Her designs are influenced by New York and hip-hop ("Music brings about patterns and colors in my head that I translate into my work," she says), both of which are elements that have nurtured the culture of kicks since day one. And while her style is often urban abstract (think neons and textured patterns), her work is anything but limited. "Nothing is too crazy for me," she says. "I embrace all the weird requests."

Undaunted by the kicks-culture sausage party, Purnell has no problem holding it down for the ladies. "Being a female, of course there is a little more of a chase to be seen and heard and taken seriously, especially in the sneaker world," she admits. But she doesn't let the boys'-club mentality faze her. "I went out and showed people what I do, demanded the attention, and got it," she says.
