



The blind scripts are read by a jury of theatre professionals, and the fourteen highest scoring scripts are produced across two shows. *Signs* was directed by Laurie Thomas and performed by Zane Barker (pictured). Liisa says: "It was truly humbling to be included in the group of extremely talented playwrights, directors and actors." Nice!





Mel Hector, an OPP member who has seen the group grow from a dozen playwrights to well over forty now, was delighted to see his latest play, *Cecelia's Plight*, voted ready for a live performance by the membership this past week.

Like many OPP members, Mel is an intriguing character. After graduating from high school, Mel had seven full-ride college scholarship offers to study engineering and math but enlisted in the Marines instead. He got sent to Vietnam, where he was wounded in three separate incidents. Sent home to

recuperate, Mel then opted for college and medical school; and it's medicine and the patients he sees that continues to inspire his writing today.

Mel Hector, MD, who was diagnosed with multiple myeloma in 2021 and underwent a bone marrow transplant, maintains he's still honing his craft. "When I write a play, I can do fine with plot and structure and developments," he says. "What I really have to work on is making believable, real characters who emote because I spent a lifetime not emoting."

With regards to his time with OPP, Mel reflects: "We have the privilege of a front row seat to creative people telling their different stories every week, and doing their best to make them better, learning the craft, finding their voice. We share the fun as their effort comes alive, it changes, and it improves. OPP is a place to have fun. We don't always agree, and that adds to it. I can't think of a better, kinder group with whom to be disagreeable." Well said, Doctor Mel!


