

**Police and Minority Relations Committee**  
**2019 Annual Report**  
Presented to the  
Lower Merion Board of Commissioners  
February 5, 2020

The Police and Community Relations Committee was formed over 30 years ago in response to excessive force during a police stop of Reverend Albert G. Davis, Jr. who was a new pastor in Lower Merion. Community protest resulted in the establishment of a process to engage in ongoing dialogue and under the leadership of former Superintendent Joe Daly, a group was convened to improve the relationship between the police department and the African-American community of Lower Merion. Despite its longevity, the committee has never had official township status as a board, and after a consultant's study of Lower Merion's police and community relations, the committee was redefined as a private organization in 2018, and re-named to reflect its actual purpose as the Police and **Minority** Relations Committee.

2019 was a year to formalize the re-organization for the Police and Minority Relations Committee. The Committee's accomplishments included:

- adopting new bylaws,
- drafting and executing a formal Memorandum of Understanding with the Township, and
- launching a website for the committee which includes the committee members, purpose, meeting dates and locations, and a form to leave feedback or to report an issue. The website address is **[policeminorityrelations.org](http://policeminorityrelations.org)**.

We received presentations from the Lower Merion Police on Police Stops and Body Worn cameras.

In 2019 we were saddened by the passing of Marie Thornton, who was a long-standing member of the committee. In December we elected three new members to the committee representing the Ardmore and Bryn Mawr areas, and we elected new officers.

A new brochure has been prepared to publicize the committee.

Our major goal for 2020 is to establish a Youth Advisory Committee and we look forward to working with the Police Department over the coming year to develop new relationships between the police and younger residents in Lower Merion.
