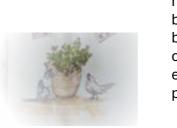

My Thoughts by Julia

When Primrose Care, in Knighton, took over mum's care two years ago, it was life changing. One careworker adjusted mum's day to ensure she had four care visits, creating space for me to just 'drop in', or take her out. The careworker suggested that it might free up time "so you can be a daughter again." I'll never forget those words.

Until then, no one but my family had really seen the shift in our relationship nor the strain on managing two separate lives. I didn't expect that moment to unlock so much mixed emotion: guilt because I needed to work more at the time and greater guilt because I couldn't take mum out every week. Guilt never really starts or ends: it simmers quietly, sometimes coming to a boil, but the hob is never turned

Guilt About Nursing Homes Story 1 by PT

"I had reached rock bottom and couldn't care for my mum anymore. She had heart and leg problems, so her balance wasn't good, and she fell a lot. I couldn't manage, and I had to move in to

good care home that could support her, and within a week, it was all round the town that I was 'getting rid of her'. My friends, my family and even mum's neighbour's dog walker had an opinion about my mum's feelings delivery every Wednesday.

"Everyone was confident she'd 'hate' the nursing home, but I hadn't even chosen it by that point. "Yes, but are you sure she'd want this? they would ask. As if I would do this behind her back!

It was her idea!

The guilt was awful.

"Mum's friends suggested I needed 'more walks in the fresh air', more 'patience'! But caring for so many years



throughout the day and night felt like I was getting angry and bitter. I did it for five years, and mum hated that our relationship changed. She hated that our once close friendship had altered - and was affecting me. She was

"When she finally went into a care home, she was so happy. More people visited and she

care for her. I talked to a friend about finding mum a made new friends and I visited three times a week. When I'd visit, we'd talk for hours about the activities in the centre, the people, our family and we'd giggle over shared old times. I got a job and could take her out to a local café she liked or to meet her old friends. I also had despite nobody regularly visiting her, except the Tesco time to arrange a local volunteer service to pick her up so she could go to church when I was working.

Julia says

This sounds like something my cousin is going through with his dad. Everyone seems to know best! I'm glad it worked out for you.

Story 2 by KL

"Dad visited a local day care centre in his town once a week and it would give me some respite. On one day, the receptionist called because he had started commenting on other people's medical problems and appearances. They explained this inappropriate behaviour could be Dementia. He began to be unpopular at the centre.

I felt awful for him and for his friends who were his targets for those unpopular observations - and for the day care centre staff that were struggling. So I did something that any overwhelmed unpaid carer with a full-time day job might do: I avoided the care centre altogether explaining to dad that I was busy and 'couldn't take him that week'. Cue even more guilt, because now he was lonely, and I was failing at the sacred art of spinning plates – caring for my children and husband, organising my home and appointments, while also managing his home and appointments.

Shortly after that, Covid hit and I felt like I finally had an understandable excuse to keep him away from the centre. He understood that nobody could go anywhere and that only carers could visit him in his own home. Honestly? It felt like this was the first time I wasn't the baddie! I was still working, and somehow still squeezing in visits. I was so tired I could barely look after myself, but the guilt about him being lonely was relentless.

If guilt were a sport, I'd have won a prize.

After Covid, I brought in more care – but well-meaning people still suggested, 'He just needs to get out more'. As if I wanted to keep him in a box under the stairs.

When you're scraping together every ounce of energy to work, care, stay sane, and look after your own family and home - those comments sting."

Julia says

I understand about that pull of responsibility to your father and yourself. It's easier to neglect oneself.

My thoughts on guilt, the guilt equation:

The action + ruminating over the consequences = guilt = shame. This may be useful to motivate some people, but it can also be wasted and cause a lot of stress.

Guilt can be all consuming and can permeate every bit of your day.

I feel guilty about prioritising my work over seeing my own mum, but I need a roof over my head and food. I also need to prioritise me so I can spend quality time with her. If you've ever met her, you wouldn't want to be away from her: she's so funny and wise.

SCYTHES OF RELIEF

aring for God's Acre (CfGA) was established in 2000 as a national charity, promoting the protection and conservation of burial sites, including many that are more than a thousand years



old. CfGA supports the people who look after and maintain them. Go to: www. caringforgodsacre. org.uk for more information.

In August a quiet mid-border churchyard was the site of a Hay Day. On August 5th several cars arrived in the village of Norton, people unpacked scythes, hay rakes and pitch forks and

headed for St Andrews Churchyard, now the home of Norton Community Hub. They were all volunteers with Marches-based conservation charity Caring for God's Acre (CfGA). What made that day different was that this mid-Wales churchyard has been described as a time capsule of traditional wildflowers and it is passing on its natural heritage to a new nature reserve.

Leigh Harling Bowen, a Presteigne town councillor and one of the volunteers said, "A well-managed churchyard represents a time when all meadows were full of wildflowers". He added, "The churchyard at Norton is one of the most bio-diverse that CfGA manages." The grass and the many wildflower seeds in it was cut and raked up and taken in builder's bags by local volunteers the couple of miles to nearby Presteigne. There it will help establish a new meadowland at Coed Llanandras near the Primary School.

"Churchyards are wonderful seed banks for rewilding 21st century countryside with local wildflower species," Leigh said. "They are a snapshot in time stretching back a thousand years as they have never had fertilisers or pesticides applied to them."

The work in Norton was led by Alex Logan who coordinates Caring for God's Acre Volunteer Team. The team manages churchyards in Powys, Herefordshire and Shropshire using environmentally friendly methods. Most of the team are trained to work with scythes and the summer cut of long grass is carried out using these scythes which cut grass near the ground but not as close as a modern mower. Someone using a scythe will also be more aware of what is beneath their blade and can avoid plants like the magnificent harebells at Norton that are still in bloom to allow them to set seed later.

"Churchyards are very special places for nature," said Alex, "they are home not just to wildflowers but also birds, butterflies, insects, small mammals including dormice, even slow worms. Each week throughout the year our volunteers are busy making sure our ancient burial grounds are looked after in a way that means they remain important places for biodiversity in their local communities."

Strewing grass from an existing meadowland has now been shown to be the much-preferred way of encouraging species-rich growth rather than using wildflower seeds or plugs.

The Coed Llanandras Reserve opened in June 2023 in an attempt to introduce diverse habitats including ponds, scrub and native woodlands as well as meadow.

The last Hay Day this year will be at Crug y Byddar LD7 1YT on Tuesday 2nd September and all these events are shown on the God's Acre Volunteers Facebook page.
