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

#### "The New Colossus" by Emma Lazarus (1849-1887)

Not like the brazen giant of Greek fame,
With conquering limbs astride from land to land;
Here at our sea-washed, sunset gates shall stand
A mighty woman with a torch, whose flame
Is the imprisoned lightning, and her name
Mother of Exiles. From her beacon-hand
Glows world-wide welcome; her mild eyes command
The air-bridged harbor that twin cities frame.
"Keep, ancient lands, your storied pomp!" cries she
With silent lips. "Give me your tired, your poor,
Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free,
The wretched refuse of your teeming shore.
Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me,
I lift my lamp beside the golden door!"

This poem was written by **Lazarus in 1883** as part of the fund-raising efforts for a base for the Statue of Liberty. It is cast on a plaque that is mounted on the inside of the base of the statue. Lazarus was an activist and advocate for Jewish refugees fleeing from Russian pogroms in the 1800s, and wrote the poem as a way to express empathy for Russian Jewish refugees to the US.

The statue was intended to be a symbol of republican (anti-imperialist) values; however, Lazarus' poem gave it a new purpose, turning it into a symbol of welcome for immigrants and refugees at the front door of the country. (Wikipedia article on "The New Colossus")

### **Anniversaries**



#### Pastor Sarah's Link to her Sermon & Questions for Discussions

- 1. Neither of these tragedies the murder of the Galileans in the Temple while they were making their sacrifices, or the deaths of the residents of Jerusalem in the collapse of the tower in Siloam are reported in history, but they are representative of two different kinds of tragedies: random acts of violence, such as a mass shooting, and natural disaster, such as an earthquake, flood, or hurricane. From a legal perspective, they're very different. As far as the victims are concerned, do you think they are different from a theological perspective? Why or why not?
- 2. Theodicy, the attempt to explain how God can be loving and also allow suffering to exist, is a real and challenging topic to tackle in a sermon, in a conversation, anywhere. But it's an important one to wrestle with, because otherwise, we can fall back on platitudes like "God needed another angel," which is the polar opposite of the argument that the person who brings the issue up seems to be making, but which Jesus tells us clearly in this morning's Gospel text is just wrong. I don't think having an answer is important, but I do think wrestling with the question is important.
- 3. This text is less obviously about discipleship than our text last Sunday was, but I think it's in there with the parable about the fig tree. We are called to be fertilized by God, to allow ourselves to bear fruit. One commentator that I read this week pointed out that we shouldn't boast of any abundance that we have; maybe we should think about it in the opposite way we might have needed extra "fertilizer" to get us to the point where we were able to bear our fruit??? I don't know how I feel about that, but it's food for thought.
- 4. I went in a direction for my sermon that left off the last section of the text, but I think it's important to at least give you a guestion or two to think about. Jesus tells the Pharisees that he won't reach Jerusalem until his ministry is complete. Calling Herod a "fox" is an insult; and then he plays on it a little bit with the image of being a mother bird gathering her babies (a "mother hen gathering her chicks" is how this is often translated), because foxes are natural predators of chickens, so he wants to guard Jerusalem, and by extension the church, against Herod, and by extension, Rome. Gathering the children together can also be seen as an ingathering of exiles, a sign of the age of the messiah. In Luke's Gospel, this is the mission to the Gentiles. Lastly, the end of verse 35, "Blessed is the One who comes in the name of our God!" is from psalm 118:26, from the Hallel Psalms, recited on festivals. There are some partly coherent thoughts that will maybe point you in a direction (or two or three?) if you want to reflect on or discuss the last 4 verses of our text.
