"We had a great life, not a poor one," she said. "We had a good life. All of us went to school, got our education."

Her first elementary school was Lakeview. The school had been desegregated by the time she arrived.

"When I went to Emerald High, it was integrated as well, and then Greenwood High, so I never went to an all-black school," Edwards said.

In April 1998, Edwards said she accepted God as her savior. Little did she know, she would be soon called to action.

"It was a calling on my life," she said. "I didn't want to preach. I heard God speaking to me, leading me."

Her mentors, the Revs. Dora Ann White and Cesar Richburg, told her to be obedient to the calling. In
