







WA and the growing Asian urban middle-class

Asian mega-cities with over one million residents 2030




Double Net Importers vs Double Net Exporters













Global demand for food, energy, water, resources must rise




World population between 1900 - 2100 & world cereal production 1961-2021 Source: UN World Population Prospects 2022; World Bank

In 2034 we will see significant shifts in age (lifestyle) distribution




Absolute change in the Western Australian population by age from 2024 to 2034 - Source: Centre for Population






