"...there was no crime committed"

Sheriff says driver's words 'offensive,' not criminal

It's been weeks since a video that showed a racially motivated interaction between two drivers went viral in Greenwood County.

Sanquenetta Brown was driving down Bypass 225, near the end of February, when she said a white man in an orange Chevrolet Chevelle flipped her off and began displaying road

rage. "I didn't even realize he was beside me until he was revving his engine. That's how he got my attention," Brown explained.

Brown claimed the man at one point tried to side swipe her to send her off the road. That's when she took a photo of the

man in his car.


"I reached for my phone and took a picture because I thought, if something happens, at least I have this," she said.

The two ended up stopped side by side at a traffic light past Emerald High School. It was there that Brown started recording on her cellphone. Brown was able to capture a video that garnered thousands of views and reactions after she posted it on Facebook.

"I was already shaken up, I was nervous. That's when he said, twice, "where that car get that (N-word) at?" Brown said.

Brown contacted police. Initially, an officer with the Greenwood Police Department

Three states, including SC, have no hate crime laws

South Carolina remains one of three states — joined by Wyoming and Arkansas — without any formal hate crime laws. This means the state does not enforce penalties for any crimes motivated by race, religion, gender, or sexual orientation.

People have pushed for legislation to address hate crimes and enhance punishments, such as the "Senator Clementa C. Pinckney Hate Crimes Act" or House Bill 3039 and Senate


