Actions:

Authorized the COVID-19 Task Force to develop a plan for contacting all members in order to help persons be informed and to receive questions about our ministry, particularly during this time of physical distancing and virtual worship.

Approved a scope of work for renovating the fellowship hall and signed contracts with Gabriel Brame, NRV Renovators, LLC, as the general contractor and project manager; and with Hookups Plus for installation of audiovisual equipment. Kathy Parrott serves as the project coordinator for the church.

The new website, developed by Cassell, Inc., became available in mid-June, improves the presentation of and access to information about our ministry for members, visitors, and persons seeking an accepting Christian community.

Requested that inquiries from real estate developers about development of the church property be reviewed by the executive committee of Council and reported to council. At this time there are no plans to change how the congregation uses the property.

Communications:

Accepted the letter to the congregation from the COVID-19 Task Force that explains their charter and proposed work.

Accepted the letter prepared by the Committees on Finance and Stewardship, and the Capital Campaign to review the current financial status of the congregation and the needs to meet expenditures during the second half of the year.

Provided letters of appreciation to Rachel Peterson, resigning as lay campus minister and to Marcia Barrow for resolving matters with ATMOS Energy who supplies our natural gas.



Pastor Monica has been appointed by the **Virginia Synod Council** to serve as the **Synod Council Representative** for the **New River & Highlands** conference partnership, effective July 1, 2020. The Virginia Synod Council meets four times per year and presently conducts its meetings by Zoom. Please hold Pastor Monica, the Virginia Synod Council members and the Synod staff in your prayers, as they continue to address the challenges of gathering as the Body of Christ during the pandemic.

NITA’S NOTES: July 2020

During this time of Covid-19 there have been many changes to the world of church music and worship.

I know that each of you reading this is completely aware of that!! Here at LMLC our choir continues to be community in various ways via Zoom, phone calls, email and prayer. Each week I send out an email (or two LOL!) complete with musings and music. Members respond by sending their own music, thoughts or stories to share. That was the case last week when Tim Larson found this beautiful sync track performance of “How Can I Keep From Singing” which has become a message of hope and heart for singers across our country. We can be thankful for the sound engineer who actually made this appear like an effortless performance!

HYMN HIGHLIGHT:

“How Can I Keep From Singing” (“My Life Flows On in Endless Song” #763) is a Sunday School hymn that dates from the mid-19th century. Its musical form is like that of camp meeting songs: catchy melody, simple harmony and rhythm and a refrain. Once adults started singing these children’s songs, the gospel hymn was born. Robert Lowry (1826-99) was first credited with both the text and tune, although the hymn has been attributed to several other 19th century poets in various hymnals. Lowry was a pastor who succeeded William Bradbury as editor of Sunday School songbooks for the New York firm of Biglow and Main. He was known as a tune writer for the texts of prominent hymn writers of the day. He also wrote his own texts and tunes. **ENDLESS SONG**, the tune for this hymn, was published in “Bright Jewels for the Sunday School in 1869. His hymns, along with those of other gospel song writers, were used and promoted by the Young Men’s Christian Association which was founded in London in 1844.

The first known publication of the hymn text was in August of 1868, titled “Always Rejoicing” and was attributed to a Pauline T. and included this verse:

*I lift my eyes; the cloud grows thin; I see the blue above it;
And day by day this pathway smooths, Since first I learned to love it.*

Also, if you follow along in a hymnal, you will notice that the words have been modified for a more universal inclusion. For example: “Christ” was changed to “love” which is actually a great choice!!

Doris Plenn learned the original hymn from her grandmother and then wrote additional verses in the 1950’s when her friends were being imprisoned during the McCarthy era.

*When tyrants tremble, sick with fear, And hear their death-knell ringing,
When friends rejoice both far and near, How can I keep from singing?
In prison cell and dungeon vile, Our thoughts to them go winging;
When friends by shame are undefiled, How can I keep from singing?*

She passed her version on to Pete Seeger, a family friend, and it was then embraced by other folk revivalists. His version also leaves out much of the Christian wording.

And so, this great hymn of faith which found its way into the protest song genre, continues to evolve today into a Covid-19 hymn of unity. I trust that it will bring blessing, joy and hope to each of us as we listen and sing along!!

Former Luther Memorial pastor Bill King has recently published a collection of meditations entitled ***Bread for the Journey: Preaching to Myself***. Originally written as online meditations for members of the congregation, the reflections in Bread for the Journey draw on art, pastoral encounters, books, podcasts, and significant cultural events. Pastor King places them in conversation with the Bible and the Christian tradition, inviting readers to see how experiences, both mundane and earthshaking, may be filled with spiritual insight.
