



Clark County Population Trend











Weights assigned to relative costs are based on government survey data on expenditure patterns for professional and executive households. All items are priced in each place at a specified time and according to standardized specifications.

Interpreting the Index


The Cost of Living Index measures relative price levels for consumer goods and services in participating areas. The average for all participating places, both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan, equals 100, and each participant's index is read as a percentage of the average for all places.







Clark County

With jurisdiction over the world-famous Las Vegas Strip and covering an area the size of New Jersey, Clark County is the nation's 13th-largest county. The County is a mix of urban and rural locales that offers the convenience of city living with access to some of the nation's best outdoor recreational areas just a short drive away. Clark County is governed by a seven-member County Commission, elected from geographic districts on a partisan basis for staggered four-year terms. Commissioners biennially elect a chairperson who serves as the Commission's presiding officer. The Commission, in turn, hires a county manager who functions as the chief executive officer responsible for all administrative operations. Clark County employs more than 10,000 people over 38 departments. The County has an annual budget of \$8.1 billion, which surpasses that of the state government. The County is known for being fiscally responsible and responsive to taxpayers' desires for an efficient government. The County's strong fiscal policies have led to a consistent investment-quality credit rating. Clark County, formed in 1909, is named for Sen. William Andrews Clark, who established the railroad that linked Los Angeles with Salt Lake City.

- Clark County is not just The Entertainment Capital of the World but now The Sports and Entertainment Capital of the World. The County is home to the NHL's Vegas Golden Knights, the WNBA's Las Vegas Aces, the NFL's Las Vegas Raiders, UFC, a minor league baseball team, the Las Vegas Aviators, and a minor league soccer team, the Las Vegas Lights.
- McCarran International Airport, located in Clark County, is the 9th-busiest airport in the country, serving more than 51 million passengers in 2019 and ranking 3rd for overall customer satisfaction. As a top-tier international airport, it offers direct access to hundreds of cities across the world, setting the stage for our businesses to succeed in the global marketplace.
- Clark County's low tax structure is friendly to business and individuals alike with no corporate income tax, no personal income tax, no franchise tax on income, no inventory tax, no inheritance tax or gift tax, no unitary tax and no estate tax.
- Clark County is ranked amongst the highest in the nation for housing appreciation, helping residents grow and maintain net worth.



City of Las Vegas

Las Vegas was founded as a city on May 15, 1905. Las Vegas was incorporated on June 1, 1911. The City is divided into six wards with an elected representative for each ward. The mayor is elected at large to serve the entire community.

The City of Las Vegas is a council-manager form of government, combining the strong political leadership of elected officials, with the executive managerial experience of an appointed city manager. All policies and major budget decisions rest with the City Council and the City Manager is charged with running the day-to-day operations of the organization.

The City has cultivated and championed a variety of important projects for the benefit of the community. Some highlights include downtown's newest property Circa, scheduled to open this year. Circa is downtown's first newly built hotel-casino since the 1980s and includes a 459-foot-tall tower, 777 new rooms, a massive sports book, multiple swimming pools, bars and restaurants.

There has been a \$32 million upgrade to the Fremont Street Experience canopy, and the new Downtown Grand tower is just north of the canopy making the area even more spectacular. The City is looking forward to the grand opening of the new 350,000-square-foot International Market Expo Center. Another downtown highlight is the new residential development which includes two complexes on Symphony Park and ShareDOWNTOWN in the 18B Las Vegas Arts District.

The City will see the opening of the multi-sensory music, art and entertainment complex known as Area 15. Featuring a bamboo Volcano lounge, virtual reality offerings, and indoor and outdoor events spaces, Area 15 is like nothing else in Las

Vegas. There is a 7,000-square-foot room that has 360-degree projection capabilities allowing you to enjoy a drink in outer space or under the ocean. It will also be home to a larger than life festival—style sculpture garden that would be at home at Burning Man or Life is Beautiful. In addition, it will house its anchor tenant the eclectic and popular Meow Wolf art exhibition.

The City is also heavily involved in the Las Vegas Medical District and the forthcoming UNLV School of Medicine. Established by the Las Vegas City Council in 1997, the Las Vegas Medical District (LVMD) is now evolving as one of the most important economic development projects in Southern Nevada, enhancing and expanding access to quality medical care, attracting new high-paying employers to the region and advancing a higher quality of life. The medical district is a collaborative effort between the City of Las Vegas and the Downtown Las Vegas medical and health care community. The LVMD creates an environment that supports future and continued development of businesses and real property within the district

Another highlight is all of the new infrastructure projects that are wrapping up and getting started in 2020. Many of the projects involve widening sidewalks, adding mature trees and bike lanes to downtown areas.

Very soon, the reimagined Third Street will be completed. The City will install and unveil a new Gateway Arch near the popular Showgirl sign. The arch is going to evoke the glitter, glamour and neon that made Las Vegas famous.

Another major street project that is well underway is Project Enchilada. This project is refreshing historic Fremont Street and will be adding trees and creating wider sidewalks where restaurants can have outdoor seating.

The City is also bringing new technologies and industry to Las Vegas. The heart of the Innovation District is the new International Innovation Center @Vegas. The City of Las Vegas continues to be a hub for innovation and technology with the opening of this 11,000-square-foot center for established and emerging tech companies developing smart technologies.

Finally, improving the quality of life in Las Vegas is why the Mayor's Fund for Las Vegas Life was created. Focused on livability, innovation, the future and education, the fund is a vehicle for partners to invest in solutions that address the community's most pressing challenges. The Mayor's Fund helps projects such as:

- Strong Start Go, a mobile pre-kindergarten program that brings learning directly to communities most in need
- > Las Vegas Connected, assisting families living in public housing with internet access
- > The City's Courtyard Homeless Resource Center

Laughlin



Nevada's southern-most community, Laughlin, is nestled between the Colorado River and the mountains at the point where Nevada, California and Arizona meet in the desert.

Home to some 11,000 residents, the modern community includes retirees from every career imaginable who are better-off financially than average and higher educated than average. Most pay cash for their homes in the residential area called Upper Laughlin at the base of the mountains overlooking the Colorado River.

Laughlin also enjoys two visitor seasons a year, attracting some two million visitors annually. In the mild winters, "snowbirds" flock to the community in their RVs. In the summer, Laughlin draws water-worshipping/sun-loving visitors with their watercrafts whom share the aquatic, eastern Nevada border with the community's water taxis and riverboats.

Laughlin also is home to Nevada's Big Bend State Recreational Park, complete with full service RV hookups and services, and the Clark County-operated Colorado River Heritage Greenway Park and Trails for walking, hiking, bicycling, and picnic and fishing facilities. It extends several miles from Davis Dam, which forms Lake Mohave, downstream to a scenic pedestrian bridge over Nevada Highway 163 that extends into Downtown Laughlin. Ten casinos, many with high-rise towers providing tremendous views of the water, slopes, and mountains framing Laughlin to the east and west, provide gambling, dining, entertainment, and shopping in a 2-mile strip, and the Laughlin River Walk between the resorts and the water's edge.

Mission: To create and implement a collaborative venture among civic and business leaders in the town of Laughlin, to promote the health, welfare and quality of life for the residents of Laughlin through economic development.

Services Provided: As an Unincorporated Township, Laughlin's municipal-type services are provided by Clark County, its subsidiary districts, and several metropolitan-type regional districts, including police, fire, water, sewer, streets, parks and recreation, library, transit (24-hour fixed-route service), flood control, tourism, and schools. The Clark County Commission is assisted by an elected 5-member Town Advisory Board.

The county and special districts have invested significantly into infrastructure for diversification to help the community grow. The community has plenty of water, drawn directly from the Colorado River, and sewer services for domestic, commercial, and industrial use.

Business Development: The Laughlin Economic Development Corporation provides business development and site selection resources for businesses and industries wishing to locate in the township of some 80 square miles, of which only about 6 square miles are developed. The LEDC works closely with the county's Town Manager's Office, LVGEA and the Nevada Governor's Office of Economic Development.

Some 14 square miles of vacant land extends to the California and Arizona borders immediately south of the Big Bend State Park, which the 4-lane Needles Highway (15 miles to Interstate 40) bisects. A county-commissioned study showed industrial, commercial, and residential areas feasible for development. Also, the electric utilities that own a 4 square mile block in the middle of town, have offered more than 2,000 acres for sale – with all utilities and roads surrounding the site of a former electric generating station that has been removed.

Services Provided: Public transit, traffic management, roadway planning and funding, and administration of the valley's only federally recognized regional plan – Southern Nevada Strong.

Economic Impact: Construction of all 225 roadway projects funded by the initial Fuel Revenue Indexing (FRI) program has been completed with an investment of just over 570 million. Looking ahead, the extension of FRI could generate up to \$3 billion through 2026 to fund critically needed roadway projects in our community, creating up to 25,000 jobs for our economy. For the region, it means jobs, progress and growth. In addition, the RTC works with the local jurisdictions and private companies to demonstrate new, advanced transportation technologies that help diversify the local economy and improve mobility and safety on our roads.

Business Development: From its inception in 2014, Fuel Revenue Indexing has significantly spurred economic development in Southern Nevada, especially within the small-business community. FRI has generated 225 contracts for critical roadway improvement projects that employed nearly 80 small businesses and created 8,101 jobs overall. And since Southern Nevadans voted in 2016 to extend FRI until 2026, our community will benefit from continued economic development from future transportation infrastructure projects.

The RTC's commitment to furthering advanced transportation technology and smart community initiatives has resulted in pilot projects, contracts and product launches with nearly a dozen private sector partners, including Audi, Waycare, Keolis, INRIX, Aptiv, Lyft, Uber, Transit, Geotab, Nexar, and iCone.

Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC)



The Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC) is one of the only agencies nationwide that manages public transit, traffic management, and roadway planning and funding, in addition to administering the Southern Nevada Strong (SNS) regional plan, all under one roof. The RTC creates an efficient and effective transportation system that promotes mobility as a key driver to an economically vibrant community.

As the transportation planning organization for Southern Nevada, the RTC works with local municipalities to plan, fund and launch infrastructure projects that improve Southern Nevada's roads and transportation options. To meet the region's growing transportation needs, the RTC and local jurisdictions have completed construction of all 225 projects under the first Fuel Revenue Indexing (FRI) initiative. The agency continues to work with the jurisdictions to prioritize and fund infrastructure and roadway projects under the extension of FRI through 2026.

As the region's transit agency, the RTC operates 39 bus routes throughout the valley with a fleet of more than 400 vehicles. The agency is committed to converting nearly all of its fleet to compressed natural gas (CNG) vehicles over the next several years to help improve the valley's air quality and to acquire two electric buses this year.

The RTC is finalizing On Board, the valley's future mobility plan for the next 20 years. On Board is a comprehensive, long-term transportation plan that includes eight big moves or strategies to help address the top transportation priorities that our community has identified through robust engagement and feedback. The draft plan is focused on benefiting all modes of transportation - from biking and walking to driving and transit.

The RTC's traffic management center uses intelligent technology to monitor traffic flow, identify detours, adjust traffic signals and keep vehicles moving as smoothly as possible. Working in coordination with local jurisdictions, NHP and NDOT, FAST's the RTC's regional coordination has been advantageous to Southern Nevada and private industry alike. It has enticed globally recognized companies to launch innovative technologies and pilot demonstrations on the streets of Southern Nevada.

As the region's metropolitan planning organization, the RTC engages in transportationrelated planning studies and coordinates the long-term collaborative planning through Southern Nevada Strong. The SNS Implementation Office coordinates with regional partners to execute the plan's goals of providing access to reliable transportation, increasing housing options for all income levels, ensuring quality education, and strengthening social services and healthcare networks.



2019 RTC Accomplishments

- Awarded and completed construction of all 225 roadway projects funded by the first phase of Fuel Revenue Indexing that has enhanced safety, reduced congestion and increased capacity for our community.
- > Partnered with Uber and Transit, two of the world's most popular transportationrelated apps, to sell RTC bus passes, making it easier now than ever for residents and visitors to complete multimodal trips.
- Continued developing On Board, our community's future mobility plan, with local agency partners through planning exercises and gathered more than 27,000 responses and engaged with more than 80,000 people.
- ➤ Provided enhanced traffic management support, using traffic signals and Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) devices, during 44 Vegas Golden Knights home games; 70 Las Vegas Aviators games; 18 Las Vegas Lights games; and numerous conventions, major events and parades.

- ➤ Employed the Waycare incident management platform to manage 3,996 property damage incidents, 1,683 injury incidents, and eight fatal freeway crashes. Expanded the Waycare platform to six additional sites on U.S. 95 and I-15 through the Road to Zero grant, enabling law enforcement to minimize speeding and crashes in high-risk areas.
- Launched the Work Zone of the Future pilot project with Nexar, iCone and HAAS Alert in April to detect construction zones and bring work zone data into the traffic management center and other RTC applications.
- Partnered with Lyft to provide 1,320 rides to employees of a local warehouse from 13 different transit stops located on six routes during the first year of the Workforce Mobility Program.
- Hosted a 30-day public comment period about transit options for Maryland Parkway generating 1,002 total comments. The RTC board chose to advance bus rapid transit in light of the fiscal implications. Additionally, the RTC

- worked cooperatively with Clark County on a transit-oriented development (TOD) plan for Maryland Parkway from Sahara Avenue to Russell Road, to provide a framework to identify and plan for transit station areas with the greatest potential for economic development.
- > Finalized the Reimagine Boulder Highway Plan with more than 3,500 community survey responses and 500 direct comments. 10% of all pedestrian fatalities in Nevada occur along Boulder Highway. Preliminary design began on the 7.5-mile stretch of the corridor in the City of Henderson
- > Successfully passed a bill during the 2019 legislative session to extend the RTC's ballot question authority until 2024, providing critical flexibility in order for the RTC to complete its long-term transit plan and agency strategic plan prior to moving forward with a potential ballot initiative.




The Southern Nevada Transit Coalition

The Las Vegas Monorail

The Las Vegas Monorail has been transporting residents and visitors along the Las Vegas Strip on its zero-emissions trains for more than 15 years. Leisure and business travelers comprise nearly all its millions of annual riders, though a number of Las Vegas residents have discovered the benefits of the Monorail getting to and from concerts, fights, Vegas Golden Knights games at the T-Mobile Arena and other events along Las Vegas Boulevard. As younger travelers and international visitors alike tend to utilize rail and mass transit modes more frequently, it's no surprise that 30 percent of Monorail riders are Millennials and more than 30 percent are international visitors to Las Vegas.

The Monorail is the only transit system to integrate fares directly into attendees' badges, requiring only a quick tap of their tradeshow badge on Monorail faregates to ride the system. Several major shows and their attendees have already experienced the benefits of adding Monorail access into show badges, including the National Association of Broadcasters, CONEXPO-Con/Agg, CES and PackExpo, with more to come.

As a long-established leader in providing driverless transit technology, the Monorail continues to be an early adopter of emerging technology solutions that enhance the rider experience. It introduced e-ticketing more than 12 years ago, and enhanced access with mobile tickets, allowing guests to purchase Monorail fare online and have it delivered to their mobile device. The system was also the first-ever transit system to partner with Google to integrate Monorail tickets directly into Google Pay.

As Las Vegas' cleanest mass transit resource, in 2019 the Monorail aided in the removal of an estimated 2.1 million vehicle miles from Southern Nevada's major roadways, reducing emissions by 27 tons of carbon monoxide (CO), volatile organic compounds (VOC) and nitrogen oxides (NOx).

The Las Vegas Monorail has seven stations: MGM Grand, Bally's/Paris Las Vegas, Flamingo/Caesars Palace, Harrah's/The LINQ, Las Vegas Convention Center, Westgate Resort & Casino and SAHARA Las Vegas. Trains arrive every few minutes at each station, enabling passengers to travel the length of the Strip in less than 15 minutes in a safe, clean and climate-controlled environment. Hours of operation are Monday 7 a.m. - midnight, Tuesday-Thursday 7 a.m. - 2 a.m., and Friday-Sunday 7 a.m. - 3 a.m. A single ride ticket costs \$5 (\$1 for Nevada residents) and unlimited-ride passes are available as well.

Did You Know?

- > No taxpayer funds are utilized in the operation of the Monorail.
- ➤ The Monorail is the most advanced driverless (autonomous) urban transportation system in the United States.
- > The system offers mobile ticketing through Google Pay for Android, as well as Scan-and-Go mobile ticketing for all smartphones; riders can purchase tickets online and simply scan their smartphones at the fare gates and ride.
- ➤ It connects to more than 25,000 hotel rooms and almost 5 million square feet of convention and meeting space.
- The Las Vegas Monorail carries an average of 67,000 passengers during citywide tradeshows, which equates to approximately

- 22,334 taxicabs with three passengers each or 1,218 passenger buses with 55 riders each.
- **>** The Monorail carries approximately 5 million passengers per year.
- > Since opening, the Monorail has carried nearly 90 million riders and removed more than 31 million vehicle miles from Southern Nevada's roadways.
- ➤ The Monorail plans to extend its route with new stations serving the Mandalay Bay resort campus as well as the Sands Expo and Convention Center and MSG Sphere, which would directly link it to more than 10 million square feet of convention space and approximately 42,000 hotel rooms making it the world's single most connected resort and convention rail service.

Throughout the year, the Aces work with schools and community-based organizations, partner with service-based volunteer organizations, and utilize the WNBA platform to encourage the love of basketball throughout the city.

Las Vegas Aviators

The Las Vegas organization has the proud distinction of being the longest enduring franchise in the history of professional sports in the state of Nevada. The 2020 campaign will mark the 38th Pacific Coast League season in the Silver State. The franchise played at Cashman Field for 36 seasons (1983-2018) before opening Las Vegas Ballpark on April 9, 2019 before a sellout crowd of 11,036.

Cashman Field opened in 1983 with the Stars, Triple-A affiliate of the San Diego Padres. The Stars were the home team for 18 years (1983-2000), until the franchise switched affiliations to the Los Angeles Dodgers in 2001. The franchise also unveiled a new alien-themed logo based on the government base known as "Area 51." The team nickname was changed from Stars to 51s. The 51s were affiliated with the Dodgers for eight seasons (2001-08). Las Vegas then signed a Player Development Contract (PDC) with the Toronto Blue Jays and spent four seasons as the top affiliate of the Blue Jays (2009-12). Las Vegas on September 12, 2012, then announced a two-year PDC with the New York Mets. The 51s and Mets had a total of six years with the PDC (2013-18). The 51s, on September 17, 2018, announced a "new" PDC with the Oakland Athletics for two seasons (through 2020).

The Las Vegas franchise enjoyed a total rebrand in 2019. The new Las Vegas Ballpark (8,834 seats), located in Downtown Summerlin, opened in April, to go along with a new team nickname: Aviators, which was officially announced on December 8, 2018. The Aviators led all 2019 minor league baseball in attendance with a total of 650,934 for an average of 9,299 in 70 dates which included 47 sellouts and 23 crowds of 10,000+. Las Vegas Ballpark was named winner of the 2019 MiLB Triple-A Best of the Ballparks Fan Vote; winner of BaseballParks.com 20th Annual Ballpark of the Year Award; honored as Ballpark of the Year and Aviators Team of the Year by Ballpark Digest.

Fran Riordan, the 2019 PCL Manager of the Year, returns for his second season for Triple-A Las Vegas in 2020. In 2019, Las Vegas compiled the second-best record in the 16-team PCL with a record of 83-57 (.593) and were the Pacific Southern Division Champions and returned to the PCL Playoffs for the first time since 2014.





Las Vegas Lights FC

Established in 2018, Lights FC's owner, Brett Lashbrook, brought to Las Vegas the highest level of soccer the city has ever seen. In 2019, Lights FC surpassed their regular-season point total and attendance (7,711 average per game) from its inaugural year. The team's ever present goal is to deliver a USL Championship playoffs berth to the city of Las Vegas.

The Las Vegas Lights FC are proud to provide a fun and unique experience for fans in attendance on game day. The Raiders' rich history began in 1960 when the City of Oakland was awarded a franchise in the American Football League. Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC)

UFC, the world's premier mixed martial arts organization, boasts more than 318 million fans worldwide and has produced over 500 events in 25 countries since its inception in 1993.

UFC was acquired in 2016 by global entertainment, sports, and content company Endeavor, in conjunction with strategic investors Silver Lake Partners and KKR, in what is among the largest transactions in sports history.

Since 2001, UFC has been proudly headquartered in Las Vegas, with a network of employees around the world. UFC produces more than 40 live events annually that consistently sell out some of the world's most prestigious arenas, and its programming is broadcast in over 170 countries and territories to more than one billion TV households worldwide in 40 different languages.

In January 2020, one of the biggest events in UFC history, UFC 246: MCGREGOR VS. COWBOY, was held at T-Mobile Arena and generated \$66.2 million in economic impact for the Las Vegas metropolitan area, marking one of the largest economic impacts for a single UFC event measured globally to date. In addition to the total economic output, the landmark event also contributed \$18 million in salaries and wages and supported an estimated 423 jobs in the Southern Nevada market. Visitors attending events related to UFC 246: MCGREGOR VS. COWBOY, were responsible for an estimated \$2.8 million in public revenues in Nevada.

In 2017, UFC opened the doors of a new 184,000-square-foot corporate campus that houses nearly 300 employees and includes the UFC Performance Institute, the world's first mixed martial arts multi-disciplinary research, innovation, and training center. To date, more than 400 athletes from UFC's roster, as well as dozens of NFL, NBA, NHL, MLB, and Olympic sports athletes, have utilized the facility, The UFC Performance Institute offers customized programs that support world-class athletes with all their development, preparation and rehabilitation requirements.

Adjacent to the UFC Performance Institute is UFC APEX, a 130,000-square-foot state-of-the-art production facility and venue space that can be configured to accommodate a variety of live events, including UFC bouts and other sports competitions, concerts, stage shows, esports tournaments and more. The venue can also be converted into a sound stage for use as rehearsal space for entertainment acts booked throughout Las Vegas. UFC APEX is open to outside production companies for commercials, shows, entertainment rehearsals, photo shoots and other possibilities.

Vegas Golden Knights

The Vegas Golden Knights are a National Hockey League franchise owned and operated by Black Knight Sports and Entertainment LLC. Established by founding partners William Foley, his family and the Maloof family, the Vegas Golden Knights came into existence on June 22, 2016 when the ownership group was awarded a franchise in Las Vegas, Nevada. The city was ready for major professional sports and when Foley brought the Golden Knights to Southern Nevada, the team became a state-wide phenomenon.

General Manager George McPhee began constructing the Golden Knights upon his hiring on July 13, 2016, building out his hockey operations staff and then selecting Gerard Gallant as the team's first head coach on April 13, 2017. Through calculated decisions at the NHL Expansion Draft, NHL Draft and throughout the season, the Golden Knights constructed a roster that would compete in the short term while also being well positioned for long term success.

The inaugural season of NHL hockey in the city kicked off with two road wins for the Golden Knights before the first game at T-Mobile Arena on the Las Vegas Strip. The team's home opener celebrated the bravery of the city in the aftermath of the October 1st tragedy.

After clinching the Pacific Division title on March 31, 2018, Golden Knights became the first modern-era expansion team from any of the four North American professional sports leagues to start from scratch and finish first in its division. With a fifth-place finish overall during the regular season, Vegas also became the first expansion team from any of the four North American professional sports leagues to start from scratch and finish among the top-five in the league.

Vegas went 12-3 in the first three rounds of the Stanley Cup Playoffs to reach the Stanley Cup Final, including a four game sweep of the Los Angeles Kings in the first round. They became the first expansion team to reach the Stanley Cup Final since the St. Louis Blues in 1968 and, with a victory in game one, became the first expansion team to win a game in the Final.

The Golden Knights inaugural season is considered to be the most successful first year for an expansion team in North American sports history.

Multiple Football Firsts

The Las Vegas Bowl has been the home to multiple college football milestones over the years. In 1995, Toledo and Nevada played in what was the first overtime game on the Division I FBS level. In 2002, Katie Hnida of New Mexico became the first woman to play in a FBS-level game when she entered to attempt an extra point. Also, 2011's game featured three scoring plays 98 yards or longer and was believed to be the first bowl game in history that included a kickoff return for a touchdown to start each half. The 2016 outing saw San Diego State's Donnel Pumphrey, a native of Las Vegas, return home to become the rushing king of college football when he passed Ron Dayne to finish with a career mark of 6,405 yards.

Economic Impact

How important is having a highly attended college football game to the Southern Nevada area? In research courtesy of the Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority, the 2019 Bowl Week provided an estimated \$23.2 million in economic impact courtesy of 21,400 out-of-town visitors. In its first quarter-century-plus of existence, the bowl attracted more than 550,000 out-of-town visitors and pumped more than \$360 million into the local economy.

Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl



Nearly three decades old, the Las Vegas Bowl is preparing to debut a host of major changes in 2020. In fact, the first bowl game in the nation owned and operated by ESPN Events will be transformed into one of the nation's top postseason destinations as it moves into arguably the world's most dynamic football venue while sporting a unique partnership with three powerhouse collegiate conferences.

Held each December, after 28 years playing in Sam Boyd Stadium, the Las Vegas Bowl will make its home along with the Las Vegas Raiders and UNLV Rebels at the state-of-the-art, \$2 billion Allegiant Stadium located just off the World Famous Strip. The bowl will continue its two-decade-long relationship with the Pac-12 Conference while attracting two new partners in the form of the Southeastern Conference and Big Ten Conference. The block-buster agreement announced June 4, 2019, includes 40 national football brands from the three leagues that span from the Pacific Ocean to the Eastern Seaboard.

The new deal runs through the 2025 game and includes the Las Vegas Bowl moving to a post-Christmas date for the first time. During those years, the Las Vegas Bowl will have the No. 2 selection (after the College Football Playoff selection) from the Pac-12 and share that position with the Holiday Bowl. The Las Vegas Bowl will share a spot with the Belk Bowl in the SEC "pool of six" that follows the CFP and Citrus selections and host a team here in 2020, '22 and '24. Las Vegas will share a Big Ten spot with the Music City Bowl after the CFP, Citrus and Outback selections and host a team here in 2021, '23 and '25.

Organized by community leaders out of a need to fill hotel rooms during a traditionally slow period in a world-class destination city, the Las Vegas Bowl first kicked off on December 18, 1992. It has since become one of the Silver State's premier annual events and been nationally televised on ESPN, ESPN2 or ABC every year of its existence. The Las Vegas Bowl, which is the 16th-oldest NCAA active bowl game overall, has featured at least one ranked team in 13 of the last 14 games. That includes last year's 38-7 victory by Washington over No. 19 Boise State that punctuated the final game coached by Husky head man Chris Petersen before his retirement.

Wrangler National Finals Rodeo (NFR)

For the 35th consecutive year, the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo culminated the rodeo season in Las Vegas. Known as the world's richest and most prestigious rodeo, the Wrangler NFR had a total event attendance of more than 168,000 over the 10 days of competition. Since the Wrangler NFR's move to Las Vegas in 1985, total attendance for the 35 years at the Thomas & Mack Center has surpassed 5.9 million.


Held from December 5-14, the event attracted the top 120 rodeo athletes in the world, vying for a share of the \$10 million purse and the coveted gold buckle. The action on the dirt was competitive and intense from start to finish. At the end, the following earned the title of world champion: Clayton Biglow bareback riding; Ty Erickson, steer wrestling; Clay Smith (header) and Wesley Thorp (heeler), team roping; Zeke Thurston, saddle bronc riding; Haven Meged, tie-down roping; Hailey Kinsel, barrel racing; Sage Kimzey, bull riding and Stetson Wright, All-Around.

The Wrangler NFR has now sold out 330 consecutive performances. According to the Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority, the estimated total economic impact in 2019 for the event was \$178.5 million.

In addition to the rodeo competition at the Thomas & Mack Center, the ancillary events up and down the Las Vegas Strip and Downtown are a big part of the NFR Experience. During the ten days of the Wrangler NFR, there were 66 concerts, 31 locations that offered the live feed of the rodeo and ten days of shopping and entertainment at Cowboy Christmas. The official gift show of the Wrangler NFR featured more than 350 exhibitors at the Las Vegas Convention Center and attracted a total attendance of more than 230,000.

Historic Landmark since 1937. Today, Hoover Dam draws nearly one million visitors per year. Considered to be the world's largest dam and an engineering marvel at the time of its construction in the 1930s, the dam straddles the mighty Colorado River, which forms the border between the states of Nevada and Arizona. The American Society of Civil Engineers rates it as one of America's seven modern civil engineering wonders. The Hoover Dam is a curved gravity dam. Lake Mead pushes against the dam, creating compressive forces that travel along the great curved wall. The canyon walls push back, counteracting these forces. This action squeezes the concrete in the arch together, making the dam very rigid. Today, the Hoover Dam is the second highest dam in the country and the 18th highest in the world. It generates more than four billion kilowatt-hours (kWh) per year, enough to serve 1.3 million people. The visitor center is open from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm. Lake Mead National Recreation Area is one of America's most diverse national recreation areas offering boating, hiking, cycling, camping and fishing. Spreading across 1.5 million acres of mountains, canyons, valleys and two vast lakes this year-round playground offers striking landscapes and brilliant blue waters. The area offers a startling contrast of desert and water, mountains and canyons, primitive backcountry and modern technology. Two powerful and uncompromising forces created this fantastic place. Nature, working slowly over millions of years, built the foundation.

The cultural resources and artifacts of Lake Mead tell a story about Native Americans, pioneers, miners, ranchers, settlers and dam builders who lived in Southern Nevada and Northern Arizona. Historic photographs captured steamships, early settlements, ranger activities, recreation and explorations. 

Since its first classes were held in 1957, UNLV has transformed from a small branch campus into a thriving university. UNLV offers more than 290 bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degree programs and 100 certificate programs, including internationally and nationally recognized programs in hospitality administration, engineering, business, creative writing, conflict resolution, legal writing, public health, and nursing.

Economic Impact Highlights

- UNLV stimulates economic development and diversification through deepening and expanding connections with new and existing partners. Such collaborations create monumental impact in the Silver State, and UNLV is partnering with industry to build degree and professional development programs and to conduct research that addresses today's challenges.
- ➤ As one of the largest employers in Clark County, UNLV generated \$2.51 billion in local economic activity in 2017. For every dollar invested by the state in UNLV, the university generated an additional \$12.50 in economic activity in Southern Nevada. Each dollar of student off-campus spending also generated approximately \$2.04 of economic activity in the community.
- ➤ By 2025, UNLV is estimated to bring increased spending to Nevada, generating \$3.33 billion in local economic activity and supporting more than 19,000 direct and indirect jobs. 

The Desert Research Institute (DRI) is a recognized world leader in basic and applied interdisciplinary research. Committed to scientific excellence and integrity, DRI faculty, students, and staff have developed scientific knowledge and innovative technologies in research projects around the globe. Since 1959, DRI's research has advanced scientific knowledge, supported Nevada's diversifying economy, provided sciencebased educational opportunities, and informed policy makers, business leaders, and community members. With campuses in Reno and Las Vegas, DRI is one of eight institutions in the Nevada System of Higher Education.

Recent Research & News Highlights

Extreme heat events around the world are getting hotter, occurring more often, and lasting longer—these trends pose significant health risks to the growing number of people in urban areas of the desert Southwest like Las Vegas. In spring 2019, a DRI-led research team identified a clear correlation between heat wave episodes and deaths in Las Vegas over the last ten years: as heat wave intensity increases, the number of heat-related deaths does, too. With more intense, more frequent, and longer lasting heat events projected in the coming years, researchers hope that the trends identified in this study can assist local decision-makers to protect the most vulnerable groups in Las Vegas from heatrelated health risks.

A collaboration between DRI and the Bureau of Reclamation aims to improve our understanding of evaporation from Lake Powell and other major reservoirs through the deployment of floating evaporation stations. By collecting data from multiple sites in the reservoir, the research team will learn about how evaporation rates vary at different locations and at different times throughout the year. The end goal: to help scientists and water managers make accurate evaporation estimates using the best available science, at Lake Powell and elsewhere in the world.

Nevada's "Lost City," located northeast of Las Vegas, has been lost twice before - first abandoned by the native people who built it, then later flooded beneath the waters of Lake Mead – but a team of DRI archaeologists hopes to ensure that it isn't lost a third time. In the summer of 2019, the DRI research team began using unmanned aircraft systems (UAS), commonly known as drones, to create high-res, 3D maps of the Lost City archaeological site, which consists of adobe structures that date back more than 1,000 years. Working with the National Park Service, the team will use the detailed maps to devise strategies to preserve the site.

In the fall of 2019, DRI scientists began two complementary studies at The Nature Conservancy in Nevada's 7J Ranch, which will install meteorological stations and develop a model to monitor how future restoration activities at the 7J Ranch will affect its water resources. Located near Beatty, Nevada, the ranch's unique geography and location where the Great Basin and Mojave deserts meet, and its habitat for many endemic and endangered species, make it a globally important site for conserving biodiversity and give it strategic value for facilitating climate change adaptation for wildlife.







Achievements


- Clark County School District's final graduation rate for the Class of 2019 was a record high 85.8%, with our largest class ever of 21,688 graduates.



What are Select Schools?





Nevada School Choice Coalition

As a tax credit program, the Opportunity Scholarship is privately funded by corporations, which receive a dollar-for-dollar tax credit against their Modified Business Tax liability, enabling corporations to direct their tax liability toward K-12 education. To be eligible for a scholarship of up to \$8,262 for K-12 private school tuition and fees for the 2019-20 school year, household income must not exceed 300% of poverty level. Through the Opportunity Scholarship program, eligible Nevada families had access to \$11.4 million dollars in funding to go towards the education of their choice last year.

Opportunity Scholarship Student Race/Ethnicity



Centennial Hills Hospital

Centennial Hills Hospital provides a wide range of medical services and procedures. For more than ten years, the hospital has been delivering babies, saving lives and taking care of the hearts of the Northwest and North Las Vegas communities. Centennial Hills Hospital also cares for a wide range of medical situations that arise from accidents at Mount Charleston National Recreation Area, to procedures for spines and joints.

To accommodate the growing community, the hospital in mid-2019 started construction on a master plan project that includes a new, five-story patient tower expansion. Phase one, valued at an estimated \$95 million, will add 77 patient beds, increasing the total bed count to 339. This addition will provide increased capacity in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, Intensive Care Unit, Intermediate Unit and Medical Surgical Units across the hospital. The project will also expand key departments, including inpatient pharmacy, surgical services, and the post-anesthesia care unit. The patient tower is expected to be completed in early 2021, with the remaining internal renovations to be completed in the later part of 2021.

News of the five-story tower expansion comes less than two years after Centennial Hills Hospital completed the final two floors of its eight-story tower, adding 60 private patient rooms and over 200 additional parking spaces. Centennial Hills Hospital has also added biplane angiography capabilities to treat stroke and other neurosurgical diseases, an advanced Wound Care and Hyperbaric Center, and another 12 mother-baby rooms to meet increased demand for maternity services.

The emergency department often serves as its front door, with more than 55,000 patients seen on an annual basis. Major emergencies, such as strokes and heart attacks, as well as minor emergencies are treated at the facility.

Centennial Hills Hospital features a comprehensive women's center offering care for women at every stage of life. The program also supports alternative delivery models including midwifery. Infants who require advanced medical care spend time in the hospital's Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). Digital mammography and advanced diagnostic testing are also available.

For those who need surgery, two da Vinci® Robotic Surgical Systems can be used for abdominal, gynecological and urological cases.

And, for people who may require therapy after surgery, Centennial Hills Hospital offers an outpatient therapy center to assist with the recovery and rehabilitation.

VA Southern Nevada Healthcare System (VASNHS) provides outpatient and inpatient medical services to Veterans residing in Southern Nevada, within an official catchment area of Clark, Lincoln, and Nye Counties. VASNHS also draws Veterans from Arizona, Utah, and California.

Primary and Specialty Care services are disbursed among several clinical sites within the Las Vegas Valley, including the Northwest VA Clinic, Northeast VA Clinic, Southwest VA Clinic, and Southeast VA Clinic. The Pahrump VA Clinic is a Community Based Outpatient Clinic which provides rural health care to Veterans residing in Nye County, and the MCPO Jesse Dean VA Clinic in Laughlin is a rural outreach clinic which serves Veterans in southern Clark County.

The health care system opened a comprehensive medical center in 2012, that provides specialty and inpatient services. Inpatient services include 102 Medical, Surgical, Psychiatric, ICU, Step-Down and Rehabilitation beds. An Emergency Department is located at the medical center. In 2019, the VA added the Las Vegas VA Residential Recovery and Renewal Center (LVR3), a brand new, 20-bed substance use and gambling residential treatment program, which is the VA's first residential program in Southern Nevada and second residential gambling addition recovery center in the nation.

The VA Southern Nevada Fisher House opened on the main medical center campus in 2016, and provides temporary lodging to families of Veterans or active-duty service members undergoing inpatient or extensive outpatient treatment in the Las Vegas Valley.

VASNHS maintains a joint venture with the Department of Defense's 99th Medical Group at the Mike O'Callaghan Military Medical Center (MOMMC) at Nellis Air Force Base. VASNHS also maintains a Community Resource and Referral Center (CRRC) for homeless and at-risk Veterans and a Veterans Recovery Center (VRC).







What is on the horizon for healthcare in Las Vegas?

Las Vegas HEALS has a keen interest in the expansion of Las Vegas' healthcare landscape. We are often called upon locally and nationally to serve as a neutral spokesperson's for the city's recent successes as well as provide an informed glimpse towards the future.

The new UNLV School of Medicine will be enrolling its fourth class in the summer of 2020, achieving its full complement of students; in 2019, Touro University Nevada expanded its class size to 181 and Roseman University College of Medicine will soon enter the accreditation process. All are attracting faculty for Graduate Medical Education (GME), with 8 hospitals now hosting physician residency, fellowship, nursing and specialty programs designed to empower future graduate of our medical school. Statistics from other cities indicate 70% of physicians begin practice in the city in which they completed their final training, so having more GME programs in Las Vegas will play an integral role in growing a physician workforce, bringing our physician ratio to parity with the rest of nation.

Since the 2017 opening game of the Vegas Golden Knights and the unprecedented rush at the Stanley Cup by a first-year expansion team, the Las Vegas professional sports scene has exploded to include professional football, basketball, soccer, lacrosse and more, giving rise to myriad opportunities for the healthcare industry from caring for professional athletes to educating the city's youth on safe play and injury management.

The Las Vegas Medical District (LVMD), containing two teaching hospital (University Medical Center and Valley Hospital Medical Center), will become the future home of UNLV School of Medicine. Meanwhile, in the City of Henderson, the vision of East Side Medical Corridor has progressed with the development of the new Henderson Hospital and Union Village.

Nevada, and especially Las Vegas, has identified healthcare as a top priority and is executing an ambitious plan with competitive talent along with infrastructure to deliver growth for becoming a global leader in healthcare employment, tourism, innovation as well as research.

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



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Diversity Index: Las Vegas MSA Employment









Target Industries

The Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance focuses on targeting industries that provide the most growth potential and help diversify the economy of Southern Nevada. Economic diversification enhances regional competitiveness in the global economy, while also helping attract and retain a talent pool that will further develop the region.

Logistics, Manufacturing and Supply Chain Management

The Southern Nevada landscape for manufacturing is marked by the strong tandem of the region's strategic geographic location and existing assets, including opportunities associated with leveraging development-ready land, industrial capabilities, regional connectivity and the state's business-friendly tax climate.

Emerging Technology

Southern Nevada is well positioned to leverage existing, foundational infrastructure and regional assets to accommodate additional growth as a western U.S. hub for technology, extending into sectors powering other high-growth categories such as autonomous systems, gaming, computer programming and more.

Business Headquarters and Services

Although a regional focus on "business headquarters and services" is often only an extension of business recruitment efforts directed toward other industries. Establishing this industry as a direct target for economic development reflects the strength of regional assets that can be leveraged toward the recruitment of business headquarters – regional headquarters or operations, U.S. locations for international companies and corporate headquarters – as well as the professional, technical, administrative and support services that serve as core inputs into business headquarters or operations and support service firms.

Autonomous Systems

As a region, Southern Nevada is positioned to aggressively pursue a substantial portion of economic activity driven by autonomous systems and accommodate the industry's growth through multiple avenues, including the manufacturing, testing and implementation of autonomous technologies in both hardware and software, with established vehicle-to-infrastructure (V2I) capabilities, a progressive public policy environment and existing plans for mobility solutions.

Finance, Banking and Insurance

The region's position as a leading convention and trade show destination brings global businesses from a wide array of industries to Southern Nevada on a regular basis and the region remains poised to leverage this opportunity to attract global capital across a variety of finance related activities including banking and insurance.

Unique opportunities exist in Southern Nevada to go beyond a more traditional supporting role in health care and pursue a more focused economic development strategy around health care services and medical education. Business Assistance Programs

Business Assistance Programs

In partnership with the Governor's Office of Economic Development and the local jurisdictions within Clark County, the Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance offers a variety of incentives to help qualifying companies locate and expand in the region. Programs include the following:

Sales and Use Tax Abatement

On qualified capital equipment purchases, with reductions in the rate to as low as 2 percent for a 2-year period.

Modified Business Tax Abatement

50 percent of the 1.475 percent rate on quarterly wages exceeding \$50,000 for a 4-year period.

Personal Property Tax Abatement

Up to 50 percent over a maximum of 10 years.

Real Property Tax Abatement for Recycling

Up to 50 percent abatement for up to 10 years on real for qualified recycling businesses.

Aviation Parts Abatement

Up to 50 percent on personal property tax and a reduction of sales and use tax to a rate of 2 percent for a 20-year period.

Data Center Abatement

Up to 75 percent on personal property tax and a reduction of sales and use tax to a rate of 2 percent for a 10 or 20-year period.

Silver State Works Employee Hiring Incentive

Provides employers up to \$2,000 for hiring state-qualified employee candidates.

Nevada Taxes

Nevada Tax Climate

Offering one of the lowest tax burdens in the nation, Nevada is consistently cited by the likes of Forbes, Inc and Money magazines as having one of the best overall business climates in the nation. Nevada's tax structure is designed to be less burdensome to both business and its employees. The Tax Foundation rated Nevada as the No. 9 best state for business in 2019.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

Excise tax on importation, processing, storing or selling of all liquor (including beer). Malt beverages are taxed at 16 cents per gallon and liquor is taxed from 70 cents to \$3.60 per gallon depending on the alcohol content. Sales tax is collected on the retail price. Annual state license fees range from \$75 to \$500 according to the type of business.

BUSINESS LICENSE

A state license fee is paid annually. The fee is \$500 for domestic and foreign for-profit corporations, except Domestic Professional Corporations formed under NRS 89. The fee is \$200 for all other businesses. Counties and cities can also impose a business license fee

on businesses in their jurisdiction. The fee is generally based on the type of business (i.e., retail, professional, hotel, etc.)

BUSINESS REGISTRATION FEES

Fees for filing articles of incorporation or agreements of consolidation providing for shares apply in Nevada. The rate is based on the value of the shares with a minimum fee of \$75 and a maximum fee of \$35,000 (example: if the total value of shares is \$75,000 or less the fee is \$75; \$200,000 or less the fee is \$175; over \$1 million is \$375 plus \$275 for each additional \$500,000 or fraction thereof, not to exceed


\$35,000). Except in the case of shares valued at \$75,000 or less, fees for the Annual Filing are the same as for filing the articles of incorporation; however, the maximum fee is \$11,125 . Non-par value stock is assigned a value of \$1 per share for the purpose of computing the fee. Fees are the same for domestic and foreign corporations. Fees are also imposed upon Limited-Liability Companies, Limited Partnerships, Limited-Liability Partnerships and Business Trusts. Contact the Nevada Secretary of State office for additional information.


CAR RENTAL

The state fee is imposed at 10 percent on the short-term rental of a passenger car. Both Clark and Washoe counties levy an additional 2 percent for authorized projects. Ten percent is remitted to the state general fund. Additional airport fees apply.

CIGARETTE/TOBACCO PRODUCTS

The excise tax on cigarettes is 9 cents per cigarette, which equates to \$1.80 cents per package of 20. Other tobacco products are taxed at 30 percent of the wholesaler's cost. Sales tax is also collected on the retail price.





Business » Nevada Taxes

COMMERCE TAX

A new tax as of July 1, 2015, the tax is imposed on business entities doing business in Nevada. It is based on the Nevada gross revenue received by a business in a taxable year (July 1 through June 30). The rates of the commerce tax range from 0.051 percent to 0.0331 percent. The first \$4 million is subtracted from Nevada gross revenue. A 50 percent credit for the commerce tax paid is allowed against the modified business tax. As of June 13, 2019, businesses whose Nevada gross revenue for the 2018-2019 taxable year is \$4,000,000 or less, are no longer required to file a commerce tax return.

GAMING

There are five principal types of gaming taxes. Gross gaming revenue tax, table tax and slot taxes are levied by the state. In addition, gaming fees are levied by the county and local governments. For more information, contact the Nevada Gaming Control Board.

LODGING

A statewide tax of 1 percent of gross receipts is imposed on the rental of hotel and motel rooms. This is in addition to any locally imposed room taxes which range from 7 to 13 percent. In Clark County, the total combined rate ranges from 11 to 13.88 percent. An additional 1%, apportioned to the LVCVA Expansion (1/2%) and the Stadium Construction Fund (1/2%) are effective March 1, 2017.

LIVE ENTERTAINMENT TAX

Imposed at locations where live entertainment is provided for which there is an admission, cover or table charge. The rate is 9 percent. For non-gaming establishments there is no tax imposed if the maximum occupancy is less than 200.

MODIFIED BUSINESS TAX

The tax is based on gross payroll paid in the calendar quarter and is imposed on businesses in Nevada that are required to make unemployment insurance contributions to the Nevada Department of Employment Security. General Business employers pay a tax rate of 1.475 percent on gross wages reported over \$50,000 in a quarter. Financial institutions and mining companies pay a rate of 2 percent. The employer can deduct any costs for providing a qualified employer-paid health care plan. A 50 percent credit for the commerce tax paid is allowed against the modified business tax.

MOTOR VEHICLE FUEL

Gasoline and gasohol are taxed at 23 cents per gallon. Additional county taxes range from 5 cents to 10 cents per gallon. Diesel, kerosene, biodiesel and biodiesel blends are 27 cents per gallon, liquid petroleum and butane are 22 cents per gallon, compressed natural gas is 21 cents per gallon and water-phased fuel is 19 cents per

gallon. Clark and Washoe counties index the tax for inflation based on the Producer Price Index.

MOTOR VEHICLES

Fees are annual and must be paid, at the time of registration, on all vehicles operated on any highway. For mopeds, the fee is paid one-time per owner.

GOVERNMENTAL SERVICE TAX

This tax is in lieu of personal property tax. The valuation of the vehicle is determined at 35 percent of the manufacturer's suggested retail price, without accessories. Vehicle value is depreciated to 95 percent after the first year and graduated down to 15 percent after nine years. Buses, trucks and truck trailers depreciate down to 85 percent after the first year and down to 23 percent after 10 years. The rate imposed by the state is 4 cents on each \$1 valuation. Counties may levy up to one cent on each dollar of valuation, but the total tax imposed cannot exceed 5 cents on each dollar of valuation.

REGISTRATION

Passenger cars, motorcycles, travel trailers, low speed and electric vehicles and trucks with a gross vehicle weight less than 6,000 pounds pay \$33 per year. Rates on trucks vary from a low of \$38 for a truck with a gross weight of 6,000 pounds to a maximum of \$1,360 for a truck with a gross weight of 80,000 pounds. Moped registration is a one-time fee of \$33 per owner.

PROPERTY

State statutes limit the property tax rate to a total of \$3.64 per \$100 of assessed valuation. Assessment is at 35 percent of taxable value. The tax is applied to the assessed value. Property tax rates may vary within the city and county, due to special districts or general improvement districts such as fire control districts, library districts and television districts. The tax bill is capped at a maximum increase of 3 percent over the prior year for an owner-occupied residence or a rental property with rent charged below the HUD Fair Market Rents, and a maximum increase of 8 percent for all other real and personal property.

REAL PROPERTY

Includes land, buildings and improvements not normally removable. The value for land is full cash value. The value for improvements is replacement costs less depreciation at 1.5 percent per year up to 50 years. The combination of these values is known as taxable value.

PERSONAL PROPERTY

Includes property not permanently affixed to land, such as business equipment and mobile/manufactured homes not converted to real property. Assessment is 35 percent of original cost less depreciation.

INDUSTRIAL INSURANCE

Industrial insurance is obtained through private insurance carriers, self-insurance or group self-insurance. For more information about self-insurance or group self-insurance contact the Nevada Division of Insurance.

INSURANCE PREMIUM

Insurers pay 3.5 percent of the total direct premiums written for the preceding calendar year covering property and other risks in the state. The tax is passed onto the consumer in the cost of the premium. Risk retention groups registered in Nevada but chartered in another state pay a rate of 2 percent. The tax is due on actual premiums received in the quarter with payment due 30 days following the end of the quarter.

SALES AND USE

Sales tax is charged at the retail level on the sale of tangible personal property unless exempt by statute. A companion "use" tax is charged on property purchased outside of Nevada and brought into the state for use. The authorized maximum combined State rate is 6.85 percent. Counties are allowed various options to pay for items such as transportation, roads, flood control and water. In Clark County, the total combined rate is 8.375 percent effective January 1, 2020. In Washoe County, the total combined rate is 8.265 percent effective April 1, 2017.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

Paid by employers of one or more persons with total wages paid of \$225 or more during a calendar quarter. For the first 14-17 calendar quarters as an employer in Nevada, the total rate is 3 percent. Thereafter, it may vary from 0.25 percent to 5.4 percent depending on the number of employees and the firm's unemployment record. The maximum wage base upon which the rate is applied changes annually. For 2020, the maximum wage base is \$32,500.

UNIVERSAL ENERGY CHARGE

The tax is assessed on each therm of natural gas or kilowatt hour of electricity consumed in Nevada. The rate is 3.30 mills per therm of natural gas and .39 mills per kilowatt-hour of electricity. If tax collected exceeds \$25,000 in any calendar quarter, a refund for the amount over \$25,000 may be requested. The tax is distributed to the Welfare Division and is further distributed 25 percent to the Nevada Housing Division for weatherization. The Welfare Division uses the remaining 75 percent for energy assistance to low-income households. The tax is remitted within 30 days after the end of each calendar quarter. As a pass-through, the tax is itemized on each customer's billing statement as a separate line item.







Distance From Las Vegas





McCarran International Airport

McCarran International Airport is Southern Nevada's gateway to the world. With more than 30 airlines providing nonstop flights to more than 150 destinations last year, it was the ninth-busiest airport in North America and among the Top 30 Busiest Airports in the world.

In 2019, McCarran hosted more than 51.5 million passengers, 3.8 million of whom were from international destinations. McCarran is owned and operated by the government of Clark County, Nevada, which is overseen by the Clark County Board of Commissioners. Unlike other departments within the county government, the Department of Aviation is a self-sufficient enterprise and operates without County General Fund tax revenue. Airport revenue is derived from aviation and nonaviation sources, as well as Passenger Facility Charges and Airport Improvement Program grants.

For decades, the skyrocketing popularity of Las Vegas challenged the airport's infrastructure. Over time, more and more aircraft, cars and travelers have jockeyed for space within an airport whose initial developers never envisioned a time when more than 40 million passengers would become the annual norm. Airport expansions were delivered in the 1980s, 1990s, 2000s and most recently in 2012, with the opening of Terminal 3.

In recent years, international visitation has become an increasingly important priority. The opening of Terminal 3 in 2012 allowed McCarran to experience double-digit growth in international arrivals. Prior to the onset of COVID-19, McCarran handled nonstop flights to more than 30 international destinations, including cities in Canada and Mexico, as well as Asia and multiple markets in Europe.





Southern Nevada Water Authority (SNWA)

The Southern Nevada Water Authority (SNWA) is a not-for-profit, regional water agency established in 1991 to address Southern Nevada's unique water needs on a regional basis. The SNWA is responsible for treating and delivering high-quality water, operating and managing regional water facilities, and implementing comprehensive water conservation programs. The wholesale water agency also maintains a 50-year water resource plan to ensure a secure water supply for Southern Nevada over the next half-century.

Sustainably using its water resources, Southern Nevada employs community-wide water reuse, reclaiming and returning nearly all water used indoors back to Lake Mead where it can be used again. Indoor water use accounts for about 40 percent of the community's total water usage, while water used outdoors, primarily for landscape irrigation and evaporative cooling, accounts for about 60 percent.

SNWA's flagship water conservation initiative, Water Smart Landscapes Rebate program (WSL), offers property owners \$3 per square-foot to converted grass to water-efficient, drip-irrigated landscaping. Since 1999, local residents and businesses have converted more than 193 million square feet of grass to water-efficient landscapes, saving the community a cumulative 130 billion gallons of water.

Increasing water efficiency in the commercial and multi-family home sectors, the SNWA's Water Efficient Technologies (WET) Program provides financial incentives to businesses that incorporate water-saving appliances, fixtures, and other highefficiency devices into their operations. The financial incentives help businesses offset costs and increase the return on making water-efficiency investments. Recognizing that being water smart is a wise investment, local businesses have saved more than 14 billion gallons of water through the WET program.

Regionally, Nevada, Arizona and California initiated the Lower Colorado River Basin Drought Contingency Plan (DCP). Under the terms of this landmark agreement, the Lower Basin States reduce Colorado River withdrawals to help protect water levels in Lake Mead, the source of 90 percent of Southern Nevada's water supply. The agreement and related actions of the Lower Basin States reduce the risk of Lake Mead reaching critically low elevations by approximately 50 percent.

Even under ongoing drought conditions, Southern Nevada has sufficient resources to meet the community's water needs well into the future. Continued conservation efforts by residents and businesses remains a critical component to managing current and future water resources.

SNWA member agencies include the Big Bend Water District in Laughlin; the cities of Las Vegas, Henderson, North Las Vegas and Boulder City; the Clark County Water Reclamation District; and the Las Vegas Valley Water District. Together, these seven agencies provide water and wastewater services to Southern Nevada's two million residents and more than 40 million annual visitors.

Eight tips for small business cash flow management

Cash flow may be a key indicator of the financial health of your business. A consistent positive cash flow can help you pay expenses, invest in new opportunities, and grow your business. Get started with these tips:

1. Pay bills strategically.

Paying all your business bills at the same time may drain your cash, and potentially jeopardize your relationships with suppliers if you are unable to pay. Instead, you may want to review bills, sort according to priority, and stagger payment dates so the most important bills — such as rent and payroll — are paid first. Payments that are less important and more flexible can be made later.

Positive cash flow is critical to your financial success.

2. Choose the right payroll cycle.

Structure your payroll to mesh with your revenue stream and comply with wage and hour laws. There may be a benefit to holding the cash to be paid less frequently than weekly (e.g., biweekly or monthly), provided applicable wage and hour laws permit you to do so. Check with your state Department of Labor on the correct payroll frequency.

3. Negotiate your payments with suppliers.

Using suppliers with low prices may seem like a way to improve cash flow, but flexible payment options can be more important than bottom-shelf pricing. Ask your suppliers to offer extended payment terms so you can keep your cash longer.

4. Collect receivables quickly.

Improve your cash flow by encouraging quick receivables. These techniques can help you collect receivables faster:

- · Request deposits when taking orders.
- Offer discounted prices to move outdated inventory.
- Offer discounts to customers who pay quickly.

5. Use technology to make and accept payments.

Accepting online payments may allow you to collect receivables faster, and using electronic fund transfers to automatically pay bills on the last day they're due may be helpful in managing cash flow. Technology should also help you keep track of where you stand.

6. Tighten credit practices.

If you offer credit to customers, stand firm on your credit policies to make sure you get the cash you need. Possible strategies you may want to try:

- Send invoices promptly, verify they've been received, and follow up right away on late payments.
- Require a credit check for all new customers before extending credit.
- Monitor your accounts to identify late-paying customers, and implement a cash-on-delivery policy for chronic offenders.

7. Use a business credit card.

Consider using a business credit card to pay for everyday expenses. Also, you may want to seek rewards programs that can reduce your expenses, such as a certain percentage back on some purchases.

8. Consider a line of credit.

Having a line of credit may help you prepare for anticipated and unanticipated cash shortages. It allows you to access a predetermined amount of cash quickly whenever you need it.

Make the most of your cash by monitoring expenses, collecting payments quickly, and using resources that can make your cash flow management more convenient.







Number of New Home Sales




Median New Home Price




Resale Home Market




Las Vegas Industrial Market Inventory

(Million SF at Year-end)




Las Vegas Industrial Market Net Absorption

(Million SF Demanded)




Las Vegas Industrial Market Completions

(Million SF Constructed)




Las Vegas Industrial Market Vacancy Rate






Las Vegas Office Market Inventory

(Million SF at Year-end)




Las Vegas Office Market Net Absorption

(Million SF Demanded)




Las Vegas Office Market Completions

(Million SF Constructed)




Las Vegas Office Market Vacancy Rate




Las Vegas Retail Market Inventory

(Million SF at Year-end)




Las Vegas Retail Market Net Absorption




Las Vegas Retail Market Vacancy Rate



The Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority (LVCVA) is charged with marketing Southern Nevada as a tourism and convention destination worldwide, and also with operating the Las Vegas Convention Center. With nearly 150,000 hotel rooms in Las Vegas alone and more than 12 million square feet of meeting and exhibit space citywide, the LVCVA's mission centers on attracting ever increasing numbers of leisure and business visitors to the area.

The Las Vegas Convention Center (LVCC), located one block east of the Las Vegas Strip, opened in 1959 and encompasses approximately 3.2 million square feet with approximately 2.2 million square feet of convention space. The facility, one of the most modern and functional centers in the world, is centrally located a short distance from 100,000 guest rooms.

In addition to exhibit and convention space, 145 meeting rooms handle seating capacities ranging from 20 to 2,500. A grand lobby and registration area (more than 225,000 square feet) efficiently link exhibiting of multiple events.

The LVCVA has just launched Phase 2 of the Las Vegas Convention Center expansion, a major economic development project to expand and renovate the convention center. The 1.4-million-square-foot expansion will provide an additional 600,000 square feet of exhibit space and accompanying meeting rooms, public areas, and service facilities. It will also provide a full renovation of the existing facility. This expansion will help Las Vegas maintain its status as the No. 1 Trade Show and Convention Destination for years to come.





Population and housing unit data were obtained from Clark County Comprehensive Planning. With regard to specific demographic characteristics reported, Applied Analysis generated estimates which are derived from various sources, including census-based estimates and other third party providers, which were benchmarked as necessary. Year-to-year comparisons are subject to sampling variability and the influences of the survey and research methods used. Data presented in this publication were obtained from various third parties, including public and private community sources. While we have no reason to doubt the accuracy of the data reported herein, the information collected was not subjected to any auditing or review procedures by Las Vegas Perspective; and therefore, we make no representations or assurances as to its completeness.

Community Survey Methodology

Three separate web-based surveys were commissioned by the Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance and conducted between March 6 and April 14, 2020. Respondents were selected from the current Clark County workforce and thus excludes retirees, students and other unemployed workers. The sample size of the survey was 500 with a margin of error of +/- 3.7 percent at the 90 percent confidence interval.
