Designated days are set for individuals and families to shop the abundant supply of shoes, linens, books, baby items, movies, toys, pictures, kitchen items, sporting equipment, frames, home décor, diapers, small applianc-

# **UCAP Rates 9.6 Score in Recent Survey**

The recent customer satisfaction survey, which ended June 30, confirms agency programs and services are a good fit for clients. The agency scored 9.6 out of 10.

Surveys were submitted by customers from Creek, Kay, Logan, Noble, Okmulgee, Osage, Pawnee, Payne, Tulsa and Washington counties. Responses confirmed using emergency services, Early Head Start, Head Start, Housing, Child Care Food Program, CASA, tax preparation and transportation programs.

Survey takers had the following guidelines to answer questions: (1) strongly agree; (2) agree; (3) Disagree and (4) Strongly Disagree

- 84.94% strongly agreed UCAP staff was courteous, respectful & helpful (an additional 14.03% agreed)
- 82.85% strongly agreed to refer UCAP to friends & family (an additional 15.83% agreed)
- 69.03% strongly agreed UCAP helps improve the condition for low-income people (an additional 21.26% agreed

Comments included: "I am always recommending people. "Good services, nice, helpful people." "Can't say enough about the drivers—these are a special group of people. Thanks to scheduling staff, who answer the phone." "Staff is very helpful and love the kids. My child has a huge smile when we get there in the mornings."

# **Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP)**



The Affordable Connectivity Program is an FCC benefit program that helps ensure that households can afford the broadband they need for work, school, healthcare and more. The benefit provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward internet service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands. Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers if they contribute more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase price.

The Affordable Connectivity Program is limited to one monthly service discount and one device discount per household. If you need to talk to someone about your eligibility or application status, call the ACP Support Center at (877) 384-2575.

## Wellness: Building Resilience and Hope

Resilience is the ability recover from difficulties you face in life, while hope is the desire for good things to happen. Being able to weather the storms takes both.

**Be Kind to Yourself.** Try shifting focus. Go for a walk, talk to a friend, read a book, listen to music or try out a mindfulness app.

Eat healthy foods, get rest and exercise and avoid alcohol and drugs to deal with stress and difficult feelings

**Load up on the good stuff.** Limit amount of news and social media. Train the brain to recognize positive things that happen. What made you smile or laugh today? What makes you feel thankful?

**Build hope with action.** To be hopeful means you can imagine a positive outcome. Taking steps, no matter how small, toward that outcome can reduce anxiety and stress and strengthen resilience.

**Do something for others.** Levels of hope and optimism increase when people act to help others. Even small actions can improve feelings of
