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Some couples want their wedding DJ to **bring the party**. They will likely have ideas or games they have seen before or thought of themselves. I can help brainstorm with the couple. Here are some ideas I've executed, seen done by another DJ, or thought of.

Anything with additional costs would be the couple's responsibility.

Idea or Game	Details
<b>Grand Entrance Plus</b>	The wedding party, or the entire couple, gets introduced in a big way – imagine coming into the reception like a hyped up boxing or UFC entrance / Michael Buffer style, or perhaps an entrance that resembles a big pro NBA or NFL team
<b>The Shoe Game</b>	The couple sits back to back with guests in a circle around them, as they answer questions with yes or no responses by raising their shoes, without seeing each other
<b>Anniversary Countdown</b>	Ask all couples to the dance floor to slow dance. Put on the music and ask the newlyweds to stay the whole time. Dismiss anyone married within the past year. Then do 2 years, 3, etc. Start incrementing by 5 years. Spend a minute chatting with longest married couple
<b>Turn in the Keys (or Remove from Phone)</b>	The classic game where the DJ asks any men who might have keys to the bride's apartment to turn them in, and every guy comes up to turn in a key. A modern variant could be for men to erase the bride's contact info from phones
<b>Snowball or Multiple Dance</b>	Play with a small dance group. If no one is on the dance floor, call up the bridal party. Start a dance song, explaining that when the song stops, they need to each grab someone from the audience and bring them back. Continue a few times to have the dance floor double each time
<b>Blind Connect Four</b>	The couple sits facing each other to play Connect Four, blindfolded! To direct them in where to place their checkers, family and friends stand behind either the bride or groom and shout out what to do. There could be a little sabotaging ...
<b>Group Karaoke or Throwback Singalong</b>	Add a wireless mic to the dance floor on a big sing-along, and magic happens. Play a song that everyone knows the words to, like "Sweet Caroline" or something newer like "Wrecking Ball"
<b>Rave Lights</b>	Give everyone light up foam batons, and you've got an instant rave
<b>Dance-off</b>	A classic: guests form a circle, or a soul train line, and individuals or couples dance their best moves for a few seconds or a minute. Or mix it up and do battle of the sexes, or bride side vs. groom side.
<b>Sing-off</b>	The guests split into 2 groups. Group 1 sings a song, typically a fun (or annoying) and well-known ballad like Hello by Adele or Wrecking Ball by Miley Cyrus. Then group 2 sings another song. DJ provides lyric sheets and judges winner
<b>Conga</b>	Everyone forms a line and snakes around the reception hall to Gloria Estafan's Conga, Harry Belafonte's Jump in the Line, or perhaps LMFAO's Shots
<b>Limbo</b>	Classic game where guests line up and dance underneath a pole that will get lower and lower as the song progresses. Typically to Chubby Checker's Limbo Rock
<b>Old School Group Dances</b>	The vintage wedding group dances such as Chicken Dance, Hokey Pokey, etc.
<b>Sparkler Send-off</b>	Done immediately outside the venue, guests form a corridor holding large sparklers. The bride and groom walk (or jog) through the corridor, to their car or limo
