lit on Advent III symbolizes the Joy we have in Jesus.
- -The fourth candle lit on Advent IV symbolizes the Love God has for humanity.
- -The Christ candle, a larger white candle, symbolizes the purity of Jesus and is lit on Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and Sundays through Epiphany, January 6th.

#### **NITA'S NOTES**

During the month of November, we reflect on the blessings of life, both nationally and personally. With hearts of gratitude we lift our voices in prayer and song and listen to the instrumental offerings also presented to God on our behalf. As believers in Christ, we acknowledge the source of these blessings as we begin our Advent pilgrimage in preparation for the holy celebration of Christmas. Central to our worship music is the beautiful Schlicker pipe organ, which members of our congregation sacrificed to purchase and install in 1986. It is a joy to play this instrument and to lovingly guide in its care. It is also an investment with a current replacement value of \$450,000 - \$500,000.

Therefore, I am most grateful that our Church Council voted in their October 2021 meeting to establish a new Organ Maintenance Fund. Its purpose is to provide a means for people to donate monies to help offset organ repairs and maintenance. The regular tuning cost is part of the annual budget and does not include additional needs. This year it was necessary to regulate all of the keys on both manuals and to install a pedal light.

Grooms and Payne, Inc. from Louisa, VA provide our tuning and maintenance services.

This fall our council requested that during the through tuning visit, Dr. Kelly Grooms also assess the maintenance condition of the instrument and submit her findings. A copy of her complete report has been shared with council. Following are the main needs that go beyond what she is able to do through regular tunings.

- Chamber circulation/ventilation fans to establish equal air flow between the Swell and Great divisions: \$500 each. Begin with one. Add another if necessary.
- Correct several "wilting" pipes that are bending due to type of construction metals and insufficient support racking. Those pipes will have to be removed and sent to a specialty pipe shop for attention and new racking supports designed and installed. Current estimate is \$7500.
- The Pedal 4' Choral Bass and the Pedal 16' Subbass are next to impossible to tune due to a lack of safe access. Additional walkways and ladders need to be designed and built at an estimated cost of \$3000.
- The estimate for 2022 organ related repairs is \$11,000.

I hope that this overview will add to your understanding and enjoyment of our instrument. I also hope that you will be financially supportive of this new fund and am making an urgent request that the monies required for these critical initial repairs and adjustments be given so that the work can be completed in the early months of 2022. I thank Ed Vigen for his leadership and direction from the perspective of the church council. I appreciate his willingness to take a "tour" of the organ chamber room so that he could answer any questions you might have for either of us to answer.

#### **BLACKSBURG REFUGEE PARTNERSHIP**

The Blacksburg Refugee Partnership (of which LMLC is a part) formed as a response to the Syrian refugee crisis. It was and still is an all-volunteer organization. It relies on donations and occasional grants.

Five years ago, two Syrian families and four families from Afghanistan moved to Blacksburg from their homelands. The BRP supported and mentored them as they learned a new way of life. And now all adults are employed and the children are in school. Two are in college pursuing pre-med programs.

This fall has seen the arrival of seven more families (with more to come). All of these are seeking asylum from the Taliban government in Afghanistan. These families will be eligible for many government support programs; and all hope to be soon employed. But not until they have social security numbers and work authorizations issued to them. In the meantime, BRP is their sole source of support.

In addition to assisting the newly arrived refugees, BRP has set up a GoFundme page to raise funds to help with college expenses. There are two students now who are working on their degrees; there will be more. The program is entitled STARS.

The proceeds from January's Change for Change will go the BRP.



#### **Christmas Outreach Update**

On November 14<sup>th</sup>, we kicked off fund raising for the **Christmas Outreach Project**. The Christmas Outreach Project provides financial support for families who have children attending Valley Interfaith Child Care Center (VICCC). The goal of VICCC is to provide high quality affordable, educational, and nurturing, care for young children (ages 6 weeks to 5) and now school age childcare, of income eligible working families in the New River Valley. The mission of VICCC is to provide support for the low-income working population of the New River Valley as they strive to become more self-sufficient.

We had extremely successful fundraising effort. In 2020, we raised \$8,026.34. We were able to provide \$380 in tuition reimbursement and financial support to 20 low- income families whose children attend Valley Interfaith Child Care Center. In addition, we were able to provide a couple of prepackaged snacks and one books for all 39 children who attend the center. VICCC also provides the same book each month to each child as part of their curriculum. We were able to provide 2 months of books for the center.

VICCC has identified 19 families to help this year. With Covid 19, has come inflation. Our families' expenses have been going up from fuel prices to groceries. Our help is needed as much as ever. I would like to challenge the congregation to raise \$8500 this year. Regulations with DSS have changed and copays have been waived through the end of December. We will be providing Visa gift cards to our families this year. This goal will allow us to give each family a \$400 gift card to make their Christmas and provide three months of books to the center and provide a gift bag to each of the 40 children in the center.

We will take donations through **Sunday December 12**<sup>th</sup> I would like to thank everyone who continues to support this fund-raising effort. #### **New Recycling Program at Luther Memorial**

The Alleghany Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), meet in the Luther Memorial fellowship hall the first Thursday of each month. For a community service project this coming year we are taking part in a recycle program offered by the Trex Company. The project is to collect 500 pounds of plastic film packaging which is typically not recycled by the local community recycling program. Once we send in 500 pounds of these plastics, the Trex company will send us a bench made from recycled material. Other organizations in this area have participated in this program with great success.

The box for this collection has been placed in the back of the fellowship hall near the closet for the tables and chairs. Below is a list of items that qualify for recycling in this program. Items should be clean and dry. Examples of plastic film items for recycling are:

produce bags
grocery bags
bread bags
over wrap from tissue paper or paper towels
dry cleaning bags
bags from items that come through the mail.

bags from items that come through the mail, bags that have the recycle symbol of 2 or 4

See if the package will stretch when you pull it. If yes, it can be included. If it tears like paper, then please don't put in the bin.

Also, it was my understanding that plastic rings that fit on canned drinks qualify, but they do not.



#### A Note About Luther Memorial's New HVAC System

In 2020, we took advantage of the pandemic closure of LMLC facilities to renovate Fellowship Hall and to replace the HVAC systems across our campus. As we return to full use of our buildings for meetings, worship and community events, please review these important guidelines as good stewards of the congregation's financial and energy resources:

- 1) All thermostats, campus-wide, are **pre-programmed** to comfortable heating and cooling ranges, based on typical high-use periods.
- 2) Please **do not adjust** any thermostat more than +/- 2 degrees, using the + or buttons located on the front of each new thermostat. Increasing or decreasing the programmed temperature by more than 2 degrees up or down negates the program, wastes energy and adds significant cost to our energy bills.
- 3) If you enter a space at LMLC that is significantly too hot or cold, please notify Marcia Barrow or Pastor Monica, who will contact Southern Air.
- 4) Do not change the MODE setting on any thermostat; notify Marcia or Pastor Monica if the heat or cooling mode should be changed.
